Greetings Azalea Families,

I hope you had a restful Spring Break. We are in the midst of FSA testing for our 3rd, 4th and 5th graders. Teachers and students have been working all year and are prepared for the test. The outcomes of these tests determine many things. Our school grade, promotion for third grade and for fourth grade, the scores are used to determine placement in advanced classes in 6th grade. Please remember to have your children here on time with lots of rest and a good breakfast.

Our PTA Carnival is Friday, April the 7th. We have staff lined up to sit in the dunk tank, bounce houses, games, prizes and great food. We hope to see all our families there. I know I can't wait to see everyone. This is a great family event and you don't want to miss out!

Parents of eligible students have received letters regarding Summer Bridge. We will continue to send these notices home, as we hope you will take advantage of this five week extended school year. I do not take specific teacher requests during this process. Every teacher at Azalea works with families and students to ensure their academic success. In addition to all the other great Reading programs we have here at Azalea Elementary, this year we have purchased " myOn ", an exciting new literacy program that gives our students access to a personalized library of over 5,000 digital books!

myON integrates student ability with technology, to match their reading level with their preferred choice of books. Teachers and students can monitor their reading achievement. As parents, you can share in the learning and excitement with your child through his/her personal dashboard. The dashboard will illustrate how many books they have opened and read, as well as their reading growth.

In myON, students have their own virtual backpack of books from which to choose. There are many other features, such as highlighting, drawing, dictionary, quizzes, and a 'read to me' option. Students can also rate the books they have read, and share with other students!

myON can be accessed anywhere with Internet... school, home, libraries, and on mobile devices—for online and offline reading. Students log in with their R2.D2 user, and s.8 digit district password.

All of his thoughts are very important to him and when he has something to say, his words rumble and grumble in his tummy, they wiggle and jiggle on his tongue, and press firmly against his teeth, right before he ERUPTS (or interrupts). 2017 K-5 District Science Showcase and Family Science Day


- Who: The K-5 District Science Showcase is open to <u>all</u> Pinellas County families

Parent Input

As the current school year makes its final turn around the track, we begin making plans for next school year (2017-2018) and we would like for you to provide us with information about your child.

The school will be accepting written input (letters) or emails that you would like to provide regarding your child's placement for the 2017-2018 school year.

Please do not submit requests for specific teachers. Grade level teaching assignments can change over the summer. In the past, these unexpected situations have forced the school to make teaching assignment changes over the summer time:

- A teacher transferring to another school site
- A teacher receiving a job promotion.
- An unexpected leave of absence.
- A teacher submitting a resignation.

Written input (letters) must be submitted in a sealed envelope to our elementary front office, to the attention of Principal Mike Rebman or you can email me by the close of the school day, Friday, April 28, 2017. The school will not be accepting letters after this date. Your letter will include your child's name, your name, date, the character qualities of the teacher you'd like for your child, and why this would be the right fit.

Student placement consideration will be determined by the Class size amendment (18:1 K-3, and 22:1 4, 5), achievement, behavior, and diversity. We will share any written input you provide to us with the teams. We assure you that our staff will work as a team putting students' needs first, and your input will be strongly considered, but requests will not be guaranteed. Before the end of the school year a generic grade level materials list will be posted on our school website.

In early August, prior to the start of the school year, students and families will be invited to campus to Meet the Teacher, view class lists, review individualized class supply sheets, and tour the school. If you should have any questions, please don't hesitate to call us at 727-893-2187.

How to support your child struggling with homework

Homework struggles are real and no one understands that better than Matt Larson, PhD. He is currently the president of the National Council of Teachers in Mathematics. Prior to that he was a school district map supervisor and a high school and middle level math teacher. Here's his advice on handling homework you may not even understand yourself!

"There's a long history in the United States of homework falling in and out of favor. It cycles about every 15 to 20 years. And for a while, we really emphasize homework, and then there's a backlash to it and we back off. Here's the most important thing to keep in mind: students need to practice. Anyone who is good at whatever it is they do engages in practice - whether that's athletics, playing a musical instrument, whatever it might be, you have to practice.

