### INDEPENDENT CITIZENS REFERENDUM OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE (ICROC)

24-25 Quarter 3 Meeting June 18, 2025 Dunedin High School 9:00 a.m. – 12:21 p.m. Minutes

The Independent Citizens Referendum Oversight Committee (ICROC) conducted a meeting on Wednesday, June 18, 2025.

<u>District Representatives Present:</u> Donnika Jones, Chief Academic Officer; Gary Jepperson, Chief Financial Officer; Jonathan Ogle, PK-12 Visual Arts Specialist; Ajori Spencer, PK-12 Performing Arts Specialist; Kim Hill, Director, Student Experience; Carrie Greetham, Middle School Reading and Language Arts Specialist; Britt Moseley, High School Reading and Language Arts Specialist; and Bonnie Solinsky, Director, Charter Schools.

The meeting was officially called to order at 9:00 a.m. Visits were conducted in various Visual Arts classrooms and summer camps in session. ICROC committee members and PCS staff were able to observe camps in progress and interact with students, discussing current projects being worked on.

The business portion of the meeting resumed at 9:40 a.m.

The minutes report from the Quarter two meeting on March 12, 2025, were approved by the committee with minor corrections of an omitted word in the Budget section and a name correction in the Visual Arts report to reflect Ya La Ford.

### Budget:

Gary Jeppesen, Chief Financial Officer, presented an overview of quarter two's revenue and expenditure. He noted the district has collected \$66,139,144.41approximately 91.5% of revenue. The 2024-2025 teacher salary supplement is \$6,967 per teacher and the district has expended approximately 57% of the supplement amount through March, which is on track with previous years. A hard copy of the detailed reports was presented to each of the ICROC members.

### Referendum Plan Updates:

Jonathan Ogle, PreK-12 Visual Arts Specialist, reported during quarter 3 that the 2025 national winners of the Scholastic Art & Writing Awards were announced. Pinellas County students earned 16 Gold and Silver Medals—just two shy of their record of 18. Five Gold Medalists, accompanied by their art teachers, traveled to New York City for the National Awards Ceremony at Carnegie Hall, supported by PCS Referendum funding. They also visited the National Exhibition, and Mr. Ogle shared a video of their recognition at the ceremony's conclusion.

Pinellas County Schools (PCS) is widely recognized for its commitment to the arts, attracting exceptional art educators. Many teachers refer to PCS as an "arts oasis," with one high school art teacher from Michigan calling it "The Harvard of Arts." This reputation is strengthened by partnerships with museums, galleries, art centers, and organizations that help coordinate field trips and host student art exhibitions.

This school year, 8,102 student artworks were submitted, with 4,069 pieces displayed across 25 district and county-wide shows. PCS K-12 students earned 794 art awards, judged by professional artists and partner organizations. In recognition of these achievements, the PCS School Board proclaimed "March is Youth Art Month" during a Q3 meeting.

The 2025 Clearwater Arts Alliance "March is Youth Art Month" K-8 Exhibition Reception and Awards took place at Creative Pinellas on March 2, showcasing 140 two-dimensional student artworks. The event attracted over 400 attendees and was covered by Fox 13 News.

PCS students earned "Best of Show" honors in both the 13th and 14th Congressional District High School Art Competitions, with winning pieces displayed in the U.S. Capitol. This marks the third consecutive year PCS students have won both district competitions. Additionally, 14 secondary student photographers were selected for the 2nd Annual Jacob Kamis Photography Exhibition at the Florida Museum of Photographic Arts in Tampa, with four students receiving top awards. PCS students also claimed two of the top three awards in the 2025 Gasparilla Festival of the Arts High School Exhibition, continuing a three-year streak of top honors.

In the Florida Art Education Association's Florida Student Art Assessment, PCS students excelled, earning 169 Awards of Excellence and 43 Awards of Excellence with Distinction. PCS students also received the Best of Show Award, the Middle Division Award, and the Elementary Division Award. This program serves as the official statewide data source for visual arts education. This year, 1,700 entries were submitted by art teachers across Florida.

