IN THE LAB

During the month of April in the science lab, the Kindergarten students will be looking at plants and their parts. First graders will be discovering how sounds are produced and carried. Second graders will continue learning about different habitats and adaptations of plants and animals in those habitats. Third graders will be measuring mass and volume of different kinds of materials. Fourth graders will be studying fish adaptations and going on their annual field trip to the Ft. DeSoto grass flats. Fifth grade students will be measuring mass, volume, and density of different materials and then experimenting with mixtures and solutions.

SCIENCE FAIR

Science Fair time is rapidly approaching. The scientific process is a major part of all sciences and it is important that students learn these early. Twenty five percent of the fifth grade FCAT questions address scientific thinking and processes. Here at Bay Point, we incorporate these skills all year long in each unit of study at all grade levels. The science fair is a culmination of the students learning at the end of the year.

Each year, the students at the 3rd, 4th, and 5th grade levels are required to complete an individual or small group project while Kindergarten, 1st grade, and 2nd grade do whole class projects. Most of the teachers use the projects as a part of the final report card grade based on a district developed rubric. Most of the experiments will be done in class unless a child chooses to study something that requires more elaborate apparatus or special data gathering.

All students will need a project journal and a display board. These two items will be for sale at school in May. Completing the project display board may be done at home.

I will hold a parent workshop on *How To Do a Science Fair Project* from 7:00 – 8:00 PM April 23rd for parents of 3rd, 4th, and 5th graders in the science lab.







Steps you take each day can help promote a lifetime of healthy eating:

- Respect your child's hunger
- Stay calm.
- Keep an eye on the clock. Nix juice and snacks for at least one hour before meals.
- Don't expect too much.
- Limit liquid calories. if your child fills up on milk or juice, he or she may have no room for meals or snacks.
- Start small. Offer several foods in small portions. Let your child choose what he or she eats.
- Boycott the clean plate club.
- Leave taste out of it. Talk about a food's color, shape, aroma and texture — not whether it tastes good.
- Be patient with new foods.
- Eat breakfast for dinner.
- Make it fun.
- Recruit your child's help. At the grocery store, ask your child to help you select fruits, vegetables and other healthy foods.
- Set a good example. If you eat a variety of healthy foods, your child is more likely to follow suit.
- Be sneaky. Add chopped broccoli or green peppers to spaghetti sauce, top cereal with fruit slices, or mix grated zucchini and carrots into casseroles and soups.
- Keep it separate.
- Stick to the routine. Serve meals and snacks at about the same times every day.
- Minimize distractions. Turn off the television during meals, and don't allow books or toys at the table.
- Don't offer dessert as a reward.

Math drills and games should not be viewed as competitors. Drill tends to become tedious and, therefore, gradually loses its effectiveness. Games relieve the tedium because children enjoy them. Indeed, children often wish to continue to play games during their free time, lunch, and at home.

Drill exercises aim primarily at building fact and operations skills. Practice through games shares these objectives, but, at the same time, games often reinforce other skills including calculator skills, money exchange and shopping skills, logic, geometric intuition, and intuition about probability and chance (because many games involve numbers that are generated randomly.)

TWO-FISTED PENNIES GAME

Materials: 10 pennies for each player Number of Players: 2 or more

Directions: Players count out 10 pennies, and then split them between their two hands. (Help children identify their left and right hands.)

Call on several children to share their amounts. For example: "My left hand has 1 and my right hand has 9; left hand 3 and right hand 7; left hand 4 and right hand 6; left hand 5 and right hand 5." Record the various splits for any given number on the chalkboard.

Partners continue to play using different total numbers of pennies - for example, 9, 12, 20.

Option: Partners take turns grabbing one part of a pile of 20 pennies. The other partner takes the remainder of the pile. Both players count their pennies, secretly. The partner making the grab uses the count to say how many pennies must be in the partner's hand. ("I have 12, so you must have 8." The eventual result is many addition names for 20. Change the number of pennies in the pile to practice addition names for other numbers.
