

We are beginning to see an increase in tardies from many of our students in the morning. Please remember students must be in their classrooms at 8:35AM each morning. Family vacations, heavy oversleeping and are considered unexcused tardies/absences. The most crucial learning hours of a school day are the morning hours, when students are most attentive. Students who are tardy miss the beginning of their morning classes, and they also cause a distraction when they arrive late to the classroom. Research shows that students who are frequently tardy have lower GPAs, lower scores on standardized assessments, and lower graduation rates. Chronic tardiness in elementary and middle school is also linked to failure in high school. The classroom experience is of unique value and cannot be duplicated by make-up work, so please take the time to familiarize yourself with the tardy and attendance policy posted in this newsletter. ## ATTENDANCE—IT IS THE LAW

School Board policy states that students have to attend school regularly. Where things get a bit confusing and unclear is when we start thinking about absences, tardies, and early sign-outs. Below is the policy in regards to student attendance.

To be counted as present for the school day, a student must be in attendance for at least one half of the day. Students must be in school unless the absence, tardy or early sign-out is excused.\*

To be **excused**, an absence, tardy, or early signout must meet one of the following criteria:

- A. The student is ill or injured.
- B. There is major illness in the immediate family (parents, siblings, grandparents living in the home)
- C. There is a death in the immediate family.
- D. The student attends religious instruction or there is a religious holiday in the student's own faith
- E. The student is required by summons, subpoena, or court order to appear in court. Document must be provided to principal.
- F. Special Events. The student must get permission from the principal at least five days prior to the absence.
- G. The student has a scheduled medical or dental appointment.
- H. Students having, or suspected of having, a communicable disease or infestation which can be transmitted are to be excluded from school and are not allowed to return to school until they no longer present a health hazard.

Absences due to illness needs to be called into our absence line 727-725-7972 X 2300.

A pattern of unexcused absences or tardies will be referred to our school's Child Study Team.

#### From the School Nurse

Many households at this time of the year are a whirlwind of after-school activities, sleepovers, field trips, and visits to the grocery store. Managing such a busy schedule is no easy task and can seem even more difficult if someone in your house gets the flu. That's why it's important that you consider having your entire household vaccinated against influenza every year.

Now is the time to protect your family with a seasonal influenza vaccination. You can make an appointment with your health-care provider or go to the Pinellas County Department of Health.

Influenza is a serious, contagious respiratory illness. Each year, approximately 5-20 percent of U.S. residents get the flu - or 16 to 63 million people. Each year in the U.S., on average, influenza and its related complications result in approximately 226,000 hospitalizations. Depending on virus severity during the influenza season, deaths can range from 3,000 to a high of about 49,000 people. Flu season in the U.S. can begin as early as October, usually peaks around January and February, but may not until as late as May.

Talk to your children and caregivers about the importance of washing your hands. While alcohol based sanitizers are convenient, they do not work against many microbes our families are being exposed to. Nothing replaces the use of soap, water and good lather. Hand washing is like a "do-itvourself" vaccine—it involves five simple and effective steps (think Wet, Lather, Scrub, Rinse, Dry) you can take to reduce the spread of diarrheal and respiratory illness so you can stay healthy. Regular hand washing, particularly before and after certain activities, is one of the best ways to remove germs, avoid getting sick, and prevent the spread of germs to others. Please see the attached sheets on how to be better prepared to prevent and handle any illness that may come your way.

Pinellas County Schools require children to be fever free for 24 hours without the use of fever-reducing medications before returning to school after an illness.

Let's all have a healthy year!

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Handwashing is an easy, inexpensive, and effective way to prevent the spread of germs and keep people healthy.

For kids, washing hands can be a fun and entertaining activity. It is simple enough for even very young children to understand. Handwashing gives children and adults a chance to take an active role in their own health. Once kids learn how to properly wash their hands, they can—and often do—show their parents and siblings and encourage them to wash hands, too.

Parents can help keep their families healthy by:

- Teaching them good handwashing technique
- Reminding their kids to wash their hands
- · Washing their own hands with their kids



- Handwashing education in the community:
  - » Reduces the number of people who get sick with diarrhea by 31%
  - » Reduces diarrheal illness in people with weakened immune systems by 58%
  - » Reduces respiratory illnesses, like colds, in the general population by 21%

## **Saving Time and Money**

- Handwashing is one of the best ways to avoid getting sick and spreading illness to others.
- Reducing illness increases productivity due to:
  - » Less time spent at the doctor's office
  - » More time spent at work or school

## **Helping Families Thrive**

Children who have been taught handwashing at school bring that knowledge home to parents and siblings. This can help family members get sick less often and miss less work and school.

