What Students and Parents Need to Know

What options lead to a standard diploma?

Successful completion of one of the following options:

- 24 credits
- Advanced International Certificate of Education (AICE) curriculum
- International Baccalaureate (IB) curriculum
- 18-credit Academically Challenging Curriculum to Enhance Learning (ACCEL)
- · Career and Technical Education (CTE) Pathway

(See section [s.] 1003.4282, Florida Statutes [F.S.])

What are the state assessment requirements?

Students must pass the following statewide assessments:

- Grade 10 English Language Arts (ELA) or a concordant score
- Algebra 1 end-of-course (EOC) or a comparative score

A waiver of assessment results is granted by the Individual Educational Plan (IEP) team for students with disabilities. Additionally, students who have been enrolled in an English for Speakers of Other Languages (ESOL) program for less than two years may meet the requirement for grade 10 ELA by satisfactorily demonstrating grade level expectations of formative assessments.

Refer to <u>Graduation Requirements for Florida's Statewide Assessments</u> for concordant and comparative scores.

Students enrolled in the following courses must participate in the corresponding EOC assessment, which constitutes 30 percent of the final course grade*:

Algebra 1 Biology Geometry U.S. History

*Special note: Thirty percent not applicable if not enrolled in the course but passed the EOC (Credit Acceleration Program [CAP]). (See s. 1008.22, F.S.)

What is the difference between the 18-credit ACCEL option and the 24-credit option?

- 3 elective credits instead of 8
- Physical Education is not required

What is the difference between the CTE Pathway option and the 24-credit option?

- At least 18 credits are required
- 4 elective credits instead of 8
 - 2 credits in CTE courses, must result in a program completion and industry certification
 - 1.5 credits in work-based learning programs; Physical Education is not required
- Fine and Performing Arts, Speech and Debate, CTE or Practical Arts is not required

Students must earn a 2.0 unweighted grade-point average (GPA) on a 4.0 scale for all cohort years and pass statewide, standardized assessments.

- **Industry certifications for which there is a statewide college credit articulation agreement approved by the State Board of Education may substitute for mathematics and science credit.
- ***A computer science credit may not be used to substitute for both a mathematics and science credit.

Scholar Diploma Designation

In addition to the requirements of s. <u>1003.4282</u>, F.S., a student must satisfy the following requirements:

- Earn 1 credit in Algebra 2 or an equally rigorous course
- Pass the Geometry EOC
- Earn 1 credit in Statistics or an equally rigorous mathematics course
- Pass the Biology 1 EOC++
- Earn 1 credit in Chemistry or Physics
- Earn 1 credit in a course equally rigorous to Chemistry or Physics
- Pass the U.S. History EOC++
- Earn 2 credits in the same World Language
- Earn at least 1 credit in an AP, IB, AICE or a dual enrollment course **Special note: A student is exempt from the Biology 1 or U.S. History EOC assessment if the student is enrolled in an AP, IB, or AICE Biology 1 or U.S. History course; takes the respective AP, IB or AICE assessment; and earns the minimum college credit.

Industry Scholar Diploma Designation

- Meet standard high school diploma requirements
- Attain one or more industry certifications from the list established (per s. 1003.492, F.S.)

What is CAP?

The CAP allows a student to earn high school credit if the student passes an AP examination, a College Level Examination Program (CLEP) or a statewide course assessment without enrollment in the course. The courses include:

Algebra 1 Biology U.S. History

What are the additional graduation options for students with disabilities?

Students, in collaboration with parents and the IEP team, may choose two additional standard diploma options available only to students with disabilities. Both allow students to substitute a CTE course with related content for one credit in ELA 4, mathematics, science and social studies (excluding Algebra 1, Geometry, Biology 1 and U.S. History). The two options are as follows:

- Students with a most significant cognitive disability may earn credits via access courses and be assessed via an alternate assessment.
- Students enrolled in the academic and employment option must earn at least 0.5 credit via paid employment in addition to meeting the standard diploma graduation requirements.

