




# **POINTS OF PRIDE: STUDENT ACHIEVEMENTS**



### **DUAL ENROLLMENT SAVINGS**

PCS high school students saved **\$14.5** million in college tuition by completing **23,307** college courses and earning **69,921** college credits while in high school.







Seniors who took the in-school SAT in fall 2024 **outperformed** their peers **statewide in all categories.** 60% met the English benchmark, surpassing **the Florida average (51%) and the global average (55%).** 

PCS offers **SLS 1301 - Career** and Life Planning, in partnership with St. Petersburg College, as an introductory Dual Enrollment course offered in high schools. **84%** of the 1,721 students enrolled in the course completed it successfully.

More than 350 middle and high school students engaged in the Model United Nations Competition, tackling global issues and practicing democracy.

### **3DE SHOWCASE**

High school students **pitched innovative business ideas to a panel of Raymond James executives**. Gibbs High earned top honors for an all-natural sunblock.



### STUDENT LEADERSHIP SUMMIT

Hosted by the Superintendent, students tackled leadership challenges, toured the USF college campus, shared feedback with district leaders, and developed digital responsibility plans for their schools.







### **LUNCH LAB**

**200+ elementary and middle school students sampled and rated food from 16 vendors**. Several of the students' favorites will appear in the 2025-26 lunch menus.





### **MOCK ELECTIONS**

Schools held mock elections on various topics, such as school president and best lunch, to **reinforce democratic principles ahead of the presidential election**.

### STEM EXPLORER CLUBS

**3,000 elementary and middle school students participated in STEM Explorer Clubs**, where they engaged in engineering challenges and **developed teamwork and leadership skills**.





### TRAVELING ART MOBILE

The Dali Museum Traveling Art Mobile visited six elementary schools, allowing **3,000 K-5 students** to **tour the mini-museum** with their art teachers.



### **150 YEAR ANNIVERSARY**

Anona Elementary celebrated its sesquicentennial anniversary. Students sang Happy Birthday to the school and created a time capsule for students and staff to open in 50 years. Items included letters to future students, a cell phone, and learning materials. Anona is the only school in the district to reach this milestone.









### **CULTURAL EXCHANGES**

Shore Acres Elementary and East Lake Middle **welcomed students from a Grand Cayman primary school** and a **Japanese English conversation school**, giving students a chance to **explore global cultures**.







### **STEP COMPETITION**

PCS hosted its **second annual step competition** for elementary and middle school students. Lakewood Elementary and Largo Middle won their divisions.







# MIDDLE SCHOOL EXPERIENCE

### MIDDLE SCHOOL EXPERIENCE

PCS is transforming the middle school experience to accelerate student achievement while supporting students' transitions from elementary to middle and middle to high school. All middle schools are implementing this in 2025-26 increasing the number from 12 in 2024-25 to 23 in 2025-26. The major changes include:

**5,000+ eighth graders** participated in the Great Explorations Planetarium, an immersive video that reinforced science standards. PCS **students outperformed the state average** on the standards addressed.





### "CRATE EXPLORATIONS"

PCS partnered with Great Explorations Children's Museum to engage **4,700+ sixth graders** (88% districtwide) in science, ELA, math, and social studies through interactive challenges that built curiosity and critical thinking.





## **FUTURE CITIES**

The **Future Cities competition doubled in participation** and challenged middle school students to design a sustainable floating city 100 years in the future. Largo Middle took first place.



### **INNOVATION LAB**

A team of district staff **transformed a former school bus into a mobile STEAM lab**, delivering hands-on learning in science, technology, engineering, arts, and math. The bus serves as a **mobile field trip** and a feature at **community events**.

# SAFE & RESPECTFUL CLIMATE & CULTURE

### **POWER UP LEARNING**

The Power Up Learning, Power Down Distractions campaign launched this year, teaching students digital responsibility. Across all grades, students practiced age-appropriate internet safety and technology skills, empowering them to learn and thrive in the digital world.





### DIGITAL RESPONSIBILITY

At the Student Leadership Summit, Superintendent Hendrick challenged student leaders in grades 3-12 to **design projects promoting digital responsibility on their campuses**. Months later, students reconvened in a Zoom meeting to showcase their creative initiatives.

### SEE SOMETHING, SAY SOMETHING

Say Something Week highlights the importance of students speaking up, supporting one another, and building connections with trusted adults. Schools shared lessons on recognizing warning signs of crisis and hosted themed dress-up days and community-building activities to foster awareness and connection.

INCREASING FOR THE THIRD CONSECUTIVE YEAR.

### SCHOOL SAFETY

The district and school safety officers continue to work closely with the Florida Office of Safe Schools to **evaluate** and improve the safety measures at all PCS schools.

The School Board approved wearable crisis alert badges for all staff. The district shares the Florida Office of Safe Schools' quarterly safety report with the School Board and community, in compliance with state law.





### CYBER AMBASSADOR ACADEMY

Over the summer, nearly 100 students representing 20 elementary and middle schools spent a week attending the Cyber Ambassador Academy. They focused on creating a message to convey the importance of being digitally responsible. Students then shared that message with their schools through student-created podcasts and videos.





