Acceptance Period: February 13-22, 2020 During the Acceptance Period, if you received an invitation to a school of your choice, you must go back into the Student Reservations System and accept it! Failure to do so will eliminate your child from that school.

Health Tips

Cold & flu season is in full swing, and that means a lot of infectious germs are all over the place. You and you family can help stop the spread of harmful germs by:

- 1. Washing hands thoroughly with soap & water. Hand washing is the number one method of reducing the spread of infectious germs & diseases! Encourage younger children to sing or hum Row, Row, Row Your Boat two times while scrubbing hands. ALWAYS wash after using the restroom, after blowing or wiping your nose, after coming in contact with others who show signs of cold or illness, and after touching multiple surfaces.
- 2. Covering your nose & mouth with the crook of your elbow when sneezing or coughing. Teach children not to cough without covering, and not to wipe their noses with hands & fingers, or along their arms or sleeves.
- 3. Using and disposing tissues when blowing your nose. (Don't forget to wash your hands!)



- 4. Avoiding touching your eyes, nose and mouth with unwashed hands.
- 5. Avoiding close contact such as kissing, hugging, and sharing cups or eating utensils with people who are sick.
- Cleaning and disinfecting all frequentlytouched surfaced, such as toys and doorknobs. Increase the frequency if someone is sick.
- 7. Staying home when you have a fever, even a low-grade one. Keep the contagious period away from others to help stop illness from spreading.
- 8. Getting a flu shot. Contact your family doctor or the local health department to schedule an appointment.

Following these tips can help to slow the spread of many illnesses

- common cold, flu, enterovirus, and other pathogens that can lead to disease.

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Parents Make the Difference!

Make some New Year's Resolutions about reading this year:

 Make reading a part of everyday life. Set aside time when everyone in the house reads. (Reading social media doesn't count.) In addition to helping your child improve his/her reading, it will give you some much-needed guiet time.




- Keep reading aloud to your child. Bedtime is a natural time for reading aloud, but families find other ways to fit it into their schedule. You can read aloud while your child eats breakfast. Or have one person read while everyone else cleans up after dinner.
- Keep lots of reading material handy. The child that won't read a novel might pick up a magazine about a favorite hobby.
- Now that you have resolutions, here are some tips on making sure you can keep them. First, make a plan. Without a plan, you may want a daily reading time, but you may not find a way to fit it in.
- Next, track your progress. Mark the calendar for every day you read aloud.
 Then reward yourselves. Rent a video based on a favorite book. Or plan a trip to a bookstore café.

Getting Ready for the New Year:

As of January 7, 2020, students will be officially in the second half of this school year. In elementary, have you met with your child's teacher yet? For middle school, are you checking FOCUS weekly with your child to track assignments and grades? It is a great time of year to talk with your child about strengths and goals.

Of course, <u>reading every night</u> is still top on the list for helping children succeed at high levels!

Please know that in our IB school, teaching children how to express themselves in written form begins in kindergarten! Encourage your child to make the grocery list, write reminder notes, write letters to family members who are far away, create thank you cards for people who do nice things for them, etc. These activities help them make the connection that what they do at school helps them at home and in their personal lives. The MOST important thing is to encourage students to ALWAYS try their best! Especially on testing days, it will be VERY important for children to have a good night's sleep, eat a healthy breakfast, and arrive to school on time.



Internationally minded learners are:

Reflective



Being reflective means to thoughtfully consider the world and our own ideas and experiences.

Reflective individuals work to understand their strengths and weaknesses in order to support their learning and personal development.

Ways to be Reflective :

- Nurture a "growth mindset" attitude and understand that making mistakes are important and essential to the learning process.
- Stop to think about your progress and consider different ways to improve and grow in the future.
- Persevere and understand the power of revision and reflection
- Know and understand your strengths and weakness so you can act in ways that promote and support them.
- Think critically about your work, words and actions and be open to feedback from others.
- Consider different perspectives and understand how your thinking can impact others and the world around you.
- Manage your emotions and reactions mindfully

How can parents help to develop students who are Reflective at home?

- Take time to talk to your child every day, ask questions that probe them to think about their day
 for example "What challenges did you take today? How have you helped someone? or What did
 you smile about today?"
- Spend time reviewing their grades/report cards with them. Discuss it with them and truly consider their thoughts on their strengths and areas for improvement.
- Think and brainstorm academic and social goals for the next semester with your child. Make a list
 not only of the goals, but of specific actions that can be taken to achieve these goals. You might
 even want to list actions that your child will take independently as well as actions parents will take
 to support them.
- Consider non-academic strengths and areas for improvement... help your child be balanced and value their voice.

Take time this winter holiday to do some reflecting, by yourself, with your children and as a family.



College Scholarship Opportunity for 6-9 grade students!

Pinellas Education Foundation's Take Stock in Children Scholarship Program

Candidates must be on Free/Reduced Lunch, attend a Pinellas County public middle or high school, and have the aspiration to attend college or technical school but not the financial means.

Foundation Take Stock in Children scholars receive:

- A Scholarship A tuition-only Florida Prepaid College Scholarship, which can be used at any university, college, or vocational/technical school that accepts financial aid. (Value — up to 120 state college credit hours)
- A Mentor A volunteer mentor who will meet with your child bi-weekly at school, to assist and encourage your child to achieve their highest potential.
- A College Success Coach A Take Stock staff person who will help your child design a college success plan and guide them through middle and high school, and transition into college.