State University System

Admission into Florida's <u>State University System</u> (SUS) institutions is competitive. Prospective students should complete a rigorous course of study in high school and apply to more than one university to increase their chance for acceptance. To qualify to enter one of Florida's public universities, a first-time-in-college student must meet the following minimum requirements (credit earned by industry certification does not count for SUS admission):

- High school graduation with a standard diploma, a minimum of a 2.5 GPA and admission test scores meeting minimum college-ready test scores per Board of Governors (BOG) Regulation 6.008
- 16 credits of approved college preparatory academic courses per BOG Regulation 6.002
- 4 English (3 with substantial writing)
- 4 Mathematics (Algebra 1 level and higher)
- 3 Natural Science (2 with substantial lab)
- 3 Social Science
- 2 World Language (sequential, in the same language or other equivalents)
- 2 approved electives

Florida College System

The 28 colleges of the Florida College System serve more than 650,000 students. Colleges offer affordable and stackable workforce credentials including certificate programs, associate in science degrees and associate in arts degrees, which transfer to a bachelor's degree program. All colleges also offer workforce bachelor's degree programs in areas of high demand. All Florida College System institutions have open-door admissions for students who earned a standard high school diploma or an equivalent diploma, or earned college credit.

Career and Technical Colleges and Centers

Florida also offers students 49 accredited career and technical colleges or centers throughout the state, which provide the education and certification necessary to work in a particular career or technical field. Programs are flexible for students and provide industry-specific education and training for a wide variety of occupations.

Need to make up credits or boost your GPA? Ask your school counselor about the options listed below. Please know that only grades of "D"s and "F"s are eligible for forgiveness, with the exception of "C"s earned in middle school.

After School Credit Recovery (ASCR):

ASCR is offered on our campus after school. All core courses (i.e., English, Math, Science, and Social Studies) are open to 9th, 10th, 11th, and 12th graders. Courses will be taken via Edmentum – a computer-based credit recovery program that allows students to work at their own pace until the subject matter is mastered. Please note that seats are limited and that a student must be first approved by the guidance department and then accepted by the ASCR coordinator. Enrollment is on a first-come, first-served basis, however, seniors are given priority placement.

A few points to be aware of: (1) students must finish <u>all</u> course requirements to earn credit or grade forgiveness; (2) students must earn a final grade of 80% to earn credit for the course; (3) students may not miss more than three days or nine hours of instructional time without prior approval from the ASCR coordinator; (4) students may be suspended or removed from the program for not meeting the guidelines and procedures as outlined by the ASCR coordinator and instructor(s); and (5) Edmentum courses do not meet NCAA credit requirements.

Florida Virtual School (FLVS Flex Option):

FLVS is a fully accredited public school that offers more than 120 free courses to K-12 public, private, and homeschool students. Every FLVS course is taught by a dedicated and certified teacher who is focused on student success. Courses are aligned with Florida and national standards and are accessible 24/7. Core courses are NCAA approved. Enrollment is open 365 days a year due to the FLVS year-round rolling enrollment model.

Night School:

Students must obtain a completed High School Credit Referral Form from their school counselor and bring it to the night school campus on the night they enroll in class. Night schools use the Edmentum credit recovery program which enables students to make up high school credits online. The curriculum is self-paced, and progress and completion of the course is mastery based. Once the work is completed, the credit is earned. - Submit the Florida Financial Aid Application (FFAA) no later than August 31 after high school graduation.
- 2. Graduate from a Florida high school with a standard high school diploma or its equivalent.
- Complete the 16 college-preparatory courses required for admission to a state university.
- 4. Achieve the required weighted GPA in the 16 college-preparatory courses.
- 5. Achieve the required composite ACT® score, Overall Score on the Classic Learning Test (CLT), or combined SAT® score no later than August 31 of the student's graduation year (or through January 31 for mid-year graduates).
- Complete the required number of volunteer service hours, paid work hours, or combined hours.



REQUIREMENTS TO RECEIVE AN AWARD

- Be evaluated by the Office of Student Financial Assistance (OSFA) as meeting initial eligibility requirements.