"If your child comes home with some homework and you're not sure how to do it, first of all, that's okay. Ask a lot of 'why' questions. Ask your child if they worked one like this in class. Ask your child to explain how they did it in class. Ask your child perhaps if they could draw a picture or use another strategy.

"Don't communicate any messages like, 'Oh, math was hard for me when I was in school too, so I'm not surprised you're struggling with this.' This is a great opportunity to maintain a positive attitude, support your child in persevering. But if they get stuck that's okay! In fact, if they get frustrated, just stop the whole process and encourage your child to go back to school the next day and asked for help.

"Teachers today in many states are in the process of implementing new standards. Those new standards are more rigorous, focused than they've been in the past. So teachers are working very hard to in some cases learn new content and do new instructional strategies right along with the students. I think it's really critical for parents to be supportive of teachers, and not just their child in the classroom. Go to a Parent-Teacher Night, Curriculum Night - whatever it might be called at your school. Ask questions. As a parent, I would ask questions like, "Is my child just learning how to do something, or they also learning why it works?" And to make sure there's a problem-solving focus in the classroom."


School Advisory Council

The **School Advisory Council** (**SAC**) is a team of people representing various segments of the community -- parents, teachers, students, administrators, support staff, business/industry people and other interested community members.

Each Florida school must have a SAC. This requirement fits well with Pinellas County public schools since our district always has encouraged parent and teacher participation in strategic planning. As required, each SAC includes the principal and an "appropriately balanced" number of "stakeholders." These stakeholders are individuals representative of the ethnic, racial and economic makeup of a given school's community. Each SAC is responsible for strategic planning for the school improvement plan for its school. The organization works jointly with the principal and staff after analyzing relevant data.

Are you interested in being on our SAC committee? You will be a part of reviewing our school improvement plan, reviewing school wide learning results, etc. Be a part of how we run our school. Take Our Daughters and Sons to Work Day

This annual event, which will be celebrated nationally on Thursday, April 27, will not take place within the district due to the administration of the Florida Standards Assessments.

However, we do provide a very flexible means for you and your child/children to take part in this day when it does not conflict with the state of Florida testing window. You can request suitable times and days for you and your child/children to participate in such a day as long as it does not conflict with already scheduled activities at the school and gaining prior approval of all parties concerned.

If the child/children are not scheduled for testing and a parent wants to take them out of school on April 27th to participate in the Take Your Son/Daughter to Work Day at their workplace, then such an absence would be an excused absence. Please work through the principal(s) of the school(s) of your child/children to arrange a Take Your Child to Work Day.



In an effort to increase families reporting student absences in a timely manner, we are implementing an electronic method as another option you can utilize. Our thoughts are that this will keep us better informed on why students are not in school and allow us to target resources to best support our families. On our website you will find a new icon that says "Report Student Absence". This icon is on our website page located with the other global icons. When families click on this icon it generates an email that will go to the Outlook mailboxes of two individuals designated at the school. Families can use this method to report absences in addition to all the existing ways such as calling and writing notes. You are also able to include an attachment such as a doctor's note.

ATTENDANCE WORKS

Help your child reach his or her maximum potential.

Our slogan for attendance this year is Attend Today. Achieve Tomorrow. Our average daily attendance is 95.3%. Any day missed is lost instructional time that cannot be replaced. Visible learning, synthesizing analyses of 138 factors that affect achievement show that teacher instruction using high yield strategies is ranked 4th and students' self-assessment of their learning is #1. Students that are not in school cannot achieve at their highest level. So...Attend Today. Achieve Tomorrow.



Never Been Absent (NBA) is our NEW way of tracking and celebrating perfect attendance on a monthly basis and of course it will be basketball themed. We will do this by individual student and by grade level celebrating the classroom with the highest daily attendance average. We will also maintain a courtyard bulletin board where we can track this information for all to see. This is extremely exciting as this is yet another way we monitor and support our little eagles.

