Tips to Help Guide Your Child's Academic Progress

Elementary

Talking and listening: Talking and listening build strong foundations for learning. Ask questions. Encourage your child to provide examples to support what they tell you.

Interactive reading: Read aloud with your child every day. When reading, ask about the story. Ask your child to retell the story in his or her own words. If reading a picture book, ask your child to tell you what is happening in the pictures.

Add non-fiction: Read grade-level appropriate non-fiction books, newspapers and magazines with your child. Read biographies, articles and historical stories with your child.

Offer an example: Let your child see you enjoy reading books.

Stay in touch: Attend your school's back-to-school night and other parent events. Stay in touch with your child's teacher about your child's progress.

Monitor progress: Do you see your child's knowledge and vocabulary growing? Do you see your child learning to use new words in speaking and writing? Is your child being asked to solve real-world problems in math?

Beyond the school day: Check out your school's STEM Academy, an after-school enrichment program. Check with your school for other clubs and activities.

Support at home: Homework assignments help your child master skills they practice in school. Establish good habits early and help your child value the importance of homework.

Transitions: If your child is in fifth grade, ask about middle school orientation events or schedule a time to visit your neighborhood middle school. Explore District Application Programs and check important dates at pcsb.org/Choice.

Middle School

Get acquainted: Attend back-to-school night and meet your child's teachers, grade level administrator and/or school counselor.

Know the options: Review your child's class schedule and the student handbook. Courses students take in middle school impact high school course options. If you have questions, contact your school early in the school year.

Encourage online safety: Middle school students may need guidance understanding safe and responsible online use. Visit www.common SenseMedia.org for resources.

Explore the arts: Students in middle school have access to a robust offering of performing and fine arts courses.

Update records: All incoming seventh grade students must be up to date on the Tdap vaccination and provide documentation to their school.

Test success: All students in 8th grade take the PSAT 8/9 in the fall at no charge and have access to personalized test preparation through SATpractice.org. High-performing seventh-graders are invited to take the SAT in the spring.

Career exploration: Middle school students have a growing list of opportunities to explore career and technical education and earn industry certifications. Ask your school about courses and clubs available for your child.

Transitions: If your child is in eighth grade, ask about orientation events at your child's high school. When your child registers for high school, ask to review their course selection. Explore District Application Programs and check important dates at pcsb.org/Choice.

High School

Graduation Pathways: Has your child determined their Pathway to Graduation? Pinellas County Schools offers three Pathways to help guide students in their educational planning: Advanced Scholar, College Scholar and Technical/College. Visit pcsb.org/Pinellas-pathways for more information.

Know the requirements: Review graduation requirements before your child begins 9th grade. Ask your school for information or visit fldoe.org/academics/graduation-requirements.

Get certified: Students can leave high school with career skills by earning industry certifications in areas such as Microsoft Office, Adobe programs, network security, food service, health services and more.

Early experience: High school students can complete internships during the summer and during the school year with local companies, government organizations and nonprofits.

College prep: Preparing for college admissions and scholarships starts early. Students in ninth and tenth grade take the PSAT at no charge during the school day each October. Students in eleventh grade take the SAT in school in March, and the college application process begins in August of senior year. Additional SAT and ACT testing dates are available. Contact your child's school for more information.

Score higher: Free, personalized preparation for the SAT is available online through SATpractice.org. A smart phone app, called Daily Practice for the new SAT, is also available. Visit SATpractice.org for more information.

Explore Options: Learn about post-secondary options at one of several college and career fairs held for high school students. Check the calendar for dates.

Technically Speaking: If your child is interested in a technical career, check out the opportunities through Pinellas Technical College by visiting pcsb.org/myptc.



STEM Academies offer students opportunities to conduct hands-on STEM investigations, explore careers in STEM, improve team building and leadership skills, learn about business planning and interact with community partners.



High school students attending Pinellas Technical College (PTC) have the opportunity to be dually enrolled in post-secondary courses tuition free.



Career Academies are four-year programs designed to blend a student's required academic courses with the career technical program of the academy. Find a Dual Enrollment course at a PTC campus near you at:

National Attendance Month

Attending school regularly helps children feel better about school—and themselves. Start building this habit in preschool so they learn right away that going to school on time, every day is important. Good

attendance will help children do well in high school, college and at work. Starting in kindergarten, too many absences can cause children to fall behind in school, and missing 10 percent (or about 18 days) can make it harder to learn to read.

Students can still fall behind if they miss just a day or two days every few weeks.

Absences can affect the whole classroom if the teacher has to slow down learning to help children catch up. By sixth grade, absenteeism

is one of three signs that a student may drop out of high school. By ninth grade, regular and high attendance is a better predictor of graduation rates than eighth-grade test scores. Absences can be a sign that a student is losing interest in school, struggling with school work, dealing with a bully or facing some other potentially serious difficulty.

WHAT YOU CAN DO

- Talk about the importance of showing up to school every day and make that the expectation.

- Help your child maintain daily routines, such as finishing homework and getting a good night's sleep.
- Try not to schedule dental and medical appointments during the school day.
- Don't let your child stay home unless truly sick. Complaints of headaches or stomach aches may be signs of anxiety.
- Find out if your child feels engaged by his classes and feels safe from bullies and other threats. For more information, visit www.attendanceworks.org.



