Kindergarten First Day Information for Families



First day of school: Wednesday, August Ilth, 2021.

School hours: 8:35am to 2:55pm. The first bell rings at 8:35am. Announcements begin at 8:40am and the tardy bell rings at 8:45am. Beginning with the first day of school, please help your child to be on time and ready for an exciting school day. Classroom doors will be open to welcome your child at 8:15am. Please remember to allow extra time the first week for the "first day crowds."

<u>Drop-Off & Pick-Up</u>: You may drop off and pick up your child at the car circle (north lot), or at the Walker's Gate. We encourage you to drop off and pick up your child at our car circle. Either way, we have ample supervision. For the first few weeks of school we will have extra personnel assisting students. Whether you walk up to get your child or you use our car circle, please hold or display a large piece of paper which states your child's name, the teacher's name, and their grade – Kindergarten. Displaying your child's name, teacher, and grade allows for staff to find your child more easily and dismissal will run smoother and more quickly.

First Day of School "To Do" List:

- Your child needs to wear appropriate clothes sneakers, socks, and a comfortable school uniform which enables your child to handle bathroom needs <u>independently</u> (Can they buckle, snap, use belt, etc. independently?).
- Your child will need a <u>complete</u> change of clothing (including a uniform, socks, and underwear) in a Ziploc baq. Please label the clothing and the bag with your child's name.
- Your child will need a zippered backpack, large enough for a large library book, and folder/binder to fit into.
- A reusable water bottle or a plastic bottle of water.
- Your child will need to know his/her dismissal plans AND lunch plans.

First Day Anxieties:

We understand that you are as anxious as your child about starting kindergarten. However, it is important that you give your child a kiss, a hug, and a confident smile as they enter the school. Let the car or the gate be the parting point. Allow your child to go in with their teacher so they can begin the school day and begin to establish the teacher/student relationship. We promise that we will contact you during the day if there is a problem.

Modified Uniform Dress Code

All students must adhere to the requirements of the modified uniform policy which remains in effect for the 2020-21 school year as follows:



<u>Shirts</u>: solid-colored, collared polo-style shirt in light blue, navy blue and red only. Shirts should be free from design or logos greater than a quarter. Mildred Helms school spirit shirts may be worn on Fridays.



<u>Bottoms</u>: khaki or navy colored **uniform** bottoms. This includes shorts, pants, capris, skorts, skirts, jumpers (shorts or leggings of the same solid color may be worn underneath skirts/jumpers). Shorts should follow Pinellas County dress code of mid –thigh length or longer. NO Gym shorts, leggings, jeggings, yoga pants or jeans.

Gym shorts, leggings, jeggings, yoga pants or jeans are **not** permitted. Uniforms can be found throughout Pinellas County at Walmart, Target, JCPenneys, Old Navy, Kohls and many other local stores.
