

A document that shows a student's academic record; includes current schedule, courses attempted and grades, credits earned, their weighted and unweighted GPA, and test scores for graduation required testing ONLY.

What you earn when you successfully complete a course. Semester (½ year classes) earn 0.5 credit, a full year class earns 1 credit. Credits are only earned when you <u>pass</u> a course with a D or higher.

Review of Important High School Terms



GPA

Grade Point Average; the average of all the grades you've earned in school – semester and full year grades only. 4.0 is the highest unweighted GPA you can earn, and a 5.0 is the highest weighted GPA you can earn.




Quality Points

Quality Points are used to determine a student's weighted GPA. Because Honors, Pre-AICE, AICE, AP, and Dual Enrollment are more rigorous than regular classes, they are weighted heavier in regard to the student's GPA.

Dual Enrollment credit, Pass an AICE/AP exam, Industry Certification

The Cambridge program is the program we use for most of our accelerated courses. These courses are titled "AICE" courses. Any student can take an AICE course. Florida colleges love Cambridge Diplomas. For a student to earn a Cambridge Diploma, they have to pass 7 AICE Exams, one from 4 different groupings, including Global Perspectives within 3 years.

Students will choose an acceleration credit that will be their goal to accomplish by the end of high school. This is a district expectation to ensure all of our students are college/career ready.

HOPE WAIVER INFORMATION

Interscholastic Extracurricular Sports: This form can only be used by performing student athletes who have participated in two (2) full seasons of junior varsity or varsity level sports. Interscholastic extracurricular sports are interpreted as those adopted by the School Board of Pinellas County and approved by the Florida High School Activities Association. No other sport, intramural, intermurals, or extracurricular activities can be used in this request. The approved qualifying activities are as follows: Two full seasons in one sport or one full season in two different sports will satisfy this requirement.

Full Season: A full season (in the sport) is defined as attendance and participation in both the practices and competitive events from the allowable first day of practice to the elimination of a team from FHSAA tournament competition. Ninety-five percent attendance at both practices and events will be required to meet this requirement. The high school coaches must verify that the student has met these guidelines. There will be <u>no exceptions</u> to these guidelines, as this is a substitute for state required courses for graduation. Non-participation or non-attendance, <u>for any reason</u> (vacations, injuries, illness, etc.) will be calculated in meeting the requirements, as set above.

1500440	MARCHING BAND WAIVER (One semester of marching band with a grade of "C" or better waives the .5 credit requirement of a physical education elective. The student must still earn 0.5 credits in Personal Fitness to complete the requirement.)	½ of PE elective, this student must complete Personal Fitness to meet state requirements (used instead of the HOPE requirement)
1500445	DANCE CLASS WAIVER (One semester of a dance class waives the .5 credit requirement of a physical education activity elective. What does it mean to be "On Track?"

- For Graduation: Attending school daily <u>AND</u> no Fs in any core classes for your final semester grades. 2.0+ GPA
- For 4-Year College: Attending school daily <u>AND</u> no Cs, Ds, or Fs in any core classes for your final semester grades. 3.0+ GPA
- Students who are "on track" are more likely to meet their post-secondary school goals!

WHAT IF MY STUDENT GETS "OFF TRACK"?

If a student earns a D or F for a semester grade, they are able to retake the course through our credit recovery program, Edmentum. The grade they earn in Edmentum will grade forgive the D/F. This means the new grade will be calculated into their GPA and the D/F will not be used. This will cause their GPA to increase. However, the D/F will still appear on their transcript, along with the new grade.

We offer credit recovery sessions after school Mondays and Tuesdays in the Media Center. There is a parent permission form that they will need to bring the first time they attend. They can get this form from their counselor or from Mrs. Priddy in room 25-05.

The credit recovery Edmentum program also runs during Summer Bridge.

Students who fail Algebra 1 will need to register for the Algebra 1 Credit

Recovery Program during Summer Bridge. This course is not available in

Edmentum.

How can I help my child stay on track?

- ❖ Attend classes daily
- * Check **FOCUS** on a regular basis!
 - > On FOCUS, you can get see your student's schedule & teachers, current grades with breakdown of assignments, course history grades, attendance, behavior referrals, etc.
 - If you do not know your log in/password: pcsb.org/families/ parent ID and password
- Most teachers post assignments/notes/class information on FOCUS or CANVAS Encourage your student to communicate with teachers. Parents and Students can communicate with teachers through FOCUS messenger or email.
- Make sure you are receiving school emails for important announcements and weekly progress reports.
- Tutoring is available Tuesdays and Thursdays 2:00pm-4:00pm in the Media Center.
- Encourage your student to get involved!

Keep Your Child On Track in Middle and High School

Showing up for school has a huge impact on a student's academic success starting in kindergarten and continuing through high school. Even as children grow older and more independent, families play a key role in making sure students get to school safely every day and understand why attendance is so important for success in school and on the job.

DID YOU KNOW?

- . Students should miss no more than 9 days of school each year to stay engaged, successful and on track to graduation.
- Absences can be a sign that a student is losing interest in school, struggling with school work, dealing with a bully or facing some other potentially serious difficulty.
- . By 6th grade, absenteeism is one of three signs that a student may drop out of high school.
- · By 9th grade, regular and high attendance is a better predictor of graduation rates than 8th grade test scores.
- . Missing 10 percent, or about 18 days, of the school year can drastically affect a student's academic success.
- . Students can be chronically absent even if they only miss a day or two every few weeks.
- . Attendance is an important life skill that will help your child graduate from college and keep a job.

WHATYOU CAN DO

Make school attendance a priority

- . Talk about the importance of showing up to school everyday, make that the expectation.
- . Help your child maintain daily routines, such as finishing homework and getting a good night's sleep.
- . Try not to schedule dental and medical appointments during the school day.
- . Don't let your child stay home unless truly sick. Complaints of headaches or stomach aches may be signs of anxiety.

Help your teen stay engaged

- Find out if your child feels engaged by his classes and feels safe from bullies and
 other threats. Make sure he/she is not missing class because of behavioral issues
 and school discipline policies. If any of these are problems, work with your school.

 Stay on top of academic progress and seek help from teachers or tutors if
- Stay on top of your child's social contacts. Peer pressure can lead to skipping school, while students without many friends can feel isolated.
- . Encourage meaningful afterschool activities, including sports and clubs.


