In each of the chapters, look for the answers to these questions and highlight them, followed by a *short annotation of explanation or label in the margin of the text:

- In this section, what is evident about the speaker/author?
- In this section, how does the reader know the message of the author?
- In this section, what words or phrases tell the reader about what the author's understanding of his
- audience is? Not <u>who</u> the audience is, but the author's understanding of their needs, values or beliefs?
 In this section, how does the reader know the currency (how current the topic is) by what the author writes?
- In this section, where is an indication of the importance of the topic and what inspired the author to write about this in the first place?

The sections of the novel are:

- The Mentor
- The Big Break
- What You Own
- Hollywood or the Token
- Permission to Fail
- The Turnaround
- Hamilton Act 1: Our Town
- Hamilton Act 2: The New American Dream