Thanks to PCS Referendum funding, 13 elementary and secondary Summer Visual Arts Camps will be offered across the county in June and July. Each camp focuses on specialized areas such as 3-D modeling, animation, digital art, traditional media, Advanced Placement Visual Arts, and mural-making. In preparation, the Visual Arts Department conducted teacher training, ordered supplies, and finalized logistics during Q3. This marks the 13th consecutive year of Summer Art Camps supported by the Referendum.

The Visual Arts Department received a request for a mural at the new Betty Ra Ivey Early Childhood Center. A mural-making camp was held there last week, where students collaborated with a professional artist. Fox 13 News also featured murals created by students at John Hopkins Middle School this spring. PCS Referendum funds enable local artists to work alongside students and teachers on these creative projects across all schools.

The continued support of the PCS Referendum is making a lasting impact on students. Celebrating student success through visual arts achievements not only validates their efforts but also builds momentum for future accomplishments.

**Ajori Spencer, Performing Arts Specialist**, reported that last year, we visited the Ignite Arts Camp, which is currently underway once again. This year, the camp hosts approximately 240 campers and is one of several Referendum-supported activities occurring in Quarter 4. More details about Ignite will be shared in our upcoming Q4 discussion.

Elementary music and marching band uniform funds have been exhausted through school needs and teacher requests. For elementary, these funds relate to both classroom equipment and instruments plus teacher training. Uniforms were purchased for Boca Ciega, Hollins, Seminole, and Palm Harbor HS. Band support, choral support, and theater/dance support spending is trending consistent with other years and will continue to deplete throughout Quarter 4. Though the choral line still shows a large sum, much of the choral budget is related to personnel and will naturally expire. Similarly, large assessment fees and instrument repair fees occur for band in Quarter 4.

Technology expenditures have also been consistent with past Quarter 3 expenditures. We were able to make our annual training equipment purchases during Q4 and will reflect in this budget in the next quarter's report. Our Music TIP training courses are always popular during the summer, especially with our new teachers as it allows them to become more acquainted with music and performing arts technologies.

Countywide Support has one of our largest remaining balances. Though current expenses relate to salary, large-scale events, and Ignite Youth Choir, Quarter 4 is when both Ignite Invitational and Ignite Arts Camp occur. These are two large projects that will expend a great deal of funds. Cluster requests, a process where teachers can fund recruitment activities, also pulls from this pot.

We continue to have strong community partners who support our students. We were able to use Referendum funding to allow students to study Scottish piping and drumming, to visit the Master Chorale of Tampa Bay's Going to the Show, and to bring in teaching artists to provide teacher trainings. One teaching artist was so popular, in fact, that another department brought him back this summer for elementary education training! None of these unique opportunities would be possible without Referendum. Our two TFO teaching artists are compiling reports to allow us to see the impact they have had across the district this year. Though we were originally planning to have three teaching artists this year, the hiring process took longer, and we were able to reallocate funds directly to string programs.

Overall, Performing Arts is in very good shape going into Q4 as we prepare for summer camp and a multitude of teacher training.

Training & Support

Salaries are being paid for five Referendum ITC (Instructional Technology Coordinators) to support technological initiatives and professional development. Partial salary is also being provided for one Library Media Technology Specialist (11%). Spending will be completed by June 2025.

### Interactive Technology for Classrooms

Purchase of Interactive Technology and supplies including Epson 725wi Interactive Projectors and ViewSonic Interactive Flat Panel displays to support replacement of obsolete/non-functioning equipment in classrooms were made.

Accessories were purchased as needed to support PCS Connects initiatives in classrooms. Spending will be completed by June 2025

### Curriculum Software

District wide Respondus subscription/renewals were purchased for PCS teachers and students. Respondus LockDown browser is a custom web browser teachers can use in their Canvas courses that prevents students from accessing other applications, websites, or functions during an online exam.

### Kim Hill, Director of Student Experience, Library Media

### District Library Media Enhancements

Referendum funds provided books for Battle of the Books (physical and digital copies) and competition materials, digital copies of Boys/Guys Read books and materials for competitions, library media planning materials and supplies, travel to support school-based media specialists, materials to support Student Film Festival, and author visits (on site field trip)

District-wide books were purchased for elementary and middle schools. Professional membership dues were also paid.

