Color-Marking and Annotation

In your book, interact with the text by color-marking/highlighting words and phrases that relate to the categories listed below. Color-mark/highlight each of the 3 categories during reading, at least 2 different categories/colors per page to show real analysis and completion.

Category 1- labels, topics, definitions, theories (new concepts/ideas)

Category 2- specific examples, applications (literature, culture, history)

Category 3- narrator's voice (author Thomas Foster's opinions, insights or personal experiences)

As you read, also make connections with the text by writing notes in margins (known as annotation). These can be comments, reactions, definitions of unfamiliar words, or questions you have. Write at least 2 annotations per page in the margins.

Assignment:

Two-Column Notes Chart: Applying How to Read Literature Like a Professor to Film

After reading the book and completing the color-marking and annotation requirements, <u>complete a chart as depicted below by assembling information from both the book and a movie of your choice.</u>

Requirements: Chart is 4 pages, typed, 12 pt. Times New Roman, single-spaced. Include a Works Cited page (for a total of 5 pages whole assignment) for the book and the movie. See Works Cited model below. Bring your book, chart and Works Cited on the first day of class.

Concept/Idea & Quotation How to Read Literature Like a Professor

Example: book concept Christ figure

Quotation: Offer a quotation from the book to define or explain concept/idea. Include parenthetical citation as modeled below.

Example Quotations:

"often portrayed with arms outstretched" (Foster 126).

"believed to have had a confrontation with the devil, possibly tempted" (Foster 126).

"similar to the greatest sacrifice we know of" (Foster 126).

Quotation/Plot Event/Setting/Character plus Relevance Film/Movie Example: film/movie Dead Poets Society

Example: movie character Neil Perry

Relevance: <u>Provide your own words and at least 2 complete sentences to explain how the quotation, plot event, setting, or character from the film/movie relates to the concept/idea from the book *How to Read Literature Like a Professor*. For quotations from the film or book, include parenthetical citation.</u>

Example Relevance: The character of Neil Perry represents a Christ figure because he is portrayed with arms outstretched just before his death just moments after a confrontation with his father. Neil's father may be considered the "devil" who tempts Neil into a life of conformity. Conformity contradicts the life lessons Neil has learned, and he makes the "greatest sacrifice we know of" to maintain his free will (Foster 126).
