

Since then, she has been an inspiration to her classmates and teachers. Nicole shared some insight into the devastation and pain that the people in Puerto Rico experienced during and after the deadly storm. She reports her family still does not have electric power. However, her parents do have running water now, but it is not drinkable.

During the first week of classes Nicole shared that she wanted to find a job. Her teacher, Karlton Ballard, encouraged her to speak English as much as possible and apply for jobs even though she was very frightened to interview. She quickly found a job at Marshalls. Then as her confidence grew she obtained another part time job at Walgreens. Currently, Nicole is taking online courses in Marketing through the Huertas College University in Caguas, Puerto Rico, working two part time jobs, and attending ESOL classes in the evening. Nicole has a contagious smile and a quiet determination to be successful and confront challenges. Your teachers are proud of you, Nicole!


Saint Petersburg College, Tarpon Springs

He is excited to return to the accounting field, which was his profession in his native country of Venezuela. Mario and his wife Monica were forced to seek political asylum here in the United States and resuming his career (thanks to his improved English skills) has made him feel he is finally making up for lost time due to his immigration journey.

To accommodate growing class sizes in the Oldsmar ESOL program, we have acquired a new classroom in Building 4. This has allowed us to move one teacher and her students out of the very small breakout room (which could only hold 16 students) and into a full-size classroom that can accommodate 30+ students. This change has enabled us to expand our class offerings and ensure students are comfortable in their classroom environment.



More from the Oldsmar Facility

I have begun to include mini-lessons regarding each of the 50 United States. In this week's lesson, we started with a KWL (what we know, what we want to know, and what we learn) graphic organizer and shared any information the students already knew about Alabama. They then split into teams and worded to complete state puzzles that contained symbols representing the capitals, landmarks, resources, and more. After completing the puzzles, the students wrote down information including bordering states and other facts.

Another activity we do in class regards couponing. I teach my adult ESOL students how to save money and be thrifty. I have a PowerPoint that teaches couponing 101 to EXTREME couponing techniques. I have a coupon box where students can swap coupons they need putting in coupons they don't need but may be needed by others. Examples can be diapers for babies as well as pet food. Students enjoy this activity which takes up ten minutes but teaches an awareness to the many possibilities to save, and sometimes MAKE money!

As a teacher, I love to see students learn geography and the importance of globalization in our economy. I believe it is vital to understand the geography of past times and how that has played important roles in the evolution of people, their ideas, places, and environments. To visualize a mental map of the country we live in helps my students understand the "where" of events and sometimes also the many "whys" that caused historical immigration, as well as why some people today choose to move to different states.





Despite being on the autism spectrum (not a disability!), having no real passion for math (he is a writer at heart) Tio has worked his way from E level to D level in only 1 year. He attends regularly, often asks to take work home, and continues to plug away at math, often despite repeated frustration. He is a true inspiration to me, and hopefully the other students as well.

Understanding the language of mathematics

Understanding mathematical word problems with ELL students (an excerpt)

Word problems in mathematics often pose a challenge because they require that students read and comprehend the text of the problem, identify the question that needs to be answered, and finally create and solve a numerical equation. Many ELLs may have difficulty reading and understanding the written content in a word problem. If a student is learning Enalish a second language, he might not yet know key terminology needed to solve the equation. In other words, ELLs who have had formal education in their home countries generally do not have mathematical difficulties; hence, their struggles begin when they encounter word problems in a second language that they have not yet mastered (Bernardo, 2005). For this reason it is recommended that students learn key terminology prior



attempting to solve mathematical word Once English language learners know the key terminology used in mathematical word problems, it will be easier to learn how to write numerical equations. It is important for teachers to provide ELLs with opportunities to learn and practice key vocabulary words. While key words are very important, they are only part of the process. Understanding the language in word problems is critical for all students.

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They need to know the meaning of words. But because words are often differently used and are set problems up differently, there are some cautionary messages. Here is an example of a problem that uses "fewer than" to set up а subtraction equation.

marbles

Maria 24 which is 8 fewer than Paolo has. How many marbles does Paolo have? If we were to only focus using "fewer than" is a signal to pick out the numbers and subtract. The student immediately make conclusion that the answer is 16, but that is not what the problem is asking, and the child would be wrong. 
