#### What Students and Parents Need to Know

#### What options lead to a standard diploma?

Successful completion of one of the following options:

- 24 credits
- Advanced International Certificate of Education (AICE) curriculum
- International Baccalaureate (IB) curriculum
- 18-credit Academically Challenging Curriculum to Enhance Learning (ACCEL)
- Career and Technical Education (CTE) Pathway (See section [s.] <u>1003.4282</u>, Florida Statutes [F.S.])

#### What are the state assessment requirements?

Students must pass the following statewide assessments:

- Grade 10 English Language Arts (ELA) or a concordant score
- Algebra 1 end-of-course (EOC) or a comparative score

A waiver of assessment results is granted by the Individual Educational Plan (IEP) team for students with disabilities. Additionally, students who have been enrolled in an English for Speakers of Other Languages (ESOL) program for less than two years may meet the requirement for grade 10 ELA by satisfactorily demonstrating grade level expectations of formative assessments.

Refer to <u>Graduation Requirements for Florida's Statewide Assessments</u> for concordant and comparative scores.

Students enrolled in the following courses must participate in the corresponding EOC assessment, which constitutes 30 percent of the final course grade<sup>+</sup>:

- Algebra 1
   Geometry
- Biology
   U.S. History

<sup>+</sup>Special note: Thirty percent not applicable if not enrolled in the course but passed the EOC (Credit Acceleration Program [CAP]). (See s. <u>1008.22</u>, F.S.)

# What is the difference between the 18-credit ACCEL option and the 24-credit option?

- 2.5 elective credits instead of 7.5
- Physical Education is not required

# What is the difference between the CTE Pathway option and the 24-credit option?

- At least 18 credits are required
- 3.5 elective credits instead of 7.5
  - 2 credits in CTE courses, must result in a program completion and industry certification
  - 1.5 credits in work-based learning programs; Physical Education is not required
- Fine and Performing Arts, Speech and Debate, CTE or Practical Arts is not required

#### 7.5 Elective Credits

Students must earn a 2.0 unweighted grade-point average (GPA) on a 4.0 scale for all cohort years and pass statewide, standardized assessments.

\*\*Industry certifications for which there is a statewide college credit articulation agreement approved by the State Board of Education may substitute for mathematics and science credit.

**Scholar Diploma Designation** 

In addition to the requirements of s. <u>1003.4282</u>, F.S., a student must satisfy the following requirements:

- Earn 1 credit in Algebra 2 or an equally rigorous course
- Pass the Geometry EOC
- Earn 1 credit in Statistics or an equally rigorous mathematics course
- Pass the Biology 1 EOC++
- Earn 1 credit in Chemistry or Physics
- Earn 1 credit in a course equally rigorous to Chemistry or Physics
- Pass the U.S. History EOC++
- Earn 2 credits in the same World Language
- Earn at least 1 credit in an AP, IB, AICE or a dual enrollment course \*\*Special note: A student is exempt from the Biology 1 or U.S. History EOC assessment if the student is enrolled in an AP, IB, or AICE Biology 1 or U.S. History course; takes the respective AP, IB or AICE assessment; and earns the minimum college credit.

#### Industry Scholar Diploma Designation

- Meet standard high school diploma requirements
- Attain one or more industry certifications from the list established (per s. 1003.492, F.S.)

#### What is CAP?

Biology

The CAP allows a student to earn high school credit if the student passes an AP examination, a College Level Examination Program (CLEP) or a statewide course assessment without enrollment in the course. The courses include:

- Algebra 1
   Geometry
  - U.S. History

# What are the additional graduation options for students with disabilities?

Students, in collaboration with parents and the IEP team, may choose two additional standard diploma options available only to students with disabilities. Both allow students to substitute a CTE course with related content for one credit in ELA 4, mathematics, science and social studies (excluding Algebra 1, Geometry, Biology 1 and U.S. History). The two options are as follows:

- Students with a most significant cognitive disability may earn credits via access courses and be assessed via an alternate assessment.
- Students enrolled in the academic and employment option must earn at least 0.5 credit via paid employment in addition to meeting the standard diploma graduation requirements.

