
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Background on Advanced Placement®



Advanced Placement 8: The Basics

- AP® courses are college-level courses offered in high school
- Courses reflect what is taught in top introductory college courses
- Students take AP Exams at the end of the course to measure their mastery of college-level work
- A score of 3 or higher on an AP Exam can typically earn students college credit and/or placement into advanced courses in college





Our AP® Courses

- Arts: Art History
- English: English Language and Composition, English Literature and Composition
- History and Social Sciences: European History, Human Geography,
 Psychology, United States Government and Politics, United States History,
 World History, Microeconomics
- Mathematics and Computer Science: Calculus AB, Calculus BC, Statistics,
 Computer Science
- Sciences: Biology, Chemistry, Environmental Science, Physics
- World languages: Spanish Language and Culture



AP®: Skills & Advantages that Last a Lifetime

- Taking an AP course helps students build critical thinking skills, confidence, and the essential time management and study skills needed for college success.
- Nationally, research shows that students who score a 3
 or higher on an AP Exam typically earn higher grade
 point averages in college and have higher graduation
 rates than their non-AP peers.*

AP® Helps Students Graduate on Time & Save Money

Students who take AP courses and exams are much more likely to complete a college degree on time.* Graduating in four years represents a significant savings on the cost of college.

- Only 1 in 4 college students completes a bachelor's degree in 4 years.
- The average cost of college for a single year is \$21,500** for public colleges (in-state tuition, fees, room/board, misc. expenses).

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What is the AP Capstone Program?



Introducing - AP Capstone

APCapstone is an innovative program that allows students to engage in rigorous college-level study of the critical skills necessary for success in college. The Program of study includes a two-course sequence:

AP Seminar and AP Research

Emphasizes Critical Skills

- Considering multiple perspectives
- Careful evaluation of information
- Writing evidence-based arguments

Complements the in-depth subject-matter study in AP

- Identifying and solving problems
- Oral communication and defending an argument
- Collaboration and teamwork



AP Seminar – 11th Grade

Typically taken in grade 10 or 11.

Students learn how to:

- Investigate real-world topics from multiple perspectives
- Carefully analyze information, write evidence-based arguments and effectively communicate them
- Work independently and with a team to research a topic, develop a written report and deliver a presentation

Teachers & Students select and study 2-4 topics.

Exam score based on:

- Team Project & Presentation
 - 25%



- Individual Essay & Presentation
 - 35%
- Written Exam
 - 40%



AP Research – 12th Grade

Students learn how to:

- Design, plan, and conduct a year-long mentored, researchbased investigation
- Apply research methods and practices to address a real-world topic selected by the student
- Write a college-level research paper, present and orally defend the findings and research methodology

Exam score based on:

- Research Process
 - 15%



- 2. Academic Thesis Paper (~5,000 words)
 - 70%
- Public Presentation and Oral Defense
 - 15%

AP Seminar is a prerequisite to AP Research.




AP Capstone Program Model

A two-course sequence that provides students with the critical thinking and research skills needed to succeed in college and stand-out in the admission process

Students who earn scores of 3 or higher on the AP Seminar and AP Research Exams and on four additional AP Exams of their choosing will receive the **AP Capstone Diploma™**.



AP Research & Seminar Certificate[™]

Students who earn scores of 3 or higher on the AP Seminar and AP Research Exams only will receive the AP Seminar and Research Certificate™

AP[®] Capstone Exam Fees

- The exam fees for AP Seminar and AP Research are \$139 each.
- Assistance is available for eligible students with financial need:
 - The College Board offers exam fee reductions for eligible students with financial need.
 - Speak to the Guidance Counselor prior to AP testing.

11th Grade PSAT Information – Oct. 2015

About PSAT/NMSQT

- The Preliminary SAT/National Merit Scholarship Qualifying Test (PSAT/NMSQT) is a program cosponsored by the College Board and National Merit Scholarship Corporation (NMSC). It's a standardized test that provides firsthand practice for the SAT®. It also gives you a chance to enter NMSC scholarship programs and gain access to college and career planning tools.
- The PSAT/NMSQT measures critical reading skills, math problem-solving skills, and writing skills. You have developed these skills over many years, both in and out of school. This test does not require you to recall specific facts from your classes.



The most common reasons for taking the PSAT/NMSQT are to:

- Receive feedback on your strengths and weaknesses on skills necessary for college study, which allows you to focus your preparation on those areas that could most benefit from additional study or practice.
- See how your performance on an admissions test might compare with that of others applying to college.
- Enter the competition for scholarships from National Merit Scholarship Corporation.
- Become familiar with the kinds of questions and the exact directions you will see on the SAT.
- Receive information from colleges when you check "yes" to Student Search Service.



Scholarships & Recognition

By taking the PSAT/NMSQT, you may qualify to enter the competitions for prestigious scholarships and participate in recognition programs. As cosponsor of the PSAT/NMSQT, NMSC receives all students' scores.
