PHUHS Summer Reading Assignment English I Honors University

Students are responsible for summer reading assignments on the first day of the fall semester. If a student chooses to change the level of course or class or program over the summer, the student will be held responsible for the summer assignments for the courses reflected on the schedule on the first day of school.

If you have questions regarding which course your student is enrolled in for the fall, please contact your guidance counselor. (Note: Counselors are not at school over summer break.)

Students can view their course requests for next year on their FOCUS account. At the top righthand corner, they switch the school year to 2020-2021. Once they are on that school year, they select the student information tab on the top left-hand side and then select course requests. This will show their course registrations for next year (including their English class with appropriate level of regular, honors, AP).

- How is an event or conflict in this chapter completely different from your life?

Instructions: Write the chapter number/name at the top of each journal response. Divide the paper in half. Label the left side "Question" and the right side "My response." Use quotations and textual evidence but focus on your response and ideas. You may choose different questions for each chapter but must respond to each choice at least twice.