Consequences for Noncompliance

Azalea Elementary has a mandatory uniform policy. All students must arrive to school in uniform every day. If the uniform policy cannot be supported by the family, ultimately the parent should request a school without uniforms.

First Offense: There will be a teacher/student conference as to why the student is not in uniform. A letter of notification on non-compliance will be sent home. The letter must be signed and returned to the classroom teacher.

Second Offense: Student will be referred to the office for a uniform conference. A mandatory parent contact will be made to remind parents of the uniform requirement. A second reminder letter from the office will be sent home to be signed and returned to an administrator.

Third Offense: Student will be referred to the office for a uniform conference. A mandatory parent contact will be made by the social worker to remind parents of the uniform requirement and to see if parents need some assistance with compliance.

Fourth Offense: Mandatory parent conference with school leadership.

Fifth Offense: Final parent conference to include input from the Director of School Operations to discuss an administrative transfer to school where uniforms are not required.

Dear parents,

The students in Mr. Carneiro's ASD class are baking all natural homemade dog biscuits and selling them to anyone who would like to purchase some. 100% of the money raised will be donated evenly between:

- Our local SPCA to purchase pet supplies and food.
- Our local PARC organization to purchase supplies and food for individuals with disabilities.
- Our Azalea Elementary ASD units to help fund supplies and CBI's.

The students will be participating in baking dog biscuits once a week. In addition to supporting wonderful organizations, students will be learning important life skills. Cooking will be infused into the curriculum as a vital health and functional life skills component. Students will learn how to follow directions, work on reading and listening skills, sequencing, communicating appropriately with one another, use math for measuring and adjusting recipes, practice with a variety of practical kitchen utensils, and be an active participant in selling biscuits - which includes collecting money and dispersing change. PCS Parent Cadre Meetings

Several of our SAC and PTA board members have attended the Parent Cadre Meetings and brought back important information from the school district to share with our school. PCS Superintendent Dr. Grego created the Parent Leadership Cadre in an effort to empower families to be advocates for Pinellas County Schools. The initiative, which supports Item 7, Goal 5 of the district's Strategic Plan, invites School Advisory Council and Parent Student Teacher Association chairs from each school to regularly scheduled evening sessions with Dr. Grego. The sessions rotate each month among families of elementary, middle, and high school students who live in north, mid, and south Pinellas. In this way, parent leadership at every school in the district has three opportunities to meet with the Superintendent between September and May. Each session includes a presentation by Dr. Grego on key issues facing the district and a question-and-answer session during which time parents can share their concerns. Parents eFlyer Info

We have moved to this green way of work to share flyers. Right now we have two pages of flyers for Azalea Elementary in our PeachJar. These are flyers not only from our school but from the community related to the Arts to Lacrosse to BBQ cook-offs. PeachJar is a great resource for our families. We have saved 52,250 sheets of paper and 6.3 trees have been saved. In addition, posting school flyers in this electronic backpack removes a significant administrative burden from teachers, office staff, and volunteers. You will receive electronic flyers from your child's school only, once per week.

No action is required on your part. You will receive a welcome email from our service provider (Peachjar) that includes a username and password. This is provided to give you the opportunity to manage your account and flyer delivery preferences. You do not need to login to receive or view school eflyers but you must login in order to "opt-out" of this delivery service. Please keep in mind that this new electronic method of school flyer delivery will replace all paper distribution of flyers at your child's school. By opting out, you may miss pertinent information pertaining to your child and other school events.

This system is used exclusively for distribution of school-approved flyers. Your email address will not be shared or used for any other purpose. To view school-approved eflyers, simply click the Peachjar button on your school's website homepage. We also suggest you add **school@peachjar.com** to your email contacts. When you receive your first eflyer, be sure to click "always display images."