### School Library Media Enhancements

Final school Library Media purchases are being made as requested by school site personnel. Stipends for training continue to be supported for library media specialist training sessions and reading program sponsors.

Funds received each fiscal year continue to be spent on materials which support multi-media production labs and supplied as needed for TV production studios.

**Holly Slaughter, Elementary Reading and Language Arts Specialist**, reported that in quarter 3 referendum funds spending largely occurred in two areas:

240,000 in school-based enhancement funds. Schools use these funds to enhance classroom libraries, build rich texts that build knowledge connected to content areas, purchase magazine subscriptions, and more.

200,000 in module roll-out texts. 86,000 was spent on printing resources provided to teachers to meet the B.E.S.T. standards outlined in the modules, 36,000 on books, and salaries for 3 instructional staff developers who support teachers and students in schools.

End-of-Year year data is showing that Pinellas elementary reading is continuing to accelerate at a rate that outpaces the state. While we don't yet have comparison data to other larger districts or nearby districts, we can compare our data to the state and to our own data from last year. As an example, the state average proficiency rate in 3<sup>rd</sup> grade is 57%. Pinellas 3<sup>rd</sup> graders ended the year at 65% proficiency. We are outperforming the state by 8 points. When we compare our data to ourselves, we ended the year last year at 62% proficient, so we are up 3 points from last year. We could be where we are today without the benefit of these dollars.

Carrie Greethan, 6-8 Reading and Language Arts Specialist, and Britt Moseley, 9-12 Reading and Language Arts Specialist, highlighted the secondary reading referendum spending in quarter three.

Teachers received materials designed to enhance student engagement and enrich learning experiences within the supplemental curriculum for Modules E and F. In addition, student incentives were purchased for the Spring Break Challenge, which saw participation from over 1,000 middle school students.

Middle school supplies were purchased for select middle school sites to support and enhance Civics instruction.

Middle school team hosted two evening Module Rollout sessions for Modules E and F, drawing over 100 ELA and Reading teachers, coaches, and administrators. These sessions provided a deep dive into the upcoming, engaging curriculum. Additionally, we conducted two full-day Accelerating Achievement training courses, one for 6th grade ELA and one for 7th grade ELA—with 60 educators participating each day. Teachers analyzed their FAST PM 2 data, engaged in rich discussions about instructional focus and assessment alignment, and experienced the learning from a student perspective to improve the quality and clarity of their feedback.

Books were purchased to replenish the Book Bus in preparation for this summer, along with two module titles: George vs. George and A First Time for Everything. Additionally, When Kids Can't Read was acquired for an online book study available to middle school literacy teachers.

High school team hosted 112 teachers and administrators for our BEST training days. The days were filled with a review of the 5 Essentials of Instruction incorporated into how to deliver

rigorous instruction of the BEST ELA standards through teacher collaboration and planned seminars.

To support striving readers, licenses for ThinkCERCA were provided to reading teachers in targeted high schools along with lesson plans. Students from various high schools across the district attended a field trip to see the theater production of "When the Righteous Triumph" which supports the US History and 10th grade ELA BEST standards. Additionally, students from Seminole High School were able to attend Medieval Times and complete various cross-content activities related to their trip.

**Bonnie Solinsky, Director Charter and Home School Education**, shared the content area Quarter 3 updates for charter and home school education.

**Salary supplement** - You will see a reduction in funds as they continue to be used to supplement instructional salaries. At the end of quarter three, only 24% of allocated funds remained for use in quarter four.

**Visual arts**- in congruence with district schools, referendum funds provided charter schools opportunities to implement programs, hold community events and enhance student experiences.

Academie Da Vinci's annual K–8 Art Show in April was nothing short of extraordinary. The school was transformed into a vibrant gallery space filled with student masterpieces. The school also welcomed local artists who demonstrated their craft, sparking curiosity and creativity on every corner.