- 2. Graduate with a standard high school diploma or its equivalent.
- Earn a minimum of 5 postsecondary credit hours through CAPE industry certifications that articulate for college credit.
- 4. Complete at least 30 volunteer service hours, 100 paid work hours, or a combination that equals a minimum of 100 total hours.

SCHOLARSHIP RESTRICTIONS

Until a student has earned an eligible associate degree, Gold Seal CAPE (GSC) scholarships may only be used at postsecondary institutions that offer an applied technology diploma, technical degree education program (associate in applied science or associate in science), or a career certificate program.

Upon completion of an eligible associate degree program, a GSC Scholar may also receive an award for a maximum of 60 credit hours toward an eligible baccalaureate degree.

This is a key year in the college planning process because you'll be taking standardized tests, narrowing down your college list, and learning more about financial aid. In addition, you'll need to stay involved in your high school courses and activities.

Fal	: Take the PSAT and start a list of colleges
	Stay on track with your classes and grades.
_	Meet with your counselor to see what you still need to take. Check on your class rank and your GPA. Even if your
	grades haven't been that good so far, it's never too late to improve. Colleges like to see an upward trend.
	Take the PSAT.
	Taking the test qualifies you for the National Merit Scholarship program, which means you could earn money for
	college. In addition, it's a good way to practice for the SAT.
	Evaluate your education options.
	Now is the time to follow a more specific path. Decide whether you want to pursue full-time employment, further
	education or training (such as a vocational-technical school, career college, or two-year or four-year college), or a
	military career. If you're interested in attending a military academy, talk to your school counselor about starting the
	application process now.
	Make a college list.
	Your list of colleges should include schools that meet your most important criteria (for example, size, location, cost,
	academic majors, or special programs). Weigh each of the factors according to their importance to you and develop
	a preliminary ranking of the schools on your list.
	Continue gathering college information.
	Go to college fairs, attend college nights, and speak with college representatives who visit your high school; use an
	online college finder and search top college lists. You may be able to narrow your choices or add a school to your
	list.
	Organize a testing plan.
	Figure out when you'll be taking important tests like the SAT, ACT, SAT Subject Tests, and AP exams, and mark the
	dates on your calendar. You'll want to have plenty of time to prepare.
	Make sure you're meeting any special requirements.
	If you want to play Division I or II sports in college, start the certification process and check with your counselor to
	make sure you're taking a core curriculum that meets NCAA requirements.
Wi	nter: Stay involved, organize college lists, and prepare for standardized tests
	Characteristics of with authors we are included as the control of
_	Stay involved with extracurricular activities. Colleges look for consistency and depth in the non-academic activities you pursue. Taking on leadership roles and
	making a commitment to the same groups are more important than trying out tons of new activities each year.
	Organize your college information.
_	Set up a filing system with individual folders for each college's correspondence and printed materials. This will make
	it easier to locate the specific information you're looking for.
	Begin narrowing down your college choices.
_	Make sure you have all the information you need about the colleges you're interested in (entrance requirements,
	tuition, room and board costs, course offerings, student activities, financial aid, etc.). Then begin comparing the
	schools by the factors that are most important to you and rank your choices.
	Prepare for standardized tests.
_	Find out if the colleges you are interested in require the SAT, ACT, or SAT Subject Tests. Register to take the tests
	you need; most juniors take them in the winter or spring. You can take them again in the fall of your senior year if
	you're unhappy with your scores.
	Talk to your family.
_	Have a discussion about the colleges you're interested in Your family can learn about what you want to nursue and

you can hear any concerns or suggestions they might have.

