Hello Sanderlin Sea Turtle Learning Community,

This school year continues to move along smoothly and our campus is very peaceful and focused on learning.

It is hard to believe that we will be wrapping up our first quarter of school soon. As we end the first quarter, parents should ask your children what their goals are before the end of the first marking period on Oct. 11th. What actions do they plan to take to keep up the great grades and/or improve grades? Is classwork and/or projects being completed by class deadlines? Are you reviewing agendas and signing nightly? Please emphasize effort above all else, as being able to persevere with tough tasks is a lifelong skill they will need!

We are very happy that most of our buses have been arriving by the first bell so there is plenty of time to eat breakfast and be seated in the classroom by the second bell. Bus students are never counted as late due to bus schedules. All others should be on campus well before the first bell at 8:50 a.m. in order to be seated in the classroom on time. Walkers, car riders, and bike riders must be at school for breakfast by 8:45 a.m. in order to have enough time to eat and arrive in class on time. Breakfast is FREE for all students at Sanderlin!

For parents dropping off and picking up in the car line, please make sure you are not blocking the drive in the morning before 8:25. If you are here very early, please park until 8:25 and then come through the car line. This will help parents who are dropping students off at R'Club or visitors who need to leave and get out of the parking lot. Additionally, the parking situation on 23rd St. in the afternoon has become a major safety hazard for our school. Signs will be placed on this street indicating that there is NO parking on 23rd St. Please note that the St. Petersburg Police Department will be out to enforce this new policy and will ticket vehicles not complying. I do understand that there is a wait for the car line but we are typically finished no later than 3:25. This measure is being developed to ensure that our students are safe at dismissal.



On Thursday, September 26th, any student without a current free and reduced application on file will change to <u>paid</u> status on Friday, September 27th. At this time, you will need to provide a lunch for your child or you may purchase school lunch at the following rates: Elementary = \$2.25; Middle = \$2.75.

- Federal regulations require a new application be submitted each school year.
- Free or reduced meals are not permitted without a processed application. This includes Food Stamps/TANF.
- Notification of status (free, reduced or paid) will be emailed or will be sent home with your child.

Lunch Policy

In keeping with the District's security procedures, our lunch policy for families to have lunch with their children remains the same as it was last year:

Level 2 volunteers can come any day of the week. You can choose to sit either at the designated table in the cafeteria (not on the R'Club side), or at one of the picnic tables outside of the cafeteria.

All other visitors may only come on Fridays. These visitors must be escorted to and from the cafeteria, and they may only sit at the designated table in the cafeteria (not on the R'Club side).

All visitors may only have lunch with their own child(ren).

All visitors may bring in a lunch for their child. Please adhere to District Policy on healthy lunch options: no cookies, cakes, cupcakes, candy, energy drinks, etc.

If you are celebrating a child's birthday, please

do not bring in balloons, teddy bears, flowers or other gifts. They will remain in the office until after school; it is preferred that you save these items for home.

This policy will be reviewed periodically throughout the school year and is subject to change. Any changes will be communicated with families.





Pinellas County's Policy on Bullying and Harassment

What is it?

In response to the Florida Statue 1006.147, Jeffrey Johnston Stand Up For All Students Act, Pinellas County School created a policy against all forms of bullying and harassment (5517.01). The policy defines bullying as systematically and chronically inflicting physical hurt or psychological distress on one or more students or employees, including cyberbullying. It further define it as unwanted and repeated written, verbal, or physical behavior, including any threatening, insulting, or dehumanizing gestures, by a student or adult, that is severe or pervasive enough to create an intimidating, hostile, or offensive educational environment; cause discomfort or humiliation; or unreasonably interfere with the individual's school performance or participation; and may involve but is not limited to: teasing, social exclusion, threat, intimidation, stalking, physical violence, theft, sexual, religious, or racial harassment, public or private humiliation, or destruction of property. Harassment is defined as any threatening, insulting or dehumanizing gesture, use of data or computer software, or written, verbal or physical conduct directed against a student or employee that: place a student or employee in reasonable fear or harm to his or her person or damage to his or her property, has the effect of substantially interfering with a student's educational performance, opportunities or benefits, or has the effect of substantially disrupting the orderly operation of a school.

What can I do about it?

So now that we know bullying and harassment are prohibited, what do we do if we encounter it? If you witness or are a victim to a bullying act, you need to report it right away. There are three ways you can report it. You can tell a trusted adult (teacher, administrator, or counselor), report it online, or call the Campus Crime Stoppers Hotline (1-800-873-8477 or text keyword TIP144 to 274637). We encourage you to report online because it is immediately received by your school's Bullying Investigation team. You can go to http://bullying.pcsb.org or http://harassment.pcsb.org to report an incident. You can also use your smart phone to send an anonymous report on our free app, Say Something. After a report is received, parents of the involved students are notified, and an investigation takes place. After the investigation, guilty parties may receive a consequence and/or a safety plan may be put in place for involved students. Lastly, parents will be notified of the outcome and steps taken to protect students.

How can I help?

Make sure your children know the difference between bullying, playing, and conflict. Remember, every incident isn't bullying - it's frequently a conflict with both sides involved. Additionally, you can help your children be prepared for an encounter with bullying behavior or a bullying situation by talking to them. Have them plan ahead what they will do and/or say if confronted by bullying behavior. Make sure they know they need to report the incident to a trusted adult and not keep quiet, and teach them to stand up when they see bullying happen to someone else!

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Students can do something too! - keep reporting until an adult listens and the bullying stops. Stand up to the person who is bullying if it is safe and then get away. Try different techniques like changing the subject, distracting, or using humor. Leave the problem area and stay away from the problem people. Stay with a group of friends or adult that will help you and remind yourself that no one deserves to be bullied. Remember, be more than a bystander. Don't laugh at someone who is being bullied. Tell them to stop and report the incident to an adult right away.
