Why:

You are selected to be here because of your academic potential/abilities

What:

- Understanding PSAT, SATpractice.org, AP courses, Dual Enrollment courses, AP Capstone program, College Acceptance Requirements, and Bright Futures Scholarship Criteria
- Preparing for you to select the courses you will take in 18-19 and as a senior
- Preparing you for college/university readiness and acceptance

Scheduling Process/Timelines for 18-19:

- Visits to AP World History and World History Honors classes last week
- Administrators individually counsel all students who demonstrated AP potential (in one or more courses) 1/29 through 2/9
- Your current teachers should be reviewing their subject area course recommendations with you on 2/1 or 2/2
- 10th grade assembly for students with 2.4 or higher unweighted GPA on 1/24
- College and Career Evening on 1/24 from 6pm to 8pm plan to attend with your parents
- PERT (reading, writing, and math) for qualifying 10th graders on Tuesday, 1/30 you will be released to test in the AM or PM, one chance only
- 10th grade course selections, 2/12-2/16, in World History (along with Future Plans, transcript reviews, Grad check, Raise.me, Remind 101, Sophomore survey, and SAT practice.org)

PSAT and FREE Khan Academy SAT Preparation...

PSAT:

- Your PSAT results from October, 2017, are available online through your College Board account
- Your guidance counselor has your College Board access code if you do not have it
- Results will show your strengths and areas for growth
- The PSAT you took is redesign to prepare you for the new SAT
- 11th grade PSAT results are used for \$180,000,000 national scholarship opportunities

- Help you create (or access) your Khan Academy SATpractice.org prep account
- Log into College Board to access your PSAT results
- Link your PSAT results to SAT Khan Academy personalized learning will occur

AP Capstone Program...

AP Capstone was developed by the College Board, with guidance from some of the best universities in our country with a purpose of developing HS students who are ready to read, write, study, and research at the level that colleges and universities require

- Two year program you "sign up" for it simply by selecting the courses
 - AP Seminar Grade 10 or 11
 - AP Research Grade 11 or 12 (for students who took AP Seminar)
- Passing both exams = AP Capstone Seminar & Research Certificate
 Passing both exams + four other AP exams = AP Capstone Diploma

College and University Acceptance...

- Acceptance means...you apply and your "resume" determines whether or not you get accepted
- Colleges and universities look at your HS resume for:
 - What types of courses did he/she take; were they regular, honors, or AP/DE levels?
 - What kind of grades did he/she earn in those courses?
 - What is his/her unweighted and weighted cumulative GPA?
 - How did he/she score on the ACT and/or SAT (best combined scores)?
- You should plan to take the PSAT next fall and your first ACT and SAT in the spring of your junior year

¹ High school graduation year = the year in which the student graduated from high school. For example, a student who graduated between September 1, 2017 and August 31, 2018 graduated in the 2017-2018 academic year.

² Home-educated students who were unable to document a college-preparatory curriculum and wished to earn an FMS award, had to earn a 1070 SAT or 23 ACT prior to 2013-14; and earn a 1220 SAT or 27 ACT for 2013-14 and 2014-15. Beginning with the 2015-16 high school graduates, all home-educated students must earn an 1170 SAT or a 26 ACT for FMS and a 1290 SAT or 29 ACT for FAS award. High school transcripts are not required for home-educated students graduating 2015-16 and thereafter.

³ Extended hours of funding are available to FAS and FMS recipients in a single program of study requiring more than 120 hours.

⁴FAS & FMS scholars completing a baccalaureate degree in 2010-11 or later within 7 semesters (or equivalent hours) or fewer, may receive one term of graduate funding, up to 15 semester hours, paid at the undergraduate nate.

³ Beginning with the 2016-17 high school graduates, students who earn a Gold Seal CAPE (OSC) award and attain an AS or AAS degree may receive an additional 60 hours of funding toward a qualifying BS or BAS degree program.

*Exception to the maximum number of years to begin receiving funding is made for students who are active military or those engaged in a religious or service obligation.

⁷ For students graduating high school in 2010-11 and thereafter, if annual renewal requirements were not met due to a verifiable illness or other documented emergency (as reported by the postsecondary institution), an exception of one academic year to the renewal timeframe may be granted if a course of study is not completed after five academic years.
