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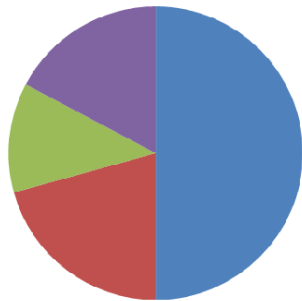

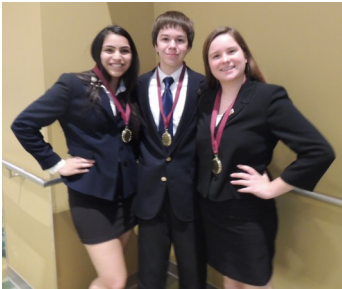

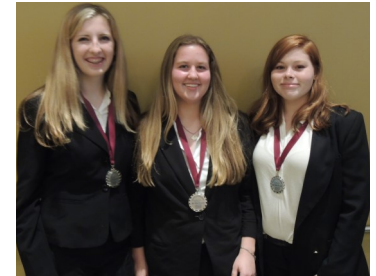

2014-2015 FLORIDA ENGINEERING SOCIETY HIGH SCHOOL GRADUATE SCHOLARSHIP APPLICATION

The Florida Engineering Society (FES) will grant (6) **\$2,500 scholarships** (one-time lump sum distribution) to graduating high school seniors who have a genuine interest in engineering and might need financial assistance. Many local chapters of the FES also issue scholarships. Please read the instructions carefully and fulfill all of the requirements. Should you have questions that your parent, guidance counselor, or principal cannot answer, please refer them to your local FES chapter representative using the information included in this package.

ELIGIBILITY REQUIREMENTS

- Be a high school senior.
- Have been enrolled in one semester and will graduate from a FL school.
- Be a citizen or permanent resident (green card holder) of the United States at the time of application.
- Have at least a 3.5 grade point average based on a 4.0 scale.
- Attain a minimum test score on the Scholastic Aptitude Test (SAT), or the American College Testing Program (ACT). The minimum scores, listed on page two are used as a minimum threshold level, with actual test scores being weighted into the scoring process.
- Enroll in an engineering program accredited by the Engineering Accreditation Commission of the Accreditation Board for Engineering and Technology (ABET).
- Certified transcript must be included with the application.
- Official IB, AICE & AP test score sheet must be included with the application.
- Complete Certification Sheet tab within excel application file.

NOTES TO THE APPLICANT

1. The initial judging will be made by the local FES Chapter Scholarship Committee on the basis of each candidate's high school record. Those selected will compete on the state level.
2. The courses you have taken and the credits earned for the 10th through first semester 12th grades will be used to help evaluate your application. All courses except physical education and drivers' education will be considered. You will be awarded supplemental credit for math, computer, natural science, and mechanical drawing courses, as well as honors, advanced placement, IB, and college level courses. For purposes of this application, college level courses are defined as those offered by university, college, or junior college for which special high school or college credit is earned by the applicant. You will be disqualified if a certified copy of your transcript is not submitted with the application.
All courses must be recorded by the applicant on Form B.
3. Scholarships are paid directly the college financial aid office. All scholarships are contingent upon your enrollment in an engineering program. The engineering program in which you enroll must be accredited by the national Engineering Accreditation Commission of the Accreditation Board for Engineering and Technology (ABET).
4. All applicants must intend to earn a degree in engineering and to enter the practice of engineering after graduation.
5. The announcement of all scholarship recipients will be made by May 2015.
6. Keep a copy of your completed application for future reference.
7. All applications must be submitted on a **FLASH/JUMP DRIVE**. **Please make sure that applications are submitted in Excel. PLEASE DO NOT CONVERT TO PDF.** (Note: Flash/jump drives will NOT be returned)
8. All applicants must provide copies of their ACT/SAT/AP/IB/AICE test scores as they are not always shown on your transcript.

RETURN APPLICATION

Application submittal deadline is **FEBRUARY 13, 2015**. Return the completed electronic application to your FES Chapter representative.

* Please note: Scholarship funds awarded through the FES/FEF Scholarship program are intended to be used solely to defray some of the costs associated with the pursuit of an engineering education/degree. For the FES/FEF Scholarship to be considered non-taxable to the recipient, the scholarship must be used to purchase tuition, fees, books, supplies, or equipment for your college courses.

Team Story

This is the 2nd year that Team "4 Girls" have competed in the HOSA competition. They chose a topic that they felt was important to all - **STRESS**. Stress knows no age. It affects all. Awareness is knowledge. With knowledge you can "keep calm and smile on" - Which is their goal for all.

The girls reached out to people of all ages from elementary age to senior citizens. They created a yoga presentation and have visited elementary school classrooms and the Dunedin Library teaching kids how to use Yoga to relieve stress. They even designed and printed a 16 page series of yoga cards that are held together by a book ring which is handed out to the class so the kids can continue to practice yoga on their own. They also wrote letters to elementary school teachers in our area and left a handful of the yoga guides for each teacher to use for their own classrooms.

Other activities "4 Girls 4 No Stress" have done include U tube yoga videos, and using Pet therapy as a stress reliever with visits to the Westchester Gardens Nursing Home. The girls also put together baskets of healthy stress-reducing snack bags that were distributed during exam week to Mrs. Zuelke's medical class and to the PHU Medical teachers. Since they found that writing can be very therapeutic in treating stress, the team is working to locate a group of women they can donate journals to that were designed by Traci Bild, a National speaker known for empowering women.

As Team 4 Girls 4 No Stress finishes each event, they place a smiley face sticker on each person's shirt and tell them to "Keep Calm and Smile On" with the reminder that "Life is always better when you smile".

The Pulse: What advice to you have for other medical students?

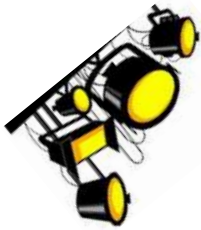
Nick: My biggest piece of advice is to take advantage of the opportunities CWMP has to offer and use those opportunities to find your passion in life.

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Office Procedures You Need To Know



Permission to Leave (PTL)

- A PTL gives the student permission to leave school early.
- Parents/guardians must provide their student with a note stating the date, time and reason for the PTL.
- Students must report to Mrs. Spicciati before the start of school at 7:05 a.m., to obtain a PTL
- Following the two steps listed above enables parents/guardians and students easy and timely pickups.
- Emergencies happen, however, due to staffing, and student schedules we cannot guarantee a timely response for picking up your student, please follow the above process when possible.

PTL for Illness

- Ill students must report directly to the clinic located in the Administration building.
- Clinic personnel will contact the parent/guardian.
- Students must sign clinic log and obtain a PTL to leave campus when they are ill.

Absences

- Must be reported to Mrs. Spicciati within 48 hours of the absence.
- For religious holidays, the absence must be reported in writing 48 hours prior to the holiday
- College day absences require a letter on the college's letterhead stating the dates of the college visit.

Phone Messages

- Only "Emergency" (such as death or accident) phone messages will be delivered to students.
- Students may use their cell phones before school, after school and during lunch only.

Deliveries – No deliveries please!

- Deliveries are not made to classrooms in order to not interrupt classroom instruction or testing.
- No flower, balloon or other deliveries are accepted.