Despite widespread knowledge of the importance of handwashing, there is still room for improvement. A recent study showed that only 31% of men and 65% of women washed their hands after using a public restroom.



## School Health Guidelines for Exclusion

If you think that your child has an illness that can be spread to others, please keep him or her home from school. Contact your health care provider for further assistance.

School Health Services 727-588-6320.

School Exclusion List indicates for which illnesses a child must be excluded from, or kept out of, school.

It also indicates when medical notes are necessary for children to return to school after certain illnesses.

## Exclusion Criteria Based Upon Sign and Symptoms

#### Fever

Exclude if oral temp is 101 or above, or if axillary/tympanic temp is greater than 100. Must be fever-free for 24 hours without the use of fever-reducing medication before returning.

#### Vomiting

Exclude if vomiting 2 or more times in 24-hour period. Exclude for the following day unless vomiting is known to be caused by a condition that is not contagious.

#### Diarrhea

Exclude if two or more loose stools in 24-hour period. Return to school when 24 hours pass without diarrheal stool.

Diarrhea with blood or mucous Exclude with 1 or more loose stools with blood or mucous.

Localized skin infection
Exclude from contact sports, Exclude from school only if lesion cannot be covered until

Generalized rash of unknown origin Exclude until rash is resolved or medical clearance is given.

#### A Quick Reference Guide for Parents

- Please keep your child home from school if he or she has one of the conditions or illnesses listed below.
- Report your child's absence to their school and consult their healthcare provider.
- Most of the conditions and illnesses are reportable to the Health Department during outbreaks only. Illnesses noted (\*) are reportable for single cases

#### Conjunctivitis (Pink-eye)

Children who have pink or red eyes with white or yellow discharge- often with matted eyelids after sleep and eye pain or redness of the eyelids or skin surrounding the eye may have Purulent Conjunctivitis. They should be excluded from school while symptomatic or until 24 hours after antibiotic treatment. A medical note is required to return to school.

Children with pink eyes who have a clear, watery discharge without fever, eye pain, or eyelid redness do not need to be kept home.

#### Fifth Disease (Erythema infectiosum)

The primary symptom of this illness is a rash, characterized by "slapped face" appearance and there is no specified exclusion for cases. Pregnant women and immune-compromised persons should seek medical advice.

#### Head Lice

Children should be excluded from school if they are experiencing head scratching and live lice or nits are present. The parent must bring the child to be examined in order to return to school.

#### Hepatitis A\*

Children should be excluded until one week after the onset of jaundice or illness.

#### Influenza-Like-Illness

Children with fever, cough and/or sore throat should be excluded until symptoms resolved.

#### Measles\*

Children with fever, reddened eyes, runny nose, cough, dusky-red blotchy rash on day 3 or 4, should be excluded until 4 days after onset of rash.

#### Meningitis\*

Bacterial/Viral - Children experiencing high fever, headache, and stiff neck should be excluded until recovered. \*Bacterial Meningitis is Immediately reportable to Health Department.

#### Mononucleosis

Exclusion recommended until a medical note to return to school and/or resume physical activities is required.

#### Mumps\*

**Initially excluded.** Children may return 5 days after the onset of parotid gland swelling.

#### Pertussis\*

Children should be excluded until 5 days of appropriate antibiotic therapy, with a note from the healthcare provider.

#### Rubella (German Measles)\*

Initially excluded. Child should remain at home until 6 days after onset of rash, with a note from the healthcare provider.

#### Scabies

Children with this condition should remain out of school until 24 hours after application of appropriate scabicidal treatment has been completed.

Staphylococcal or streptococcal skin infections. (includes MRSA)

Exclude children from school whose lesions cannot be covered. If lesion can be covered exclude from contact sports only. Impetigo- May return 24 hours after treatment started, but areas/sores must remain covered.

Streptococcal pharyngitis (strep throat)
Children can return to school 24 hours after starting antibiotic treatment if there is no fever.

Tinea Capitis (Ringworm of the scalp)
Children must be excluded from school until an oral antifungal treatment is initiated.

Tinea Corporis (Ringworm of the body)
Children should be excluded from school until
an oral or topical antifungal treatment is
initiated, unless the affected area can be
completely covered.

#### Tuberculosis\*

Children with this condition must be excluded from school until the local health department and treating physicial state that the student is noninfectious.

#### Varicella (Chickenpox)\*

Children should be excluded from school until all lesions have dried and crusted (usually 7 days/1 week after the onset of the rash).

#### Varicella Herpes Zoster (Shingles)

Keep children home who have lesions/sores/blisters that cannot be covered. Child may return to school once all lesions are dried/crusted.
