## **Ready to Learn**

### **Readiness to learn involves:**

- Physical well-being:
- \* Healthy nutrition
- \* Physical activity
- \* Regular checkups





## **Social and Emotional Skills**

Social and Emotional Skills:

- \* I love you-foundation for positive self-esteem
- \* Positive feedback-Good job!
- Avoid comparisons-everyone is unique, provide opportunities to meet others
- \* Model positive social skills-taking turns, sharing, etc.
- Discipline-explaining the rules and having appropriate consequences for your child's age

# Language and Literacy

### Language and Literacy:

- \* Talk, and talk some more
- \* Ask open-ended questions: What do you think about that?
- \* Read with your child every day
- Get your child used to holding a pencil and writing things





# Attitude, or approach, toward learning

- \* Talk positively about school
- \* Curiosity-helps them learn
- \* Creativity-children are naturally creative



## Ways to be creative

### Ways to be creative are:

- \* Speech-make up the words together
- \* Singing-make up songs together
- \* Artwork
- \* Crafts
- \* Dancing



# Independence

Ways to teach independence at home:

- \* Teaching how to wash and dress without help
- \* Age-appropriate chores
- \* Giving choices: what to wear



# Persistence... try, try again!!

### \* A persistent child gains independence quickly



## Cooperativeness

Teaching cooperativeness at home:

- \* Taking turns
- \* Sharing responsibilities
- Participating without interrupting



# **Cognitive Skills**

### Cognitive-or Thinking-Skills:

- \* Observation
- Noting similarities and differences
- \* Planning ahead
- Solving problems



# As the first day of school approaches..

- \* Find out how your child is feeling
- \* Find a book about starting school and read it together.
- \* Visit the school together
- \* Meet your child's teacher
- Arrange before-and after-school care
- Know the route to school, and, if your child will take the bus, where it picks up and drops off
- \* Start those new bedtimes and wakeup times a few days early (10-12 hours of sleep a night).



# Make the day special!



### Let your child make some choices:

- \* What to wear
- \* What to have for breakfast
- \* A comforting item to bring, such as a photo



## **Stay involved**

- \* Attend parent-teacher conferences
- \* Attend open houses
- \* Volunteer at the school
- \* Attend parent workshops





# New Student Registration KG Registration

**To register for kindergarten, children must** Be 5 years old on or before Sept.1

- \* Be able to show proof of residency (home address)
- Have a Florida Certificate of Immunization (shots record)
- \* Have a physical examination certificate.



## How to register?

### **STEP 1: Find Your Zoned School**

Parents will first need to find their child's zoned school by using the <u>Zoned School Locator</u> or calling Student Assignment, (727) 588-6210.



## Step 2: Reserve a Seat

### **STEP 2: Reserve a Seat**

To reserve a seat at a zoned school, use the online <u>Student Reservation System (SRS)</u> located on the district website, <u>www.pcsb.org</u>. You can use any computer, including a school computer, to reserve a seat.

To use the Student Reservation System, you will need a PCS Portal User ID and password.

# Step 3: Register

#### **STEP 3: Register**

\* The final step is to visit the assigned school and deliver the <u>Required Documents</u>: Birth certificate or other proof of identity/age, two documents proving residency, Florida Certificate of Immunization, physical examination certificate, child's most recent report card (for students in grades 1-12), Individual Education Plan (if your child participates in exceptional student education) and Social Security number (optional).

- \* Standards will be the same for all students in states adopting the Florida Standards, 46 US states.

A Sample of What Your Child Will Be Working on in Kindergarten

English Language Arts & Literacy:

- Naming upper-and lower-case letters, matching those letters with their sounds, and printing them
- Comparing the adventures and experiences of characters in familiar stories, such as fairy tales and folktales
- Retelling familiar stories and talking about stories read to them using details from the text

A Sample of What Your Child Will Be Working on in Kindergarten

### **Mathematics:**

- \* Counting objects to tell how many there are
- \* Comparing two groups of objects to tell which group, if either, has more; comparing two written numbers to tell which is greater
- Adding with a sum of 10 or less; subtracting from a number 10 or less; and solving addition and subtraction word problems.
