Mrs. Macking's Math Minutes

We recommend that scholars complete 5 or more lessons per week (grades K-2)/10 lessons per week (grades 3-5) with DreamBox Learning, at school or at home. Encourage your child to develop the following habits:

- Be okay with mistakes. As long as students complete lessons, DreamBox will be able to assess their comprehension and adapt.
- Work independently. Helping a student through a lesson can progress them beyond their current abilities and lead to frustration.
 - Use the help/hint button when needed.
 - Use headphones with the volume on:

For Parents of Third, Fourth, & Fifth grade students:

- Please work with your children on multiplication facts whenever possible (in the car, while making dinner, when you take a walk, etc.)
 Show your child math in the real world (at the grocery store, when you're paying bills, sports statistics, etc.)
 - Encourage your child to draw pictures and visual representations when working out math problems

For Parents of Kindergarten, First grade, & Second grade students:

- 1st & 2nd grade: Please work with your children on addition and subtraction facts whenever possible (in the car, while making dinner, when you take a walk, etc.)• K-2: Show your child math in the real world (at the grocery store, when you're paying bills, sports statistics, etc.)
 K-2: Encourage your child to draw pictures and visual representations when working out math problems
- Kindergarten: Give your child opportunities to count out sets of objects, focusing on 1-10 objects. For example, give them a bag of pennies and have them take out 4 pennies. Once they've taken them out of the bag, have them recount by touching each penny as they count. Once they've recounted you can confirm "you have 4 pennies." Try this with different amounts of objects (buttons, cheerios, grapes, etc.)
