You were identified because your tenth grade PSAT results, unweighted grade point average and/or FSA ELA score indicate you could earn a qualifying score when you take the PSAT/NMSQT as a junior. About PSAT/NMSQT

The Preliminary SAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test is a program co-sponsored by the College Board and National Merit Scholarship Corporation (NMSC). It is a standardized test that provides firsthand practice for the SAT. It also gives 11th grade students a chance to enter NMSC scholarship programs, be identified and invited to apply for other scholarship opportunities and gain access to college and career planning tools.

The PSAT/NMSQT measures evidence-based reading and writing skills, math skills, and problem-solving skills. You have developed these skills over many years, both in and out of school. This test does *not* require you to recall specific facts from your classes.

The most common reasons for taking the PSAT/NMSQT are to:

- Receive feedback on your strengths and weaknesses on skills necessary for college study, which allows
 you to focus your preparation on those areas that could most benefit from additional study or
 practice.
- Gain access to personalized SAT Prep through Khan Academy at no cost. Your PSAT results will be
 uploaded into their SAT Prep platform so that you can login to receive practice that is tailored to
 your areas of need.
- See how your performance on an admissions test might compare with that of others applying to college. Enter the competition for scholarships from National Merit Scholarship Corporation and the Telluride Association, as well as many others.
- Become familiar with the kinds of questions and the exact directions you will see on the SAT.
- Use the College and Career Planning tools MyRoad and BigFuture. MyRoad offers a personality
 profiler to help students explore majors and careers. BigFuture helps students further explore
 majors and find colleges that are right for them.
- Receive information from colleges when you check "yes" to Student Search Services.

2016 PSAT/NMSQT Test Date: Wednesday, October 19th

The cost of the PSAT/NMSQT is \$15.00 and will be collected from each student during the first month of school. Students who are eligible for free or reduced lunch are eligible to receive a fee waiver for the PSAT/NMSQT, which means there would be no cost to sit for the test. Only students who sign up for the test this month are eligible for the fee waiver in October 2016.
