- Create a special reading area Find a place in your home that is a comfortable, quiet spot for reading.
- Schedule a quiet reading time Set aside a specific time each day if possible to spend reading with your child. Even small amounts of time are worthwhile.
- Reread favorite books Children love to hear books with rhyme, rhythm, and repetition over and over again.
- Read chapter books Children enjoy continuous stories, and they are eager for the next installment.

Math Fun At Home

Children learn about math by working with actual things. Using food as a tool can help your child understand addition, subtraction, division, multiplication, weighing, measuring, and fractions. Here are some fun activities to try at home with your child.

Give your child 17 pretzels and have him divide them evenly among 3 family members. He will see that each person receives 5 and there are 2 left over: 17 divided by 3 = 5, remainder 2

A pizza is a wonderful visual tool to learn about fractions. Show the child the pizza uncut, explain that the pizza is "one whole" or "one". Cut the pizza in half, each piece is now one half or ½. Cut the pizza into fourths, each piece is now one fourth or ¼. Continue this process with smaller fractions having the child write the fraction each time the pizza is cut.

Nutritional information on food packages provides the number of calories per serving. Let your child determine how many servings are in the package, then figure out the total calories for the entire package.
