Read the pages you have added so far. Now add the names of some of your favorite storybook and TV characters. You can use photos or draw pictures.	March around the house playing homemade musical instruments using pots and pans, spoons, homemade shakers, etc. Use your imagination and have fun!	Make a safe spot to long jump. Each person jumps as far as they can. Use a marker to mark where each person lands. Use your feet to measure how many feet each person jumped. Who jumped the farthest? What happens when you use different feet to measure?	Gather as many different pairs of socks as you can find and separate the pairs. Roll each sock into a ball and put them in a pile. After a 3,2,1 countdown, whoever unrolls and finds the most matching socks wins!	Fill a bucket or large container with water. Gather two cups that are the same size and a 2 sponges. Two people soak their sponges in the water and wring them out filling the cups. Make it a race who fills their cup first? How many times of wringing does it take to fill each cup?

Look around your house and outside. Find 10 different letters. Ask your child to identify the attributes of each letter (e.g., sticks, circles or humps)	Gather whatever materials you have around the house (e.g., paper, crayons, magazines, material scraps, recyclables, glue, scissors, etc.). Create artwork to display around the house	Together gather several forks and several spoons from your kitchen. Ask the child to count how many spoons they have, and count how many forks they have. Then count how many they have all together.	Draw a picture and write a story about your favorite sport. Describe how the sport is played, where you play it and why it's your favorite sport. Share your story with the people in your house.	Make homemade puppets using old socks, lunch bags, paper or whatever else you have at home. Be creative and decorate them anyway you want. Put on a puppet show!