The Pinellas County Academic Team won the Division 1 state championship at the 32nd annual Commissioner's Academic Challenge in April 2017. The Commissioner's Academic Challenge is a highly academic statewide high

school tournament inaugurated in 1986. Pictured is the winning team practicing for the state competition. Each team consists of six members, with four students competing during each of three rounds and two alternates. Players are asked questions

relating to language arts, mathematics, science, social studies, the fine arts, world languages (French and Spanish) and technology. The Academic Team prepares by practicing once a week for two months with the support of two team coaches.

The team members are selected via nomination and three team tryouts. If you're interested in having your child get involved, contact your child's school.

AVID

Advancement Via Individual Determination (AVID) is a program that takes students with the potential and determination to go to college and provides them with instruction that

allows them to acquire the skills to be independent and successful in college while taking the rigorous courses necessary and to gain admission into four-year universities. AVID is designed for students who are in the academic middle who wish to maximize their

potential. Many AVID students will be the first in their families to attend college, come from low-income or minority families, or have unique personal circumstances that require a greater academic support system within the school day. All 16 of Pinellas County

Schools' traditional high schools and 19 traditional/fundamental middle schools have AVID programs. The number of AVID elementary schools is expanding annually. There are presently 15 AVID elementary schools. To learn more about AVID, visit pcsb.org/AVIDapp.

Kindergarten serves children who are 5 years of age by Sept. 1 of the school year in which they are enrolling. expectations for the upcoming school year.

Pinellas Pathways to Graduation

The district has created three Pathways to Graduation to boost student achievement and assist families with educational planning: The Advanced Scholar Pathway, the College Scholar Pathway and the Technical/College Pathway. Each Pathway

provides rigorous and relevant course options that help students successfully complete the requirements for earning a high school diploma. To see the graduation requirements, visit pcsb.org/graduation.

Virtual School

Pinellas County Schools has its own virtual school, which offers full and part-time programs and more than 120 rigorous and engaging online courses for students in grades K-12. All courses are developed and delivered by district teachers. Unlike other online schools that are not affiliated with the school district, Pinellas Virtual School full-time students are able to participate in field trips

with fellow virtual school students and some activities at their zoned school, such as athletics. Pinellas Virtual School students also earn a diploma from their zoned school. All students need to complete at least one online course as part of the 24 credits required for graduation.



AVID

Advancement Via Individual Determination (AVID) seeks to close the achievement gap by preparing all students for college readiness and success in a global society. AVID is a college readiness system that takes students with the potential and determination to go to college and supports their academic success in the rigorous courses required to get into four-year universities.

In the AVID elective course, students are taught the skill sets necessary to be successful in rigorous courses. Many of these students will be the first in their families to attend college, come from low-income or minority families, or have unique personal circumstances that require a greater academic support system within the school day. AVID creates an atmosphere of positive peer pressure for the students, so they are pushing each other to strive for success.

AVID Elementary

AVID Elementary is a foundational component of the AVID College Readiness System that supports AVID's mission and vision. AVID Elementary focuses on embedding research-based instructional practices in the areas of instruction, culture, leadership and systems. All AVID Elementary schools work with teachers, staff, families, and students to build a college and career seeking culture that increases student success in all content areas.

AVID Secondary

AVID Secondary is comprised of the AVID elective class and schoolwide initiatives. The students in the AVID elective are students who have a desire to go to college and are willing to work hard. These students take rigorous courses that are preparing them for college, and the AVID elective is an academic support to allow them to be successful. A college and career going culture is created for all students that encompasses high expectations and success for all.

Pinellas voters renewed the Pinellas County Schools Referendum for a third time in November 2016. The Referendum strengthens reading, music and art programs; provides up-to-date technology; and helps recruit and retain quality teachers. Pinellas County voters have supported the half-mill property tax four times

since 2004, all times by large margins. An independent committee meets regularly to oversee the distribution of funds and ensure that money is spent as voters intended.

The Referendum:

- Supports students through new or expanded classroom libraries, additional supplies, increased training opportunities for teachers, and updated computers and technology.

- Funds intensive small-group literacy programs that help students read at grade level, instrument rental fees for students that can't afford them, and paid admission for field trips to museums and art galleries.
- Provides all schools with equitable funding for quality art supplies, equipment and technology that help students produce strong and award-winning works of art.

- Supplies instruments for elementary music classes, and equipment such as furniture, risers and music stands.
- Helps recruit and retain quality teachers: Eighty percent of the Referendum revenue supplements teacher salaries.



Summer Learning

The district has a wealth of summer learning opportunities for students. Experiences include STEM camps, 21st

Century iClass summer program, Summer Bridge or SAT preparation, French Immersion, Spanish Immersion and more. Pinellas County Schools and community partners have also created a summer reading program to help

stop the Summer Reading Slide. The program aims to put books in the hands of students during the summer and track their progress. Incentives are provided to increase engagement in reading during the summer.

Mandatory Health Screenings

The Pinellas County School District, in accordance with FL Statute 381.0056(4)(a), provides health screenings for students enrolled in public school. These screenings include vision, hearing, scoliosis (grade six only), and Body Mass Index, along with any appropriate follow-up. Body Mass Index may

be performed by either your child's school nurse or by their physical education teacher if enrolled in physical education.

If you do not want your child to participate in any of these screenings and wish that your child not be screened, you must notify your child's school in writing.