# **EQUITY WITH EXCELLENCE FOR ALL**

# ALL SUBGROUPS DEMONSTRATED INCREASE PROFICIENCY ACROSS ALL STATE ASSESSMENTS



Among all student groups, Black students and students with disabilities showed the most improvement in math proficiency, increasing by **6.8 percentage points**.



English Learners showed the greatest improvement in overall science proficiency, with an increase of **8.9** percentage points.



Students with disabilities showed the greatest improvement in reading proficiency, with a **6.9** percentage point increase.



Black students showed the most improvement in overall Social Studies proficiency, increasing by **10.1 percentage points**.

### HIGH ACHIEVING STUDENTS

PCS recognized more than **770 students** at the Vyrle Davis Awards, the Maria Edmond Awards, and the Joseph L. Carwise Awards. These awards honor the **top achieving black and hispanic scholars** across the district.





### TURNAROUND AWARDS

The Turnaround Achievement Award program recognizes one student from each school who has **made positive choices about his or her educational future**. The turnaround can occur in behavior, attitude, or academics.







### **BRIDGING THE GAP**

The Bridging the Gap Plan is focused on closing the achievement gap for Black students in Pinellas County. In 2024–25, the district made improvements, with Black student proficiency reaching its highest levels in ELA and Math. PCS remains committed to accelerating this progress. ### YES, I CAN! AWARDS

The Yes, I Can! Awards honored nearly 50 ESE students for outstanding achievements in academics, independent living, self-advocacy, technology, and the arts.





### **BOYS AND GUYS READ BOOK BATTLE**

**400** male students represented 100 schools in the boys read and guys read book battles. This initiative aims to narrow the gender gap in reading by engaging boys in books aligned with their interests.

### **LEADING WITH CORE VALUES**

Staff continue to recognize their colleagues for exemplifying the PCS Core Values, and leaders find unique ways to publicly **celebrate 16,812 staff** members who received a PCS Praise recognition from colleagues.



### **EMPLOYEE HOUSING**

In response to rising housing costs, PCS partnered with more than 20 property management companies to offer preferred employer discounts to PCS employees.



### **SALARY INCREASE**

A portion of the approved Referendum will be utilized to increase salaries—70% allocated to teachers (approximately \$11,000 each) and 15% to support staff (approximately \$2,900 each).



### **EMPLOYEE CHILD CARE LAUNCH**

In the first year, Employee Childcare served **75 children**, ages one through four, and benefited **77 PCS employees** across **57 district sites.** The program's weekly tuition rates are approximately **50% of the market rate**.







### TEACHER APPRENTICE GRANT

In its second year, the Teacher Apprenticeship Program helps support staff become teachers while earning higher wages. The program received a \$185,000 state grant to help cover program expenses.

## STRONG CONNECTIONS & COMMUNICATION

### **EXPERIENCE PCS**

More than 3,000 people attended Experience PCS, a family-friendly event showcasing districtwide programs and opportunities. Attendees explored everything from STEM and flight simulations to glow-in-the-dark art, animal encounters, and a chili cook-off.









### REFERENDUM

Pinellas County voters once again **approved the renewal of the PCS Referendum**. Since its initial approval in 2004, the Referendum has been renewed every four years, reflecting the community's ongoing **commitment to support public education**. The newly approved Referendum took effect on July 1, 2025.

Key highlights of the renewed Referendum include:

- Ongoing **independent oversight** to ensure funds are used as voters intended
- Adjustment of the millage rate to 1.0 mill
- Recruiting and retaining of high-quality teachers and support staff
- Preservation of music, art, and reading programs
- Investment in modern classroom technology
- Increased teacher salaries
- New salary supplements for support staff, including school nurses, bus drivers, cafeteria workers, and others













### **REAL-WORLD PARTNERSHIPS**

All fifth and eighth graders participate in Enterprise Village and Finance Park, immersive field trips with 42 local business partners.

Fifth graders run a simulated town, while eighth graders manage a

while eighth graders manage a household budget and make real-world financial decisions, building essential economic skills that connect classroom learning to life.







# PCS STRONG: HURRICANE RECOVERY

### **PCS STRONG**

As a result of the damage sustained by Hurricanes Helene and Milton, Pinellas County Schools:

- Sheltered **15,000+ residents** in 20 shelters
- Provided **thousands of meals** for sheltered residents
- Deployed 100+ bus drivers daily, to evacuate 3,100 people
- Collaborated with community partners to quickly restore campuses
- Relocated students from damaged campuses including Maderia Beach K-8 and Gulf Beaches Elementary















The Pinellas Education Foundation's Hurricane Relief Campaign raised \$1.6 million to aid displaced students and staff. Local organizations, including the Juvenile Welfare Board and YMCA, provided free childcare for affected families. Several school communities collected essentials, prepared care packages, and distributed food to families in need.

### TRANSPORTATION



Since 2022-23, late bus arrivals declined 72% from nearly 33,000 to about 9,000. Delays of 16–30 minutes fell 73% over three years, and delays over 30 minutes dropped 97%.

### **FINANCE**



All ESSER/ARP funds allocated to non-charter schools were successfully utilized within the designated timeframe, meeting the September 2024 deadline.

### **TECHNOLOGY**



More than 19,000 computers were repaired by district staff and Dell Tech Crew students. 57 students earned certifications through the Dell Tech Program this year.
