THE IB DIPLOMA

Originally designed in 1968 for international schools, the IB Diploma is now a significant force in over 125 countries. The IB diploma is awarded to students who pass external examinations in six subjects, successfully complete internal assessments, present a quality extended essay, complete a Community Action Service (CAS) project and finish a course of study in the Theory of Knowledge.

HOW TO APPLY

While most programs are available for students countywide, meaning students may live anywhere in the county to apply, several programs now have designated application areas. To apply to this program, you will need to live in the north application area, comprised of the high school zones for Countryside, Dunedin, East Lake, Palm Harbor University and Tarpon Springs. Once the application is completed on line, please send a copy of the student's 6th and 7th grade standardized reading and mathematics test scores (e.g., FCAT, Stanford, Iowa) and 6th, 7th, and 8th grade report card to the IB Office at the school.

TRANSPORTATION

Arterial bus transportation (buses that operate on main roads with a limited number of stops) is provided to students who live more than two miles from the school. Magnet bus stop locations may require that parents drive their children to and from the stop.



ADMISSIONS CRITERIA

Target Group 1:

- Pre-requisite courses: Algebra 1 Honors and one year foreign language
- Test scores:

Private School students must have 6th or 7th grade standardized test stanine scores of 8 or 9 in both reading and math.

READING: 6th grade FCAT 2.0 score of 244 or higher OR 7th grade FCAT 2.0 score of 250 or higher

AND

MATH: 6th grade FCAT 2.0 score of 246 or higher OR

7th grade FCAT 2.0 score of 254 or higher

- 6th & 7th grade Final Academic Grades (math, science, social studies, English, world language of A's & B's.
- 8th grade Semester Academic Grades (subjects listed above) A's & B's

STUDENT MUST PASS THE ALGEBRA 1 EOC TO BE ADMITTED INTO THE PROGRAM

Target Group 2:

• Students who successfully complete the prerequisite courses but do not meet the above testing or academic grades criteria may be placed in this group. At least 10% of the incoming 9th grade class will be selected from Target Group 2.

Admission criteria for grade 10:

Students making application for grade 10 must meet the following eligibility criteria:

- Meet all grade 8 eligibility criteria (See Target Group I)
- Algebra II Honors
- Foreign Language year II or above
- Science, preferably Biology, at the honors level (Successful completion of the prerequisite courses must be by the last day of the regular ninth grade school year.)
- Academic grades of B or above.
- Seventh and eighth grade stanines for Math and Reading of 8 or 9

what is a magnet?
