

Math Memos from Mrs. Macking

Hello Parents!

You may have seen your student working on the DreamBox Math program at home or heard them talking about it from their experience at school. Many of our students have been earning DreamBox reward certificates because of their performance on DreamBox!

<u>What is DreamBox?</u> DreamBox is a research based online curriculum based on the principles of the National Council of Teachers of

Mathematics (NCTM). It is closely aligned with national and state math standards. It is designed to help students at all math levels to have a deeper math understanding.

Parents, did you know?

- K-5 students completing <u>5 or more lessons</u> per week grew <u>175</u>% more than their peers who have been completing 2-5 lessons per week.
- K-5 students meeting the minimum recommended usage by <u>completing 5 or more</u> DreamBox lessons per week grew **0.61 grade levels** since the beginning of the school year.

Please encourage your child to complete DreamBox lessons at home each week to help them improve their math skills.

Remember, with DreamBox math, students should:

· Try every problem, even when it's hard

- Utilize in lesson support such as feedback, hints, and help.
- Use headphones or speakers with volume on in order to listen to directions and feedback
- Work independently (Don't let others do your work for you)
- Strive to complete 10 lessons per week to experience the most growth.

Parents, we know you love to help your child. With DreamBox math, it's important NOT to help them because the program adapts according to their answers. If YOU (or someone else) helps them, they may be moved up to a more difficult level before they are ready. Just think...you wouldn't help your child on an eye exam, right?

Encourage your child to stay positive and to use the assistance provided within the program so that DreamBox will adapt to their learning.

Literacy Coach Lessons

When it comes to reading, nothing is more effective than modeling the love of reading for your child. A great family activity, especially since we spend so much more time in our homes these days, is to set aside 20-30 minutes a few times a week for family reading. Here are some suggestions for what this might look like:

- For Pre-K students, read the book to your child, asking them to name items in the pictures, or simply retell you something they heard.
- For primary students, focusing on characters, setting, problem and solution can certainly lead to some very interesting conversations. This is also a great time to work on sight words together.
- For intermediate students, reading the same chapter book and then discussing it is such a wonderful way to get reluctant readers excited about reading. The fact that you are modeling by reading with them, and even reading the same book, can build a true love of reading. As adults, you lead by example, and this would definitely be a great way to set a positive example for your child.
- It might simply be each member of your family reading something of their own at the same time, dedicating intentional blocks of time to help instill the love of reading and enjoy the written word.
