

Students must be in attendance during the week of Oct. 12 - 16 as this is the time frame the state determines the number of students enrolled and attending school for funding purposes.

#### **INDUSTRY CERTIFICATION**

C-Tech is a new program that will allow our students to earn industry certification in Copper Cabling, Telecommunications, Fiber Optics, and Audio Visual (home theater). Students will be able to use these certifications in a very high needs job market. All of the certifications are aligned with STEM objectives. graduates will be able to seek employment with many of the cable companies, construction projects, and sub-contractors. We are hopeful that our students in our DJJ facilities will be starting within the next month.

#### PSAT TEST – OCT. 14

This is a practice test intended to help prepare a student to take a college admissions test, and also to give students, parents, and teachers an idea of which students could and should take placement advanced courses. The school district provides this test free of charge for all 10<sup>th</sup> grade students. 9<sup>th</sup> and 11<sup>th</sup> grade students may sign up take the test but will have to pay the registration fee (fee waivers are available for those who qualify). 11<sup>th</sup> grade students who take the PSAT will be considered for the National Merit Scholarship, and also may receive information from colleges and other educational institutions based upon the student's profile and test score.

#### TEEN PARENTING CORNER

Another positive start to a new school year for the teen parent students of Pinellas County. This year 66% of last year's teen parent population have returned to their schools with a common goal of being a high school graduate, 28% of the students are new to teen parenting, and at least 8 young moms have made a commitment to return to school and graduate.

Last school year 2014 - 2015, 86% of the 83 seniors graduated in June 2015. More than 200 teen parent children received services provided through the Educational Alternative Services Programs.

The goals of the Teen Parent Programs are to increase the number of teen parent students who remain in school and graduate, delay a subsequent pregnancy, and provide the ancillary services which remove the barriers to daily school attendance. Through the prolific, positive, and dedicated advocacy of the teen parent social workers and health services team and support of EAS, this school year is anticipated to be a productive year -100% success!

#### DJJ REVIEW

We are anxiously awaiting the career cruising to start the Career inventories, thank you for your patience. Please remember all DJJ sites need to have all students assessed on the DJJ common assessment for entry and exit – **this is the law** – not a choice. We have had some problems with testing – please make sure all students are assessed according to the testing timeline in STAR reading, math and Write to Learn. This year, Pinellas will have a site audit from the state in January. Remember Transition services and planning is a big initiative for the state. More to come about the audit and testing...

### READING STRATEGIES SUPPORTS THAT PARENTS CAN DO AT HOME

#### **Strategies for Novice Readers**

#### Don't leave home without it

Bring along a book or magazine any time your child has to wait, such as at a doctor's office or for a long car ride. Always try to fit in reading.

#### Once is not enough

Encourage your child to re-read favorite books and poems. Re-reading helps children build fluency, speed, and accuracy.

#### Read with your child every day

This is possibly the most important point of all. Set aside a regular time each day to read with your child. It doesn't have to be for more than 15 minutes, but the benefits from setting aside a bit of time to read together can be amazing. Create a nook on the couch, bring along a few loved toys, cuddle up with a favorite book and, most importantly, have some fun. If you don't treat it as a chore, neither will your child.

#### **Strategies for Decoding Readers**

#### Create a book together

Fold pieces of paper in half and staple them to make a book. Ask your child to write sentences on each page and add his or her own illustrations.

#### Reading to others

Have your child read to someone younger; this sets a purpose for reading and encourages your child to read with expression in order to be understood by the listening audience. If a younger friend or sibling is not available, then your child can read into a tape recorder or perhaps to Grandma over the phone or on Skype or even to a dog!

#### **Strategies for Fluent Readers**

#### **Look for clues**

With your child, turn the chapter and heading titles into questions. Then, read the text for the answers. Also, skim graphs, charts, and pictures BEFORE reading to get clues about the text.

#### Use prediction strategies

Ask your child what he or she thinks is going to happen next in the story. You can do this at the end of each page, or at the end of a chapter for older readers.
