Instead, you will *examine nonfiction*: letters, speeches, political cartoons, documentaries, essays, and so forth. You will examine authors' use of *rhetoric*—the ways in which authors use language to influence their audiences. You will also construct your own arguments, employing the tools of rhetoric in order to persuade your audiences. All of our reading and writing will center around real events and authentic discourse. As this is a college course, at times we will read and discuss controversial texts and topics.

I challenge you to read the summary of each book and select something that you might not read. Again, this is OPTIONAL, but recommended to broaden your worldview and expose you to relevant nonfiction.
