REQUIREMENTS TO RECEIVE AN AWARD: (AS DETERMINED BY THE POSTSECONDARY INSTITUTION)

1. Be evaluated by the Office of Student Financial Assistance (OSFA) as meeting initial eligibility requirements.
2. Be a Florida resident and U.S. citizen or eligible noncitizen.
3. Enroll as a degree- or certificate-seeking student at a Florida institution in at least 6 non-remedial semester credit hours.

SCHOLARSHIP RESTRICTIONS:

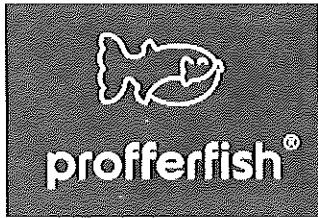
- Gold Seal Vocational (GSV) Scholarships may only be used at postsecondary institutions that offer an applied technology diploma, technical degree education program (associate in applied science or associate in science), or a career certificate program.
- Until a student has earned an eligible associate degree, Gold Seal CAPE (GSC) scholarships may only be used at postsecondary institutions that offer an applied technology diploma, technical degree education program (associate in applied science or associate in science), or a career certificate program. Upon completion of an eligible associate degree program, a GSC Scholar may also receive an award for a maximum of 60 credit hours toward an eligible baccalaureate degree.

RENEWAL REQUIREMENTS: (As determined by grade and hours submitted by your postsecondary institution.)

1. Students must earn the number of credit hours based on the student's enrollment type per term.
2. The renewal cumulative GPA requirements are outlined in the table below.

Parent and Student Quick Start Guide

Sign into your Profferfish account through your Clever



Find a volunteer organization. You can review approved organizations in Profferfish or find one on your own.



Contact the organization and let them know you are interested in volunteering and see if they are currently taking volunteers.



Once you have found an organization to volunteer at or if you have a paid work position, you will need to review our district policy and confirm that it meets the district requirements. You can review our district policy here: <https://www.pcsb.org/Page/40036>.



Sign into your Profferfish account by going to your Clever account and clicking on the Profferfish icon.



Review Pre-Approved Volunteer and Business organizations to see if your organization is already listed.

- If not listed, submit your organization for approval. Be sure to list an email address that is monitored and let your supervisor know to be on the lookout for an email from Profferfish. They have to respond to the email before they can be added.



If it is listed, click on the organization/business. At the bottom of the page, you will see General Volunteer and General Paid Work. Click the link for the appropriate type of hours you are earning.



Click on the Submit Hours link to add your hours.



Add the days and times you completed to the system. If you are still accruing hours with them, you can click Save as Draft and continue adding hours.



Once you have earned your required number of hours or are done volunteering/working with an organization/business, share your reflection and submit for approval OR if your agency supervisor is present, they can sign off on your device.



Parents will need to click on the thumbs up icon and sign through your account. It will then be submitted to your counselor for final approval.

INTRODUCING THE NEW FAFSA

Changes are coming to the Free Application for Federal Student Aid

How is the FAFSA Changing?

The FAFSA Simplification Act was ratified in August 2022, with the intent to streamline the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) application process. It specified three goals: 1) expanded eligibility for federal financial aid, 2) reduced barriers for certain student populations and, 3) a better user experience for the FAFSA form. This PDF outlines changes that accomplish these goals.

INTRODUCING THE NEW FAFSA

Changes are coming to the Free Application for Federal Student Aid

Contributors

A contributor is anyone who is required to provide information on the FAFSA; that means the student, parent(s), and spouse might all be referred to as "contributors" in the FAFSA form.

FSA ID

EVERY contributor will need an FSA ID to access the FAFSA. Undocumented parents will now be able to create an FSA ID.

Tip: Ensure every contributor creates an FSA ID before the FAFSA becomes available.

Family Size

For tax-filers, family size will be automatically calculated based on the number of individuals claimed on the tax return. If the family size is different from the tax return, there will be an option to enter it manually.

Tip: Have a copy of the tax return or tax transcript on hand to check who was claimed.

Number in College

The number of dependents in college will no longer impact the federal formula for aid distribution. However, questions about the number of dependents in the household attending college may still appear for institutional purposes.

Potential Impact on Students

The new formula allows a minimum SAI of negative \$1,500 to give financial aid administrators more insight when making determinations for students with especially challenging situations. Some applicants will be able to determine Pell Grant eligibility prior to enrolling in college based on their family size, household income, and state's poverty standards.

Federal Tax Information

Direct Data Exchange (DDX) will replace the IRS Data Retrieval Tool (DRT) as the process for transferring tax information from the IRS. This will reduce the number of financial questions that most families will see on the FAFSA.

All contributors must consent to having their tax information transferred, even if they did not file taxes for the required year. There will be few exceptions for manual entry.

If consent is not granted:

- the FAFSA will be considered incomplete
- the FAFSA will be ineligible for federal financial aid

Reporting

Families with an Adjusted Gross Income (AGI) greater than \$60k will be required to report asset information. The net worth of businesses and farms of any size will now be included.

Don't Forget the Florida Financial Aid Application (FFAA)!

While you wait to complete the FAFSA, remember to fill out your FFAA! The Florida Department of Education, Office of Student Financial Assistance (OSFA) administers state-funded grant and scholarship programs. The Florida Financial Aid Application (FFAA) is the application students complete for some of these programs, such as Bright Futures.