#### State University System

Admission into Florida's <u>State University System</u> (SUS) institutions is competitive. Prospective students should complete a rigorous course of study in high school and apply to more than one university to increase their chance for acceptance. To qualify to enter one of Florida's public universities, a first-time-in-college student must meet the following minimum requirements (credit earned by industry certification does not count for SUS admission):

- High school graduation with a standard diploma, a minimum of a 2.5 GPA and admission test scores meeting minimum college-ready test scores per Board of Governors (BOG) Regulation 6.008
- 16 credits of approved college preparatory academic courses per BOG Regulation 6.002
- 4 English (3 with substantial writing)
- 4 Mathematics (Algebra 1 level and higher)
- 3 Natural Science (2 with substantial lab)
- 3 Social Science
- 2 World Language (sequential, in the same language or other equivalents)
- 2 approved electives

#### Florida College System

The 28 colleges of the <u>Florida College System</u> serve more than 650,000 students. Colleges offer affordable and stackable workforce credentials including certificate programs, associate in science degrees and associate in arts degrees, which transfer to a bachelor's degree program. All colleges also offer workforce bachelor's degree programs in areas of high demand. All Florida College System institutions have open-door admissions for students who earned a standard high school diploma or an equivalent diploma, or earned college credit.

#### **Career and Technical Colleges and Centers**

Florida also offers students 49 accredited career and technical colleges or centers throughout the state, which provide the education and certification necessary to work in a particular career or technical field. Programs are flexible for students and provide industry-specific education and training for a wide variety of occupations.

Need to make up credits or boost your GPA? Ask your school counselor about the options listed below. Please know that only grades of "D"s and "F"s are eligible for forgiveness, with the exception of "C"s earned in middle school.

#### After School Credit Recovery (ASCR):

ASCR is offered on our campus after school. All core courses (i.e., English, Math, Science, and Social Studies) are open to 9<sup>th</sup>, 10<sup>th</sup>, 11<sup>th</sup>, and 12<sup>th</sup> graders. Courses will be taken via Edmentum – a computer-based credit recovery program that allows students to work at their own pace until the subject matter is mastered. Please note that seats are limited and that a student must be first approved by the guidance department and then accepted by the ASCR coordinator. Enrollment is on a first-come, first-served basis, however, seniors are given priority placement.

A few points to be aware of: (1) students must finish <u>all</u> course requirements to earn credit or grade forgiveness; (2) students must earn a final grade of 80% to earn credit for the course; (3) students may not miss more than three days or nine hours of instructional time without prior approval from the ASCR coordinator; (4) students may be suspended or removed from the program for not meeting the guidelines and procedures as outlined by the ASCR coordinator and instructor(s); and (5) Edmentum courses do not meet NCAA credit requirements.

#### Florida Virtual School (FLVS Flex Option):

FLVS is a fully accredited public school that offers more than 120 free courses to K-12 public, private, and homeschool students. Every FLVS course is taught by a dedicated and certified teacher who is focused on student success. Courses are aligned with Florida and national standards and are accessible 24/7. Core courses are NCAA approved. Enrollment is open 365 days a year due to the FLVS year-round rolling enrollment model.

#### Night School:

Students must obtain a completed High School Credit Referral Form from their school counselor and bring it to the night school campus on the night they enroll in class. Night schools use the Edmentum credit recovery program which enables students to make up high school credits online. The curriculum is self-paced, and progress and completion of the course is mastery based. Once the work is completed, the credit is earned. - Have a full schedule (7 active classes per semester).
- Have no more than 6 college level classes (DE, AP, AICE, IB) per semester.
- Be pursuing a 24-credit standard diploma.

#### EC/EA students must...

Participating high school students earn weighted high school elective credits for High School Career Dual Enrollment.

1. Submit the Florida Financial Aid Application (FFAA) no later than August 31 after high school graduation.

2. Graduate from a Florida high school with a standard high school diploma or its equivalent.

3. Complete the 16 college-preparatory courses required for admission to a state university.

 Achieve the required weighted GPA in the 16 college-preparatory courses.
 Achieve the required composite ACT<sup>®</sup> score, Overall Score on the Classic Learning

Test (CLT), or combined SAT® score no later than August 31 of the student's

graduation year (or through January 31 for mid-year graduates).

