Industry Certification

What is Industry Certification?

Industry certification is earned by a person to assure qualifications have been met to perform a job or task. Most certification programs are created, sponsored, or affiliated with professional associations, trade organizations, or IT vendors (i.e. Microsoft) interested in raising standards. These certifications must be renewed periodically or may be valid for a specific period of time. Due to changing employment and increased ever-changing technology requirements, industry certification provides an impartial, third-party endorsement of a person's professional knowledge and experience and is often recognized across the country. Certifications are usually earned from a professional society or educational institute, not the government. demonstration of ability or knowledge is required by law before being allowed to perform a task or job, it is referred to as licensure by state agencies. Licensure may or may not be accepted across state lines therefore, individuals may have to retest for licensure when applying for positions in different states.

Industry Certifications

- All 6 BETA Pathways have one or more Industry Certifications attached to the course progression
- It is the expectation that ALL BETA scholars graduate with 1 of more Industry Certifications
- All IC testing will begin at the end of semester 1 of each year and take place on a monthly basis each month thereafter.
- Once scholars have met the criteria (passing 3 practice test) they will sign up through their teacher to sit for an upcoming IC test
- All test will be held at school on a designated day and period. Scholars that have signed up through their teacher will be given a pass to report to their testing room during the designated period.
- Scholars will be notified of their results as soon as the test is completed



State University Systems

Admission to Florida's public universities is competitive.

Prospective students should complete rigorous curriculum in high school.

To qualify to enter one of Florida's public universities, a first-time-in-college student must meet the following minimum requirements:

- · High School graduation with a standard diploma
- Admission test scores
- 16 credits of approved college preparatory academic courses
- 4 English (3 with substantial writing)
- 4 Math (Algebra I level and above)
- 3 Natural Science (2 with substantial lab)
- 3 Social Science
- 2 World Language (sequential, in the same language)
- 2 approved electives

Other Post-Secondary Options

The Florida College System

- Includes 28 state colleges (EXAMPLE: Saint Petersburg College)
- Offers career-related certificates, 2-year associate degrees that prepare students to transfer to a bachelor's degree program or to enter jobs requiring specific skills
- Many offer baccalaureate degrees in high-demand fields
- Open door policy—students who earn a standard high school diploma or equivalency or have demonstrated success in postsecondary coursework will be admitted to an associate degree program

Career & Technical Centers

- Florida offers 48 accredited career & tech centers (EXAMPLE: Pinellas Technical College)
- Provide the education & certification necessary to work in a particular career or tech field
- Programs are flexible & provide industry-specific education & training for a wide variety of occupations



- Each college needs you to complete common questions (personal information). Beyond that their applications vary. Each college can determine their unique requirements for:
- Deadlines
- Application Fees
- Personal Essay
- Courses & Grades
- Test Policy
- Portfolio
- Writing Supplements
- Recommendations

Where to Begin

- Find out HOW to apply to the college
 - <u>Common Application</u>-Most popular. Fill out personal information once and supplemental information for each college.
 - Institutional Application-apply through institution
- Organize/track application requirements and deadlines!




Types of Deadlines

- Register with and Create a Common App Account at CommonApp.org
- On Common App:
 - Add High School Information
 - Add at least one college
 - Review and Accept FERPA Release Authorization
- Match your Common App account to Naviance
- Add any non-Common App colleges to Naviance "Colleges I'm Applying To" list
- Select application method and deadline for all non-Common App colleges
- Request materials for college applications in Naviance
 - Transcripts
 - Letters of Recommendation- ONLY for colleges that request it



Request Letters of Recommendation

- 1.Go to Colleges > Letters of Recommendation
- 2. Select Add Request on top right
- 3. Select a Teacher
- 4. Select which colleges the request is for
- 5. Include a personal note
- 6. Select Submit Request

Tracking letters of Recommendation

- Go to Colleges
- Select Letters of Recommendation
- Check the Status column to review when a teacher has submitted a LOR
- **ONLY Request LOR from teachers/counselor if the college requests it** Will be indicated in Naviance for each college.



Track Submission Status in Naviance

- 1. Go to Colleges I'm Applying To List
- 2. Check the **Transcript column** to review when a counselor has submitted a transcript
 - The transcript column will say 'sent' if the transcript has been sent
- 3. Check the **Office Materials column** to review when a staff member has indicated that all materials have been sent for that application.
 - The Office Materials column will say 'submitted' if transcripts and any other required materials, like Common App forms or other schoolspecific forms, have been sent

Florida Bright Futures Scholarships

- Awarded to every student in the state of Florida who meets the eligibility requirements.
- Offers three different award levels
 - Academic, Medallion, Gold Seal Vocational
- General requirements for all levels
- Each scholarship also has specific criteria that must be met

Initial Eligibility Requirements

- 1. Submit the Florida Financial Aid Application (FFAA) no later than August 31 after high school graduation
- 2. Complete the 16 college-preparatory courses required for admission to a state university
- 3. Achieve the required weighted GPA in the 16 collegepreparatory courses
- 4. Complete the required number of service/work hours
- 5. Achieve the required composite ACT® or combined SAT® score

Paid Work

- Paid Work Hours Needed:
- Florida Academic Scholarship 100 hours
- Florida Medallion Scholarship 100 hours
- Gold Seal CAPE 100 hours
- Gold Seal Vocational 100 hours
- Beginning with the class of 2023, students may now use work hours in lieu of service hours.
- Service and work hours <u>cannot</u> be combined.
- Both work and service hours must be completed with an agency, company, organization or business where they can be verified.
- Students must be in high school (summer before 9th grade is acceptable).

What Hours Cannot Count?

SERVICE HOURS

- Court mandated community service.
- Service hours where a family member is verifying the completed hours.
- An activity where there is no responsible adult on site to evaluate and confirm student performance.
- Donations, such as Locks of Love or giving blood.
- Participation on a sports team or a performance of any kind unless participation is considered an act of service.

WORK HOURS

 Work hours where a family member is verifying the completed hours.

- Submit your applications by the Early Action or Priority Application deadline for your best chance of acceptance.
- Confirm submissions are *complete* and follow up on next steps sent by colleges.
- Check your personal email and applicant portals often.
- Submit scholarship applications early & often!
- Submit the FAFSA early.
- Visit the College & Career Center for help.
