REPORTING YOUR CHILD'S ABSENCES

Per school board policy it is required that parents report ALL student absences to the school. It is imperative that we keep accurate records of student absences.

ALL absences **MUST** be reported to Mrs. Cerda the school DMT. Absences may be reported through the <u>"Report Student Absence"</u> link on the school website, <u>email cerdak@pcsb.org</u> or

<u>call 727-298-2788 ext. 2007</u>

When reporting your student's absence, please make sure to include the following information:

- Student's full legal name and DOB
- Homeroom Teacher
- Date of the absence
- Reason for absence
- Any doctor notes should be brought in upon the students return to school.

School Board Policy 5500.05 Parents and students must do the following in connection with school attendance: A. Ensure the attendance of a child of compulsory school attendance age, as required by law. (F.S. 1003.24)B. Notify school personnel of their child's absence prior to the end of the school day of the absence, if possible and provide written notification within 48 hours of the child's return to school. Otherwise, the absence will be unexcused.C. If requested, provide documentation of illness from a physician or public health unit within 48 hours. The maximum number of days that a student may be absent without acceptable documentation justifying the absence is 5.
