PTA and SAC meeting are held monthly with notification through our website, teacher newsletters, school marquee and a reminder in the agenda planners. This year, we will offer a Literacy Night, Math/Science Night and a Student-led Conference Night. Parent-teacher conferences are held at flexible times and can occur before, during, or after school. A late conference night has been scheduled in the fall for those needing evening conferences.

Our principal provides daily and flexible scheduled informational tours to meet the timely needs of all parents. These tours are offered to all enrolling parents of students at Starkey to start the communication process on a positive note.
