

On behalf of our faculty, welcome to our newest SHES families and to our returning families. We have had a productive few weeks as we kicked off the 2021-2022 school year! It was wonderful to have our Sea Turtles back in the classroom, face to face and engaged in learning!

Thank you to all who made it possible for us to return in a safe way. Our Plant Operations team (Bill, JJ, Rodney and Troy) have worked hard to prepare and they continue to implement a cleaning regiment to ensure our staff and students are in a sanitized and healthy environment. Our instructional staff have also been back to the business of prioritizing academics and ensuring student safety.

Now that everyone is familiar with arrival and dismissal processes, we have just a couple of minor suggestions to make things go more smoothly.

- \*Please refrain from using cell phones and/or smoking in the car line.
- \*Pull up to the most available loading/unloading space in the circle, leave no space between you and the car in front of you.
- \*Have a dashboard sign with your student's name and grade printed in large letters.

Thank you to those parents who are being patient and courteous to staff members and fellow parents as we safely load and unload students each day. Another important topic to consider this time of year is student safety when arriving or departing from school or the bus stop. If meeting primary students at a bus stop, arrive to the bus stop on time and practice walking your route with your child. If walking your child to campus from nearby, utilize the crosswalks and crossing guards. For your child's safety please do not drop them off along the street on a sidewalk around campus, or illegally cross Dr. MLK Street without the use of a crossing guard and crosswalk.

Now that Open House is concluded, I hope everyone has a better understanding of what is expected from your child academically. Teachers will begin scheduling conferences as initial formative assessments are completed. In order to build comprehension and fluency in both reading and math, I highly encourage each parent to find time to listen to your child read each evening Even in Kindergarten, students can retell what they see in the picture to build language, identify letters and sight words they are familiar with. Practicing math skills relative to your child's age is equally as important. Primary and intermediate students should focus on counting and practicing math facts to build fluency as well. And let's not forget Dreambox! Visit Clever to help your child access Dreambox so they can complete their required lessons each week. Parents are each child's first teacher, and we need to work together to ensure that the foundation is established to build upon.

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#### Notes from Nurse Jen!

Head lice are most common in preschool and elementary school-aged children. Each year millions of schoolaged children in the United States get head lice. Head lice are found worldwide, and anyone can get it. Head lice are tiny bugs roughly the size of a sesame seed. They are usually pale and gray in color, but their colors may vary. They feed on small amounts of blood on the scalp and can live up to two days without a blood meal.

Head lice live for about 28 days. They develop in 3 phases: egg (nit), nymph, and adult louse.

- 1. Egg or nit. Eggs or nits hatch in 6 to 9 days. Eggs are usually found within 4 to 6 mm of the scalp and do not survive if they are farther away.
- 2. Nymph. The nymph looks like an adult head louse but is much smaller (about the size of a pinhead [1.5 mm]). Nymphs become adults about 7 days after hatching.
- 3. Adult. An adult louse can multiply fast and lay up to 10 eggs a day. It takes only about 12 to 14 days for newly hatched eggs to reach adulthood. This cycle can repeat itself every 3 weeks if head lice are left untreated.

Regular checks for head lice are a good way to catch head lice early and avoid infestation. Below is a list of how you can check your child's hair.

- Seat your child in a brightly lit room.
- Part the hair.
- Look for crawling lice and for nits on your child's scalp a section at a time.
- Live lice are hard to find. They avoid light and move quickly.
- Nits will look like small white or yellow-brown specks and be firmly attached to the hair near the scalp. The easiest place to find them is at the hairline at the back of the neck or behind the ears. Nits can be confused with many other things such as dandruff, dirt particles, or hair spray droplets. The way to tell the difference is that nits are firmly attached to hair, while dandruff, dirt, or other particles are not.
- Use a fine-tooth comb to help you search the scalp section by section.
- \*Always check with your child's doctor before beginning any head lice treatment such as medicated lice shampoos.

Other things to remember when treating head lice:

- Wash your child's clothes, bed linens, towels, hats and backpack in hot water and dry on high heat if they were used within two days of finding head lice.
- DO NOT spray pesticides in your home. They expose you and your family to dangerous chemicals and are not needed to treat head lice.
- Anyone who has come in close contact should be checked and treated when necessary.
