

Northeast Enrollment Increases

Welcome back everyone! Hope you all had a nice summer. I thought all of you, especially the freshmen, would be interested in the enrollment of our great school.

Our school was built and opened in 1954. That year 1,111 students enrolled; of that enrollment there were 373 freshmen, 341 sophomores, 299 juniors, and 98 seniors. Eighty seven graduated in '55. The next year 1,436 students enrolled-467 freshmen, 393 sophomores, 317 juniors, and 259 seniors. Two hundred and forty-one graduated that year.

This year aproximately 1600 students have enrolled. We asked Mr. Sexton after two years and 2,547 students what he thought of the condition of the school. He said he was quite proud of the school after two years in comparison with other schools he has seen. And we're mighty proud of it, too! Let's keep it a good school.
