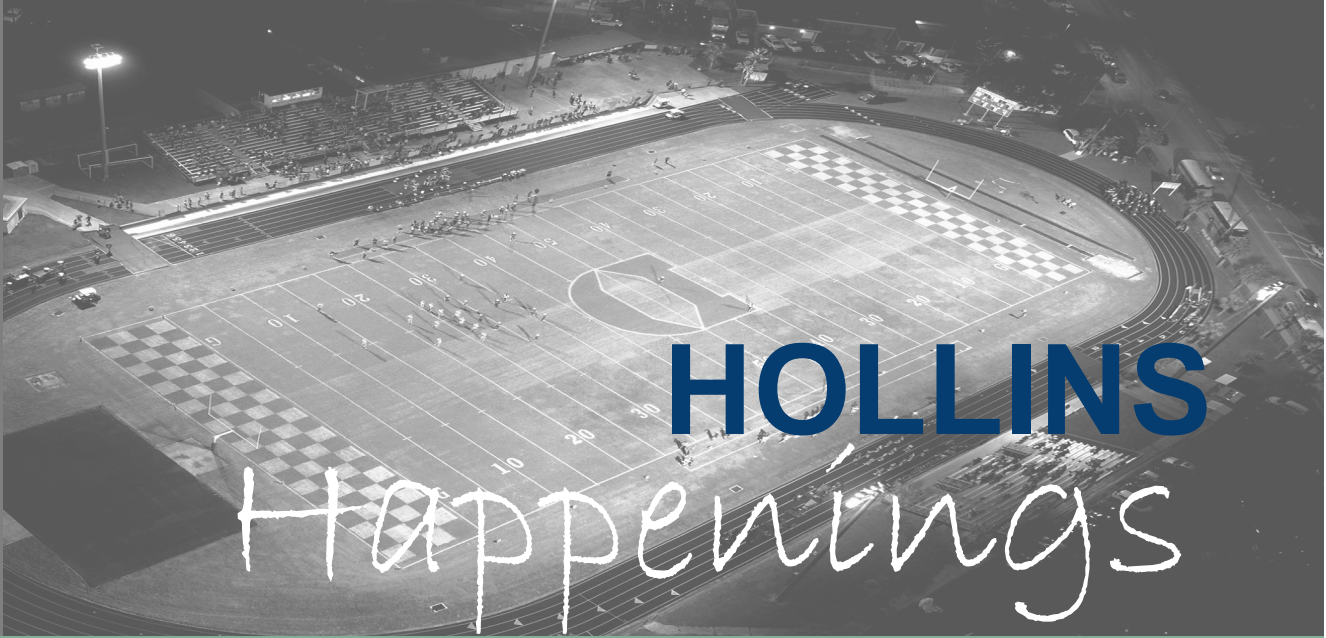

A.E.A. Spotlight

The AEA Program is a combination of an arts program and a technology program, providing a creative outlet for students in which they can earn certifications for a career in the entertainment industry. The Academy of Entertainment arts offers tech utilized classes such as 3D Animation, Motion design, Digital music production, Special Effects, Film and more advanced motion design and art classes, including AICE photography. Each of the individual classes have their own studios and space with professional production equipment used for a variety of projects.

In Game Design, the upper level students are working on multiple games as part of a collaborative project with the Anarchy Animation Studio. The Anarchy Animation classes are beginning to explore motion design as it relates to business and advertising with introduction of motion tweening.

Meanwhile, in Revolution Music Studio, level 1 students have learned to create simple beats while level 2 students are learning ways to make more sophisticated tracks. Upper level music production students have already completed their first demo of music they are creating for The Show, which will take place in May.

Additionally, in the New Rebellion Film Studio, students are practicing the real-world skill of precision editing and redrafting. This includes development of 30-second commercials, current event-driven allegorical films, and the world of horror.

The Academy offers another production class in which students can develop a passion or idea into a brand, and then make a business or organization around that brand. Brand U is all about teaching students to encode and decode messages in order to market their brand to a target audience. This year, with our new Brand U teacher, Mr. Trevor Anderson, Brand U students are learning and practicing techniques for producing original content to market and advertise on different sources of media such as blogs, podcasts, and videos.

Despite adjustment challenges in the 2020-2021 school year, AEA students are already adapting well as Dr. Stefanic, states, "AEA teachers are excited about the early progress and the many small wins we have seen over the first several weeks of school." All of the academy teachers have a plan in place for their students and will continue to strive to keep an innovative and creative environment for an exciting year of production.



CAMBRIDGE *Spotlight*

Greetings from the Cambridge Program,

Hollins High School is proud to be in its 9th successful year of the program with students engaging in international curriculum, earning college credits, and working towards the Cambridge International Diploma. The Advance International Certificate of Education (AICE), offers students one of the most demanding and rigorous college preparatory programs in the world. After completing at least one course in each of three of the academic areas, students have the flexibility to choose a course of study that best meets their abilities and interests.

Students earning the AICE Diploma, by passing 7 exams, currently qualify for the maximum Florida Academic Scholars tuition scholarship, and students completing the curriculum (without earning the diploma) can earn the Florida Medallion Scholars tuition award. Students have the option of taking AICE courses to earn college credits without applying for the AICE Diploma.