6. Complete the required number of volunteer service hours, paid work hours, or combined hours.

#### REQUIREMENTS TO RECEIVE AN AWARD

(As determined by the postsecondary institution)

- 1.Be evaluated by the Office of Student Financial Assistance (OSFA) as meeting initial eligibility requirements.
- 2.Be a Florida resident and US citizen or eligible noncitizen.

31 after high school graduation.

2. Graduate with a standard high school diploma or its equivalent.

3. Earn a minimum of 5 postsecondary credit hours through CAPE industry certifications that articulate for college credit.

4. Complete at least 30 volunteer service hours, 100 paid work hours, or a combination that equals a minimum of 100 total hours.

#### SCHOLARSHIP RESTRICTIONS

Upon completion of an eligible associate degree program, a GSC Scholar may also receive an award for a maximum of 60 credit hours toward an eligible baccalaureate degree.







# **10<sup>th</sup> Grade Post-Secondary Preparation**

For this year, you'll want to stay on track with your high school classes and activities and begin to narrow down the plan for your future.

#### Fall: Take the PSAT and explore careers

#### **Take a practice PSAT.**

Taking the <u>PSAT</u> as a sophomore will help prepare you for the real thing next year. It also allows you to release your name to colleges so you can start receiving brochures from them.

#### □ Start getting ready for the ACT.

Ask your guidance counselor about the <u>PLAN assessment</u> program offered by American College Testing. This program helps determine your study habits and academic progress and interests; it will also prepare you for the ACT.

#### □ Stay on track with your courses.

Work with your guidance counselor to make sure you're enrolled in the courses you need to prepare you for college or a career. Move on to the next level of classes in the core subjects (English, math, science, history, and a foreign language).

#### Begin learning about the college admissions process.

Get familiar with general <u>college entrance requirements</u>. The guidance counselor's office, the library, college Web sites, and advice articles are all good sources of information.

#### □ Continue exploring potential careers.

Explore your career options in more detail—research possible careers to learn about the tasks, education, and training necessary for each occupation.

#### Winter: Read and Write

#### Take on new roles.

Stay involved with your <u>extracurricular activities</u> and work toward leadership positions in the activities you like best. Become involved in community service and other volunteer activities.

#### Read, read, read.

Developing your reading skills will help prepare you for tests and make you a well-rounded individual. Read as many books as you can and read the newspaper to learn about current affairs.

#### □ Practice your writing.

You'll need good writing skills no matter what path you pursue, so work on those skills now to get prepared. Find a teacher or another adult who can advise and encourage you to write well.

#### □ Get advice from your counselor.

Meet with your guidance counselor to make sure you're staying on track. You can also discuss your PSAT scores and ask about postsecondary enrollment options and <u>Advanced Placement (AP) courses</u>.

#### Spring/Summer: Keep your grades up and reach out to colleges

#### □ Keep your grades up.

There's probably a lot competing for your attention, but it's important to remain focused on doing well in your classes. Remember that your grades affect your GPA and class rank—two factors that colleges consider in the admissions process.

#### □ Start your college search.

Use our college search tools to decide what factors are important to you and see a <u>list of colleges</u> that matches your criteria. Attend college fairs and read the material you get from all types of schools—you may see something you like.

#### □ Contact colleges that interest you.

Write to schools and ask for more information about their academic requirements and any programs or activities that you're interested in. It's especially important to start this process now if you think you want to attend a military academy.

#### □ Consider taking SAT Subject Tests.

It's often best to take these types of tests while the material is still fresh in your mind. In May or June, you may want to take <u>SAT</u> <u>Subject Tests</u> in the courses you took this year.

#### Get a summer job.

Finding steady summer work will look good to prospective colleges and employers. Putting the money you earn away for college will also help you get a head start on a personal savings plan.

Florida's colleges remain the primary point of access to higher education in Florida, with 65 percent of the state's high school graduates pursuing postsecondary education beginning at one of Florida's 28 colleges.

The 28 state colleges offer career-related certificates and two-year associate degrees that prepare students to transfer to a bachelor's degree program or to enter jobs requiring specific skills. Many also offer baccalaureate degrees in high-demand fields.

Florida College System institutions have an open-door policy. This means students will be admitted to an associate degree program.


