

VIRTUAL EDUCATION

Pinellas County Schools has its own virtual school called Pinellas Virtual School (PVS) and students may take virtual classes part-time or full time. For middle and high school students, PVS uses digital resources and lesson plans used in many of the district's brick and mortar classrooms. All teachers are district employees. Registration for virtual school begins 90 days prior to the first day of school.

CAREER TECHNICAL & ADULT EDUCATION (CTAE)

During the 2012-13 school year:

- 82 percent of students completing one of the technical education programs were placed in jobs, chose to continue their education or joined the military.
- Over 836 high school students were served in the community schools and adult education centers.
- 5,882 students attended the two Pinellas Technical Education Centers,
- 14,499 adult general education students and 3,544 postsecondary vocational students attended the community schools and adult education centers
- 3,292 people took the GED test, and 1,661 received diplomas.