Students accepted into the Cambridge Program at Hollins High School have the opportunity to take courses in the other District Application Programs, the Academy of Entertainment Arts, exclusive to Hollins HS, and the Culinary Arts Academy.

This past Spring, 37 out of the 37 seniors who worked toward the AICE Diploma earned it.

Here's what a former and two current Cambridge students had to say...

"Honestly I wasn't the best student in class I always slept but because I was a good test taker and could show I understood the material, my teachers overlooked the sleeping for the most part. Getting so many college credits in high school really gave me a leg up. I'm able to take fewer classes in the fall when it's so much going on with campus life and not worry about being behind and catch up in Spring when it's not as much to do. Being in AVID helped me understand how much college really cost and how to balance my schedule when I got to campus. I wasn't sure if I wanted to go to FAMU at first but the college tours really helped me solidify my decision and I couldn't be more proud of where I attend. While I couldn't stand AICE Global Perspectives, it really does help with public speaking and working as a team and gave me research skills that makes writing papers a breeze not to mention many students in college don't know proper PowerPoint which is something Mrs. Benjamin made sure we perfected." - Class Clown 2019 Ericka Stewart

I am a senior at Hollins High School. I have been in the Cambridge program for 3 years. As a Cambridge student, AICE classes are challenging and sometimes it leaves me with an overwhelmed feeling. I often think that I cannot handle AICE classes and feel like I'm about to give up. Thankfully, to my counselor, teachers and friends who always stay there to support me, I was able to overcome those challenges. After taking many AICE classes, I think they are not that tough as long as you always try your best, you will likely succeed in those classes. Also, those AICE classes can help you to prepare for college courses and life. You will likely face many more challenges later on in your life, so these classes would be a good choice for you to challenge yourself and get out of your comfort zone. From my experience, hard classes actually helped me to improve and grow more as a person. For students who are thinking about taking AICE classes, my advice would be "Yes, you should take it. I am not enrolled in the Cambridge program, however, I have taken several AICE classes in the past, and I am currently taking three AICE classes right now, so I can get my AICE Diploma by the end of my senior year. Here are my thoughts and what I have experienced about Cambridge and the AICE classes.

For starters, I believe Cambridge is a great program and opportunity for high school students who are willing to get college credits while they are in high school. By taking AICE classes and passing the AICE exams, I can be awarded up to 45 hours of college credits at all public colleges and universities in Florida, which can save me a lot of money if I am planning on attending college. Additionally, earning the AICE Diploma will allow me to qualify for the Florida Academic Scholars scholarship with the completion of community service hours. But there are some moments when I feel overwhelmed and stressed due to the amount of work I have to finish. Nevertheless, I think that if I work hard and put in my best effort, it will be worth it in the end since these AICE classes are designed to help me prepare for college and get a sense of the difficulties of taking college classes. AICE provides me with numerous useful skills and knowledge required to be successful in college, workplace, and life. For instance, AICE Global helps to strengthen my skills and become a scholarly researcher by improving my critical analysis/thinking skills, reflection on issues of global significance, communication, and collaborative skills. The Culinary Academy has a lot to celebrate this year. A brand new walk in cooler/freezer was installed. Previously, the program only had two reach in coolers which eliminated most of their catering opportunities and limited the number of projects they could work on because they simply didn't have the storage space. Less catering opportunities means less funding for the program.

Now, with the addition of the new walk-in which provides a ton more space, the program will have the opportunity to cater functions on and off campus as well as do more fundraising.

Plans for the installation of the new walk-in have been in the works since last year. A huge hole was cut in to the exterior wall of the kitchen in May to start the process, but the hole remained boarded up until the freezer finally arrived on September 16th. Most of the installation was completed in about a week's time, but there are a few finishing touches that still need to be done but should happen soon.

The new walk-in was no small purchase. The Career and Technical Education Department funded the whopping \$100,000 project.

Hollins High School's AVID program has essentially been the much-needed guide to keep high school students on track, striving for personal development and career success. Unfortunately, with the emergence of the Corona Virus, it has interrupted plans, schedules, and many other aspects of the school program. However, the teachers of AVID are putting in their best efforts to make the upcoming school year as beneficial as the rest.

We spoke with Ms. August, one of the AVID teachers, and some students that shared their experience with the program.

There has been lots of concern over how effective online learning is compared to face-to-face learning and the inquiry that students won't get an equal experience. In the response to the concern, Ms. August stated: "Most academic activities/ assignments are being altered so that they are easily accessible on CANVAS for both face- to -face

students and PCSonline students."

The AVID curriculum and activities have also been modified to fit the new health and safety requirements. Although many things won't be the same this year, she still assured these modifications aren't going to get in the way of giving students the AVID experience they deserve.

According to the 2019 AVID Senior data collection, 94% of AVID Florida seniors completed college entrance requirements. Briana Washington and Jomarya Brown, two senior AVID students at HHS said that before AVID, they didn't take their grades as seriously as they do now. AVID has helped them understand concepts much better and has even motivated them to join extracurriculars and sports. Their organization has not only gotten better in school, but for their personal life as well with high encouragement of balance and involvement.