	Learn more about financial aid. Examine your family's financial resources and gather information about financial aid from the schools you're interested in. High-school sponsored financial aid nights, college financial aid counselors, and advice articles are also good sources of information.
<u>Spr</u>	ing: Search for scholarships and gather recommendations
	Prepare a challenging schedule for senior year. Meet with your counselor to determine what classes you'll take next year and to make sure you're on track for graduation. When you pick your classes, don't load up on easy electives. Colleges do consider your senior year courses and grades, so stick with a schedule that challenges you. Start a scholarship search.
_	There are lots of scholarships out there; you just need to spend a little bit of time and effort to find them. Check with your guidance office for scholarships from local organizations and use online scholarship search tools to find a wider range of options. The sooner you start looking for scholarships, the easier it will be to select some to apply to during your senior year.
	Contact your recommendation writers. Teachers and school counselors are often asked to write recommendations for lots of students. Consider whom you want to ask now and let them know so they'll have time to prepare before getting tons of requests in the fall. Ask teachers who know you well and who will have positive things to say. Letters of recommendation from a coach, activity leader, or adult who knows you well outside of school are also valuable.
	Apply for a summer job or internship. Summer employment and internships in fields you're interested in will look appealing on a college application or resume. The money you earn can also be used to help pay application and testing fees in the fall.
	Set up appointments at your top college choices. You'll often have to plan ahead when visiting colleges. Call the admissions office to set up a personal interview, tour, and a meeting with a professor or coach if you're interested. You can also ask them to send you an application.
<u>Sur</u>	nmer: Visit colleges and work on application essays
	Visit colleges.
	Visit the campuses of your top five college choices. Take a tour and speak with the admissions and financial aid staff. You may also be able to talk to students if some classes are in session. If you have an interview, be sure to send a thank-you letter to the interviewer once you return home. Get advice from other college students.
	If you have friends or relatives in college, talk to them about what college life is like, especially if they attend a school you're interested in. Although it's important to hear what the admissions staff has to say about a school, it's also important to get the students' perspective.
	Organize your financial aid information. Develop a plan that includes a list of the aid sources, requirements for each application, and a timetable for meeting the filing deadlines. Getting organized will make the process of applying a lot easier because you'll know where to find important information.
	Start working on your application essays. Compose rough drafts of the essays you'll need for your college applications. Have a teacher read and discuss them with you so you can see what to work on. Make any revisions to your application essays and prepare final drafts. Don't forget to proofread your final essays a few times.
	Make early decision preparations. If you plan to apply early decision to any school, take the time to visit the school again and make sure you're willing to commit. If you elect to apply early decision, you should start working on your application as soon as possible because its deadline will be earlier than others.

College Days

Any post-secondary visitation, whether it is to a university/college, a technical/vocational school, or a military recruiter's office is known as a "College Day." A College Day is a Code 3 excused absence, which does <u>not</u> affect your exam exemption eligibility. College Days are limited to one (1) day for Juniors and three (3) days for Seniors. However, in order to receive the Code 3 excused absence, you must follow this procedure:

- 1. Turn in a **College Day Request Form** (copies are located in the Guidance lobby or can be downloaded from the Guidance website), or bring a note from your parent, to your clerk at least three (3) days prior to the visit.
- 2. Obtain an original letter on letterhead/stationary from the location of your visit that addresses you by name and confirms the date of your visitation.
- 3. Return the letter to your alpha clerk upon your return to school.

Also, please note that you are responsible for obtaining and completing all missed class and homework assignments due to the College Day absence.

Letters of Recommendation and Secondary School Reports

Letters of recommendation should be written by someone who can describe your skills, accomplishments and personality. Colleges and employers value recommendations because they: (1) reveal things about you that grades and test scores can't; (2) provide personal opinions of your character; and (3) show who is willing to speak on your behalf. Letters of recommendation work for you when they present you in the best possible light, showcasing your skills and abilities. In order to request a letter of recommendation, please follow this procedure:

- 1. Complete a **Student Resume for Letters of Recommendation** form (copies are located in the Guidance lobby or can be downloaded from the Guidance website).
- 2. Provide the Student Resume to the recommender(s) (e.g., teacher, counselor, coach, administrator, etc...).
- 3. Letters of recommendation requests for college applications can be made in your Naviance account. For any other type of LOR, give your recommender(s) addressed and stamped envelopes for each scholarship program and/or employer that requires a recommendation.
- 4. Make your recommender(s) aware of any deadlines. Be sure to give them <u>at least two (2) weeks</u> before your earliest deadline to complete and send your letters.
- 5. Follow up with your recommender(s) a week or so before recommendations are due to make sure your letters have been sent.













