

How Character & SEL Work Together

<p>The first section identifies and explains the different character strengths within four areas of character development:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">- Moral- Performance- Intellectual- Civic	<p>The second section identifies and explains the five areas of Social-Emotional Learning (SEL):</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none">- Self-awareness- Self-management- Social awareness- Interpersonal/relationship skills- Responsible & ethical decision-making

Developed by Dr. Arthur Schwartz, President, Character.org, the CSED Model Standards offer educators a way to incorporate these two very important instructional strategies as one.

In these challenging times, educators are looking for a way to blend Character & SEL into their everyday curriculum. The Model Standards do just that. They are there for you to use and easy to seamlessly incorporate at any grade level K-12.

Character is said to be the product of core values, critical thinking, service to others, growth mindset, modeling, and much more. Social & Emotional Learning competencies of Self Awareness, Self Management, Social Awareness, Social Management and Responsible Decision Making, are the building blocks that support moral, performance, civic and intellectual character.

Students learn how to care about the core values using social and emotional skills such as empathy or kindness. They reflect on core values that may contribute to behavior. Behavior can be a reflection of one's social skills that can build character.
