5517.01 Policy against Bullying/Harassment (Grades K-12 and Adults) 5517.01 LA POLÍTICA CONTRA LA INTIMIDACIÓN Y EL ACOSO (K-12 grados y adultos) 5517.03 Teen Dating Violence and Abuse Policy (Grades 7-12) 5517.03 – CITAS DE ADOLESCENTES VIOLENTAS Y ABUSIVAS (7-12 grados)

In response to the state law, *the Jeffrey Johnston Stand Up for all Students Act*, the School Board adopted a policy that prohibits bullying and harassment. The policy ensures that all students, employees, and volunteers learn and work in an environment that is safe, secure, and free from harassment and bullying of any kind. Florida is now one of 49 states with a law regarding bullying in schools.

The Policy defines Bullying and Cyber Bullying as systematically and chronically inflicting physical hurt or psychological distress on one or more students or employees and may involve but is not limited to: teasing, social exclusion, threat, intimidation, stalking, including cyberstalking, physical violence, theft, sexual, religious, or racial harassment, public humiliation, and destruction of property.

The policy defines harassment as any threatening, insulting, or dehumanizing gesture, use of data or computer software, or written, verbal or physical conduct directed against a student or employee that: Places a student or employee in reasonable fear of harm to his or her person or damage to his or her property, has the effect of substantially interfering with a student's educational performance, opportunities, or benefits, has the effect of substantially disrupting the orderly operation of a school.

La Junta Escolar ha adoptado una política que prohíbe la intimidación y el acoso respondiendo a una ley estatal: En respuesta a la ley estatal, Jeffrey Johnston Stand Up for all Students Act. Esta política asegura que todos los estudiantes, empleados y voluntarios aprendan y trabajen en una ambiente que sea seguro, sin peligros y libre de cualquier clase de intimidación y acoso. Florida es ahora uno de los 47 estados que tiene una ley referente a la intimidación en las escuelas.

La política define la intimidación como infligir dolor físico o angustia psicológica de manera sistemática y crónica a uno (1) o más estudiantes o empleados y pueden incluir entre otras: bromas, exclusión social, amenaza, hostigamiento, acoso, incluyendo acoso cibernético, violencia física, robo, acoso sexual, religioso o racial, humillación pública y destrucción de la propiedad. La política define el acoso como cualquier gesto amenazante, insultante o deshumanizante; uso de datos o programas computarizados; o conducta escrita, verbal o física dirigida contra un estudiante o empleado, que: Coloque al estudiante o empleado en temor razonable de daño a su persona o a su propiedad; tenga el efecto de interferir sustancialmente con el desempeño, oportunidades o beneficios educativos de un estudiante; tenga el efecto de perturbar sustancialmente la operación ordenada de la escuela.

All field trip chaperones must be registered volunteers. Any person wishing to provide transportation to a field trip location must also have a Level II volunteer clearance and proof of insurance. School Health Services for 2016-17

School nurses identify and assist students with health-care needs during the school day. Every school has a school nurse assigned either full or part time. A clinic card is sent home with each student at the beginning of every school year. Please complete the cards promptly with the important health and contact information and update the information as often as needed.

Medications should be taken at home whenever possible. If medications (both prescription and over the counter) are required at school, a medication card (available from your school) must be completed each year. No student may transport medications to or from school.
