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


AP 2D Studio Art Orientation






The Studio Art 2-D Portfolio



Concentration Possibility (25 points)

This Fall, you will face an important decision: how will you summarize your artistic style in visual expression. That is, how will you make a visual statement in a 12 piece series. Concentration is **not** something I prescribe to you – I will not tell you what to choose to focus on. Instead, it is your independent course of study – an in-depth investigation of a specific idea worked out over time. While I do not expect you to have this question completely addressed on Day 1, I do want you to have a solid lead. Essentially, what is it that you are passionate about? What do you want the world to know about, in terms of your message as an artist?? In short, what fascinates you???

If you have the time to develop this idea further, or alternately are not sure what I am asking you do here, navigate to our "homepage" and look at the student samples (which will most likely be updated by AP over the summer to include more recent student work):



Summer Portfolio pieces: (5) worth 20 points each

Last, but certainly not least, please create (5) new works over the summer. For us, this can be digital painting / drawing, digital imaging (i.e. Photoshop collages), photographs, or a mixture of all of the above. I will even accept more traditional media, if you also like working on paper, canvas, etc. Bottom line, the images you work with need to be your own original creations. Painters and photographers, this will be easier for you. For those of you considering digital imaging, even if you do not have Photoshop at home, you need to find software that helps you to heavily alter source images to the point where your work is based on your ideas (your artistic voice). For those of you who had AP Digital last school year, you may continue where you left off (including upgrades of old pieces), if you choose. Keep in mind that if you had AP last year you will need to submit a Drawing Portfolio this upcoming year. We will talk about that further, once classes start.

Bring your (5) pieces in on the 1st Day of class on a USB drive, data card, or other storage media. The higher the compositional quality of the piece, the higher the amount of points you will earn.

If you have access to Photoshop, fantastic! If you do not, I highly recommend a cloud based image editor called Pixlr. While certainly not Photoshop, Pixlr is a decent free option for your work, and has many of the same functions, menus, and hot keys. Pixlr is owned by the Autodesk company which makes, amongst other things, the IFF suite of CG programs (which we will never see in the lab as Flame runs in the hundreds of thousands of dollars range), so they sort of know their stuff. However, I only recommend it for student work / practice as Autodesk legal language for use of Pixlr is occasionally sketchy. If you want to know that your work will always be your work, and need a free imaging program, there is also SumoPaint. Use their free version, but realize that the editing options there are limited. Finally, there are many additional programs out there! Others that I'd recommend at least checking out if you do not have Photoshop are listed next, below SumoPaint.

Additionally, you can use Adobe's free trial options. You can try out Adobe CC (Creative Cloud) Photoshop for 30 days for no charge. This is not my recommendation, just an option.

As you create these pieces, also consider the Rule of Thirds, and the Fibonacci Spiral. We will go over this material in the Fall, but I highly recommend you look at pro photographer Jake Garn's article on those ideas, now. Definitely review his writing if you have no idea why we will combat the oversimplified, over-done reliance on the Rule of Thirds (or for that matter what the Rule of Thirds actually is). While I have mixed feelings on his style as an artist, his excellent article states a strong case for use of the Golden Mean, in plain language.
