Hello students and Parents,

We are getting closer to summer time but make sure your outstanding student knows some safety tips for the road. I want to share some tips when traveling to and from school. 1. Plan a walking route to school or the bus stop. Choose the most direct way with the fewest

street crossings and, if possible, with intersections that have crossing guards. 2. Walk the route with your child beforehand. Tell him or her to stay away from parks, vacant lots, fields and other places where there aren't many people around. 3. Teach your child to never talk to strangers, or accept rides or gifts, from strangers. Remember, a stranger is anyone you or your children do not know well or do not trust. 4. Be sure your child walks to and from school with a sibling, friend, or neighbor. Last, be sure that your child knows his or her home phone number and address, your work number, the number of another trusted adult, and how to call 911 for emergencies.