The Enterprise High School Artist-in-Residence program was jam-packed! Students engaged in a wide variety of artistic mediums including textiles, painting, and mask making. Guest artist Ashley Cantero, visiting from Tampa, inspired students with her creativity and engaging personality as she led projects in upcycled fashion and mask making. The connections formed between professional artists and the EHS community continue to be incredibly impactful, demonstrating that careers in the arts are not only possible but vital. These interactions validate the role of artists as essential members of our community. Additionally, field trips to the Ringling Museum and the world-class Salvador Dalí Museum gave students the opportunity to explore beyond the classroom and into the broader arts community.

At the end of quarter three, only 44% of allocated funds remained for use in quarter four.

### **Music/Performing Arts**

St. Petersburg Collegiate High School North art club participated in the college Spring Art Showcase. Referendum funds were used to purchase musical instruments and costumes for the showcase. This is the same club that had students perform at Foreigner concert in March. Students performed ten acts in the showcase.

Referendum funds provided Pinellas Preparatory Academy the opportunity to put on their school play "Beauty and the Beast". This play provided students with the opportunity to experience theater, foster creativity, confidence, collaboration, and public speaking skills.

In addition to a theater experience, our students also had the opportunity to participate in jazz band. Through this experience, students developed a musical mindset, teamwork and cultural appreciation. Students were provided with an outlet to showcase their talents at school and community events. This year our jazz band was showcased at Largo Central Park during the Christmas Holiday and the nursing home for veterans in May.

At Enterprise High School, music was also incorporated into the school day, with students participating in songwriting, drumming, and collaborative jam sessions. A major highlight of the semester was a powerful visit from international Reggae artist Natalli Rize, currently on a world tour. Her vibrant energy and timely message deeply resonated with both students and staff.

Academie Da Vincie's K–3rd grade students launched everyone into orbit this May with their dazzling performance of "Journey Through the Solar System." With bright costumes, original artwork, and a stage full of songs and dance, they brought the wonders of space to life for both students and members of the community.

The excitement soared even higher with the 4th–8th grade dancers in "Incandescence," a fiery and expressive showcase of movement held at Dunedin High School and again on campus. Their storytelling through dance captivated audiences and left everyone energized and inspired.

Meanwhile, the 4th–8th grade musical theatre performers dove "Under the Sea" in "The Little Mermaid, Jr." The production was a magical blend of singing, dancing, acting, and technical artistry that transported audiences both at Dunedin High School and at Academie Da Vincie. Students truly brought the beloved characters to life with heart, humor, and a whole lot of talent.

At the end of quarter three, only 35% of allocated funds remained for use in quarter four.

### **Technology**

At Discovery Academy of Science, the First Lego League (FLL) Robotics team competed against over 400 teams from across Florida, climbing their way to the Top 5 with a powerful project addressing coral bleaching. At the state championship in Kissimmee, they wowed judges with a dynamic, Shark Tank-style pitch and were officially named Innovation Project Champions, earning them the title of #1 in the state for Innovation. The team continues to train as they gear up for the FLL International Invitational this summer.

Additionally, our SeaPerch Marine Robotics team showcased their engineering skills by building an underwater ROV (remote operated vehicle) from scratch. They traveled to Orlando to compete in the regional competition and proudly brought home a second-place finish.

These accomplishments reflect the impact of referendum funding on hands-on, real-world STEM learning opportunities. Our students are not only learning about robotics, but also solving

global problems, building confidence, and gaining experience on a statewide and international stage.

At the end of quarter three, only 12% of allocated funds remained for use in quarter four.

### Reading

At Pinellas Preparatory Academy, referendum funds supported their Reading Specialist. This specialist provided intense reading interventions to their struggling students and ensured the opportunity to offer a robust literacy program to support all learners.

At the end of quarter three, only 8% of allocated funds for elementary reading remained for use in quarter four.

At the end of quarter three, only 49% of allocated funds for secondary reading remained for use in quarter four.

### Library/ Media

At the end of quarter three, only 1% of allocated funds remained for use in quarter four.

In closing, I am happy to share with you that at the end of quarter three only 23% of all allocated funds remain for use in quarter four!
