



## TITLE I SUPPLEMENTAL RESOURCES

A variety of supplemental teaching materials, equipment, and technology

Definition: provided in addition to what is already present or available to complete or enhance it.

#### Title I Programs Provide Supplemental Support



Supplemental Resource	Positive Impact
MTSS COACH	Provides multi-tiered system of supports (MTSS) coaching to help teachers identify and address academic and behavioral needs of all students, ensuring early interventions and data-driven practices.
Teacher Common Planning	Funds used to provide teachers with scheduled time and coverage for collaborative planning sessions to analyze data, align instruction to standards, and create targeted interventions.
Communications	Supports purchase of student agendas to improve home-school communication, helping families stay informed about student assignments, events, and academic expectations.
Intervention Instructional Materials	Purchases of high-quality instructional materials, such as leveled readers, manipulatives, and digital resources, to support small-group instruction and targeted interventions for struggling students.
