Happy Holidays Davis Families! As I reflect back on 2020 I am incredibly thankful for our Davis school community. Through these amazing times, you have been very supportive of our school, teachers, and most importantly your students. We have been through incredible highs and lows. Most importantly, we have made it to the end of this calendar year with the prospects of a brighter and hopeful 2021.

In the coming weeks and months we will continue to move our school community forward as we gradually return more and more students to our campus. Prekindergarten Application Opportunities

Pre-K 3 is for children who will be 3 years old on or before Sept. 1 of the school year they are participating. Voluntary Prekindergarten (VPK) is a free, statefunded program that prepares children for kindergarten. To participate, children must be 4 years old on or before Sept. 1 of the school year they are participating.

- Applying for VPK for the 2020-2021 school year: Beginning Jan. 4, Pinellas County Schools will offer free, full-day VPK at select locations throughout the county. This opportunity is only available for families who have not yet used their VPK Certificate of Eligibility (voucher) at a VPK program. Seats are available on a first come, first served basis. The district is accepting applications now.
- Applying for next school year (2021-2022): Families interested in Pre-K 3 or VPK for next school year will be able to apply Jan. 19 through Feb. 1. To participate in VPK, families should apply for a VPK Certificate of Eligibility (voucher) from the Early Learning Coalition beginning Jan. 1, 2021.

Counselor's Corner

<u>Classroom</u> Lessons

As a part of my comprehensive school counseling program, I visit classrooms approximately once every six weeks to provide direction instruction on a variety of topics. Classroom lessons fall into the academic, career, and/or personal-social domains and are aligned with the <u>Florida Standards</u>, <u>Florida</u> <u>School Counseling Framework</u>, and the <u>American School Counseling</u> <u>Association mindsets and behaviors</u>.

My November lesson topics included:

Kindergarten – Diversity 1st grade – Tattling vs. reporting 2nd grade – Career exploration 3rd grade – Conflict resolution 4th grade – Tolerance and giving compliments 5th grade – Career exploration

<u>Clothing Assistance</u>

Clothes to Kids provides new and quality used clothing to low-income, school-age children in Pinellas County, free of charge.

Requirements for Shopping at Clothes To Kids

(1) You must live in Pinellas County. (2) Your child(ren) must be school-age (4 year old PreK-12th grade) and attend a Pinellas County school. (3) Your family must be considered to be in financial need of assistance.

If you receive free/reduced lunch, call Clothes to Kids at 441-5050 to schedule an appointment. <u>You will need your free/reduced lunch letter to shop</u>.

If you do not receive free/reduced lunch, but need assistance, you may be able to receive a referral to Clothes for Kids from Mrs. Lofstedt (school counselor) or Mrs. Cohen (the school social worker). Once you receive the referral, you can call Clothes to Kids to schedule your appointment. Eligible children may shop twice in a twelve-month period (a referral is needed each time).

REQUIRED CHILD TRAFFICKING PREVENTION EDUCATION

Florida requires that all students in Kindergarten through fifth grade receive child trafficking prevention education. In Pinellas County these lessons are taught by school counselors. In my December and January lessons we focus on the Five Safety Rules from Monique Burr's Child Safety Matters, a research based child safety curriculum, to help students identify red flags and what to do if they find themselves in an unsafe or uncomfortable situation. At the end of the lesson, students will complete an activity to identify safe adults they can talk to. Students will be asked to share this assignment with their families.



Pack-A-Snack

We offer a weekend feeding program called Pack- A- Snack. Your child may be eligible to receive a bag with snacks in it every Friday. The food is provided to you at no cost.

If you choose to enroll your child, he/she will receive a bag with some snack sized items every Friday. All of the food is nonperishable.

