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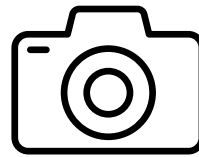
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## College

With another successful year for DHS Swim and Dive, the team placed second overall at their annual Districts Championship.

The Boy's and Girl's Swim and Dive season began in late July, climbing up to the top 8 in the district overall. The team has had a very outstanding year, winning the majority of their events and almost all swimmers making the cut for Districts. Districts was held at the Southwest Recreation Complex on October 21st, and both the boys and girls won second place overall. There were also four District champions, winning first place in their event: Sophia Presby in the 200 IM and 100 Breaststroke, Campbell Hudson in the 500 free, Sean Wallace in the 100 backstroke, and finally, Milena Fix in the 100 Butterfly.

Most swimmers and all relays will be progressing to Regionals, held on October 28th at the North Shore Aquatic Complex. After this, qualifying swimmers will be able to attend the State Championship, going up against some of the fastest high school swimmers in the state. Regardless of the stakes, the team is feeling confident about their chances to advance.

"The team's biggest strength is that they work and practice hard," said head coach Tiffany Rayel. Rayel is a health a P.E. teacher at Dunedin, and she has been coaching swim for 17 years. When asked what the team could do next year to move up and get first at Districts, Rayel said they could "recruit more talented athletes, show up to consistently to practice, and put in the effort!"

## Ada Lovelace

Countess Ada Lovelace (1815-1852) was born on December 15th, 1815. Tutored by some of the most brilliant minds the 19th century had to offer, Lovelace's mind grew strong. At the age of twelve she could perform magnificent calculations in her head and attempted to build a flying machine.

Lovelace's fate in history would be cemented when she went to a party hosted by the inventor Charles Babbage. Babbage showed Lovelace his Analytical Engine, a machine designed to calculate a long series of mathematical equations.

Lovelace begged Babbage to let her work on it. He refused, but that wouldn't stop her. Over the next two years Lovelace translated Babbage's notes on the machine into English, adding her own commentary as well which doubled the length of the original documents.

Babbage was impressed and invited Lovelace to work with him. They became close friends, and as time grew on, Lovelace began to suggest improvements for the Analytical Engine. Stating that it could play music, store knowledge, as well as perform its calculating duties.

Lovelace was suggesting the modern computer.

The Analytical Engine was never finished in Lovelace or Babbage's time, but it did help inspire the phones, computers, and other devices used today.

Towards the end of her life, Lovelace developed cancer. She died at the age of thirty-six from her illness. She was buried at the Church of St. Mary Magdelene next to her father, whom she never met.

In 2009, in order to raise awareness for women in STEM, it was declared that the second Tuesday of every October would be Ada Lovelace day. A time to remember the mother of modern computing. "Forget this world and all its troubles and if possible, its multitudinous Charlatans--everything in short but the Enchantress of Numbers." Charles Babbage on Ada Lovelace.

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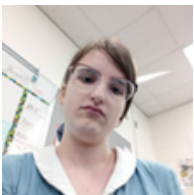
## Appreciation for Miss Kuerzi
