Gifts/Donation Policy:

Schools reserve the right to accept or deny all Library Media material donations and gifts. Any donations must be reviewed by a certified Library Media Technology Specialist before the materials can be made available and accessible to students. This should be communicated to all donors.

Inventory and Weeding Process:

Annually, by the last day of the school year, each school will complete an inventory of all physical library materials. The removal or discontinuance of school Library Media materials and resources, through a process called weeding, is determined by a continuous review of the existing collection, both print and digital. In the removal process, many factors are taken into consideration including, but not limited to, space constraints, time-sensitivity of material, physical condition of the material, and circulation data. The certified Library Media Technology Specialist is responsible for the periodic removal or weeding of Library Media materials. Information and training regarding the weeding process and best practices will be provided annually and as needed by the Program Coordinator of Library Media.

COLLABORATION AND OUTREACH

Date of Most Recent Stakeholder Survey: August 7, 2025

Summary Statement of Stakeholder Survey Data:

The annual stakeholder survey included responses from 72 respondents, including 33% Teachers/Administrators, 65% Parents, and 1% of students. The responses reflect a strong desire for a diverse and inclusive school library collection that caters to both students and teachers. Popular genres include young adult fiction, fantasy, dystopian novels, and teen-focused series like *Harry Potter*, *Warrior Cats*, and *Redwall*. There's significant interest in educational and career-oriented materials such as test prep for ASVAB, SAT, ACT, and CLT, as well as books on leadership, coding, video game development, and computer science. Many respondents advocate for historical and political content, including biographies, civil discourse, and uncensored accounts of U.S. history. Health and wellness topics, emotional support resources, and self-improvement books are also valued. Several contributors emphasize the importance of freedom to read, opposing book bans and supporting access to controversial or challenging material. Additional suggestions include graphic novels, poetry, cookbooks, animal care books, Spanish language readers, and motivational literature. Overall, the feedback highlights a commitment to providing students with engaging, thought-provoking, and relevant reading options that support both academic growth and personal development.
