<u>A Note to Parents: Developing Fact Fluency</u> <u>in Elementary School (Part 2)</u>

What do we mean by math fact fluency?


Math facts fluency refers to the ability to recall the basic facts in all four operations **accurately**, **quickly and effortlessly**. When students achieve automaticity with these facts, they have attained a level of mastery that enables them to retrieve them for long-term memory without conscious effort or attention. Brain imaging studies have shown how the progression from effortful processes, such as finger counting, to automatic retrieval is associated with actual changes in the regions of the brain involved in mathematical computation (Rivera, Reiss, Eckert and Menon, 2005).

So why focus on math facts?

Math facts fluency leads to higher order mathematics.

Through automaticity students free up their working memory and can devote it to problem solving and learning new concepts and skills (Geary, 1994). Quite simply, a lack of fluency in basic math fact recall significantly hinders a child's subsequent progress with problem-solving, algebra and higher-order math concept. Instant knowledge of these facts is key as your child moves on in mathematics and learns multistep-computation, fractions, and decimals.

Seatbelt Safety

SEATBELTS SAVE LIVES!

Motor vehicle injuries are a leading cause of death among children in the United States. However, many of these deaths can be prevented!!! Seat belt use reduces the risk for death and serious injury by approximately

50 %. Please buckle children in car seats, booster seats, or seat belts on every trip, no matter how short the trip is!

Rear-facing car seat: Birth until age 2-4.

Forward-facing car seat: After outgrowing rear-facing seat and until at least age 5.

Booster seat: After outgrowing forward-facing seat and until seat belts fit properly.

Seat belts fit properly when the lap belt lays across the upper thighs (not the stomach) and the shoulder belt lays across the chest (not the neck). Proper seat belt fit usually occurs when children are about 4 feet 9 inches tall and 9-12 years old. Seat children in the back-middle seat not in front of an airbag.

Parents and caregivers: Always wear a seat belt. Set a good example by always using a seat belt yourself!

Skycrest Protocols: MASKS

We wanted to highlight our COVID safety protocols at Skycrest, which have been in place since school began in August. These protocols were created and implemented following guidance issued by the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, the Florida Department of Health, and local healthcare and public health providers. These include:

- <u>Mandatory masks/face coverings</u> for all staff and students, with opportunities for short mask breaks throughout the day - students will be reminded and notes home if face covering is not worn. If masks are not worn after several warnings, a call from the principal will be made.
- Limited visitors and volunteers in our schools, who must adhere to all district health and safety protocols
- School Clinic Procedures that quickly identify students with concerning symptoms, and a separate room for them to wait for parent pickup
- 4. <u>Daily Self-Screening Procedures</u> for staff, and information provided to families on the importance of keeping ill students home
- <u>Upgraded air filtration</u> that meets or exceeds the standards put forth by the American Society of Heating, Refrigerating and Air-Conditioning Engineers Epidemic Task Force
- 6. <u>Enhanced Cleaning Protocols</u> including nightly sanitation of the school and more frequent surface cleaning throughout the school day
- 7. <u>Wellness Education for Staff and Students</u> on topics such as how to wear a face covering effectively, proper handwashing, and the importance of social distancing

With these measures in place – it is important for students to come to school with a mask or keep one in your child's backpack. If this is a reoccurrence of not having a mask when coming to school, the parent will be called and will need to bring one to the front office.
