The program serves **99** schools in Pinellas County including eligible students in **39** non-public schools.


The Title I goal is that **every** student achieves **high** levels of academic proficiency.





Middle School and High School **Dress Code**

Tops	1. Clothing must cover the body from one armpit across to the other armpit and down to mid-thigh. 2. All tops must have sleeves and cover the entire shoulder. 3. See-through, revealing, or mesh garments must not be worn without appropriate coverage underneath
Bottoms	1. Form fitting leotard/spandex type clothing is not allowed unless proper outer garments cover to mid-thigh length or longer. 2. Rips. holes, or tears in clothing must be below mid-thigh.
Footwear	Students must wear shoes that are safe and appropriate for the learning environment. Inappropriate footwear includes, but is not limited to, roller skates, skate shoes, and bedroom slippers. No Student will be allowed to wear Croes.
Outerwear	1. Head gear, including but not limited to, hoods, caps, hats, bandanas, sweatbands and/or sunglasses shall not be worn indoors on campus 2. Hoodie sweatshirts are allowed; however, the hood must remain off the scholar's head at all times.



This policy adheres to Pinellas County Schools' Code of Conduct, Section 5 (5500.04). Each school reserves the right to determine what appropriate dress is for the school as detailed by the minimum standards.



ELECTRONICS POLICY

Consequences


The use of electronic devices including headphones, earbuds, smart watches or any other device used for two-way communication during the school day.

1st Offense – Warning

2nd Offense – Confiscation of Device, immediate call for device pick-up

3rd Offense – Referral, parent conference, parent device pick-up.

Subsequent Offenses – Referral, Device plan, Device ban, ISS, OSS

CELL PHONE POLICY

Students, please keep your devices on silent or off during instructional time within all class periods & transitions. You may use your device before, after the school day & during lunch. When allowed, all wireless devices, headphones, earbuds, or other listening accessories are restricted to minimal volume only to be heard by its user.

SMARTWATCHES