Monitoring Your Child

Parenting is not an easy job, with responsibilities that seem to change every day. The daily tasks and roles you perform as a parent are bound to change as your child gets older. However, there is one task that is always important: monitoring your child's contact with his or her surrounding world. Parents need to be aware of their childrens' activities and interactions through every age and stage of growth. As a parent, you are the link between your child and the outside world. Research says that monitoring your child's activities is an important way to lower his or her chances of getting involved in situations you do not approve of, especially those that can be harmful. Not only does your involvement tell your child that he and his activities are worthwhile, it also makes you better able to see changes in your child that may indicate a problem. Monitoring who is in your child's life is especially critical to protecting them from harm or abuse. Children today are around more adults on a daily basis than ever before.

What does monitoring mean?

Monitoring means establishing firm guidelines and limits for your child to keep track of what is going on in his or her social world. Monitoring also means establishing clear expectations about what your child should always tell you AND that they can always talk to you about the things going on in their life.

How can parents monitor their children?

It is best to start monitoring your child early on, in ways that are age appropriate. This will help your child accept your involvement as a part of life. The earlier you begin monitoring, the easier it will be to continue this open communication as your child gets older. The following list can help in monitoring your child's activities:

- Know your child's friends (first and last names) and their home phone numbers.
- Know your child's friends' parents and their cell phone numbers, if possible.
- Insist that your child call and let you know where he or she is after school.
- Find out which adults are going to be home at any parties your child attends.
- Find out where your child is going and with whom. Find out how your child will get there and back home.
- Show up early to pick your child up so that you can observe his or her behavior.
- Make a list of your child's weekly activities and keep it in your day timer or on the refrigerator.
- Check up on your child occasionally to see that he or she is where they said they would be.

Careful monitoring does not require the ability to be with your child every minute of every day. Being a careful monitor combines asking questions and paying attention with regard to making decisions, setting limits, and encouraging your child's positive choices when you are not there. As your child gets older, monitoring may not seem as easy as it once was. Your child may begin to discover his or her own personality, which might clash with yours. The drive for independence during adolescent years can make communicating with— and monitoring—your child even more difficult. As a result, it can be very difficult to communicate. But being an active monitor can be as simple as asking some basic questions:

- Who is your child with?
- What do you know about the person(s) your child is with?
- Where is your child?
- What is your child doing?
- When will your child be leaving/returning home?

Why should parents monitor their children?

Parents should monitor their children for many reasons. However, the most important reason is to keep your child from being harmed. From teachers and coaches to babysitters to your own friends and family, your child comes in contact with more adults today than ever before. Monitoring their interaction with these people—as well as their own friends—is crucial to keeping your child safe. It's a sad truth that most cases of abuse (including sexual, physical, verbal and emotional) are inflicted by adults that a child already knows. 85-90% of child sexual abuse cases involve perpetrators known to the child, and in 35% of cases, a family member is the offender. Therefore, it is extremely important for parents to really know whom their child is spending time with.

Tools for Monitoring

- Teach children that respect does not always mean blind obedience to adults.
- Open the lines of communication when your child is young and keep those lines open.
- Take note if a child's behavior changes after being around specific adults.
- Work with the parents of your child's friends. Exchange each other's email addresses and phone numbers so that you can work together to monitor the kids as a group and help each other stay informed.
- Always check references of babysitters, counselors, etc. Many states have public registries that allow parents to screen individuals for prior criminal records and sex offenses. Once you have chosen the caregiver, drop in unexpectedly to see how your children are doing.
- Pay attention to patterns you see in adults. Is an adult paying special attention to your child or taking an uncomfortable interest in what your child is doing? Take the time to talk to your children about this person and find out why the person is acting in this way.

INFLUENZA (FLU) Cleaning to Prevent the Flu

Cleaning to Prevent the Flu

How long can the flu virus live on objects, such as doorknobs and tables?

The flu virus can "live" on some surfaces for up to 48 hours. Routine cleaning of surfaces may reduce the spread of flu.



What kills flu viruses?

Flu viruses are killed by heat above 167° F [75° C]. Common household cleaning products can also kill the flu virus, including products containing:

- chlorine
- hydrogen peroxide
- detergents (soap)
- iodophors (iodine-based antiseptics)
- alcohols



How should a caregiver handle a sick person's tissues or other items?

Make sure to wash your hands after touching the sick person. Also wash after handling their tissues or laundry.
