As we begin to move into our Spring statewide assessment window in the coming months, please be sure to take the time to periodically check on your child's progress through the parental portal or their bi -weekly progress reports. By knowing the status of your child, you can help guide them in their practice at home. Also, nothing beats reading with your student and talking about what they read every day.

Acceptance Period: February 10th-21st

- Be sure to go in and check your invitations.
- You must select one or remain on the wait list for your others. If you do not accept a seat that is offered during the acceptance window, your application with that program is erased.



- Please ensure that all phone numbers are up-to-date at school and in Focus.
- Students being picked-up early should be minimized to maximize learning. For those that are necessary, please do so before 2:10PM to avoid afternoon dismissal concerns.
- We need all learners in class by 8:45AM each day. Please help us reduce student tardies at school.
- Please maintain regular communication with your child's teacher and attend scheduled conferences to stay abreast of your child's progress.
- When visiting the campus, be it for a conference or to eat with your students on Friday, be sure you are signing in with our front office and getting a visitor's pass.
- Remember the front lot of the school is for buses only from 8:05-8:45am & 2:00-3:25pm. If you are parked in the bus circle during that time, for the safety of our students, you will have to wait until they depart before pulling out so you may want to park in the parent parking lot instead.

We are very proud of the progress our scholars make with their Spanish language learning every day. This is their first step on becoming bilingual if they continue the second language acquisition studies throughout their educational career and beyond, and the benefits are countless. Their learning in general may become faster and easier, their problem-solving skills may improve as well as their creativity, and their career opportunities will definitely increase in adulthood, just to mention a few.

On the other hand, learning a second language nowadays has come a long way. Continuous and intense studies related to second language acquisition has led to the development of new ways to teach young children to make it more appealing to them, and to speed the process as well. We are certainly lucky to have the Spanish language learning program here at Bay Point Elementary Magnet School!!!

In February our 5th grade scholars will be learning about South America, a few important facts about each country, including their names and their capitals. In 4th grade they will learn about the Community (names of places, i.e., bank, super market, park, school, museum, zoo, etc...). In 1st and 2nd grade the Unit of Study will be Telling Time in Spanish, and in Kindergarten they will explore, and practice vocabulary related to Geometric Shapes. In addition, we will continue practicing math in Spanish from Kinder through 5th grade: additions, subtractions, multiplication, etc..., as well as practicing and interacting with Science Vocabulary in 3-4-5 grades (FSA material).

FLU SEASON AHEAD

Dear Parent or Guardian:

We are entering the time of year when we see influenza (flu) and other respiratory viruses at school. We want to let you know what steps we are taking to keep our school community healthy and how you can help.

Respiratory infections, such as the flu and common colds (colds), are spread when people come in close contact with sick people and inhale airborne droplets, or come in contact with contaminated surfaces. Flu and cold symptoms can sometimes be difficult to tell apart, but consider this:

	FLU	COMMON COLD
How it begins	Sudden	Gradual
Cough	Severe	Mild to moderate
Muscles	Achy	None to mild aches
Stuffy, runny nose	Sometimes	Common
Tiredness	Severe	Mild
Fever	None to high grade	None to low grade
Complications	Bronchitis/Pneumonia	Earache/Sinus infection

If symptoms persist or worsen, make an appointment with your healthcare provider to be evaluated. The flu can be serious for children of all ages, causing them to miss school, activities, or even be hospitalized.

We take the health of our students seriously and work very hard to keep these viruses from spreading. We regularly clean frequently touched areas such as door knobs, stair rails, telephones, computer keyboards, and bathroom faucets and fixtures. We also instruct students and staff to follow the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) *Take 3* approach to fight the flu:

1. Get the flu vaccine every year

2. Take everyday preventative actions to stop the spread of germs:

Wash hands often with soap and water, or use alcohol-based hand sanitizers when soap and water are not available,

Cover coughs with a disposable tissue or cough into their sleeve,

Avoid touching their eyes, nose, and mouth,

Avoid close contact with sick individuals,

Avoid sharing cups and eating utensils, and

Stay home when sick.

3. Take flu antiviral drugs if your healthcare provider prescribes them

You can help us maintain a healthy school environment in a variety of ways:

- * Make sure your children receive all recommended immunizations, including an annual flu vaccine,
- * Reinforce all of the above preventive behaviors practiced at school,
- * Make sure children get plenty of exercise, sleep, and healthy food, and
- * Keep sick children home, especially if they have a fever above 100° F, diarrhea, vomiting, or a severe cough.

Please note that any student with a fever <u>must</u> stay home from school for at least 24 hours after the fever is gone without the use of fever-reducing medicines.

If you have any questions, please contact your school nurse. Together we can have a healthy winter and spring!

- * Set the example. Let children see you read.

- * Load money on E-Wallet. Go to Scholastic.com/fair and find Bay Point's homepage. Click on E-Wallet and set up an account. You can set a spending limit and only get charged what your child actually spends.
- * Parents can shop with their child before and after school. Please note the open times above.
- * Friday is open shopping day for any student who forgot to bring their money on their assigned shopping day.
- * Students can bring extra money to buy a gift certificate for their teacher in any amount so their teacher can buy books for the classroom.
