What Students and Parents Need to Know

What options lead to a standard diploma?

Successful completion of one of the following options:

- 24 credits
- Advanced International Certificate of Education (AICE) curriculum
- International Baccalaureate (IB) curriculum
- 18-credit Academically Challenging Curriculum to Enhance Learning (ACCEL)
- Career and Technical Education (CTE) Pathway

(See section [s.] [1003.4282](#), Florida Statutes [F.S.])

What are the state assessment requirements?

Students must pass the following statewide assessments:

- Grade 10 English Language Arts (ELA) or a concordant score
- Algebra 1 end-of-course (EOC) or a comparative score

A waiver of assessment results is granted by the Individual Educational Plan (IEP) team for students with disabilities. Additionally, students who have been enrolled in an English for Speakers of Other Languages (ESOL) program for less than two years may meet the requirement for grade 10 ELA by satisfactorily demonstrating grade level expectations of formative assessments.

Refer to [Graduation Requirements for Florida's Statewide Assessments](#) for concordant and comparative scores.

Students enrolled in the following courses must participate in the corresponding EOC assessment, which constitutes 30 percent of the final course grade*:

- Algebra 1
- Geometry
- Biology
- U.S. History

*Special note: Thirty percent not applicable if not enrolled in the course but passed the EOC (Credit Acceleration Program [CAP]).

What is the difference between the 18-credit ACCEL option and the 24-credit option?

- 3 elective credits instead of 8
- Physical Education is not required

What is the difference between the CTE Pathway option and the 24-credit option?

- At least 18 credits are required
- 4 elective credits instead of 8
 - 2 credits in CTE courses, must result in a program completion and industry certification
 - 1.5 credits in work-based learning programs; Physical Education is not required
- Fine and Performing Arts, Speech and Debate, CTE or Practical Arts is not required

Scholar Diploma Designation

In addition to the requirements of s. [1003.4282](#), F.S., a student must satisfy the following requirements:

- Earn 1 credit in Algebra 2 or an equally rigorous course
- Pass the Geometry EOC
- Earn 1 credit in Statistics or an equally rigorous mathematics course
- Pass the Biology 1 EOC++
- Earn 1 credit in Chemistry or Physics
- Earn 1 credit in a course equally rigorous to Chemistry or Physics
- Pass the U.S. History EOC++
- Earn 2 credits in the same World Language
- Earn at least 1 credit in an AP, IB, AICE or a dual enrollment course

****Special note:** A student is exempt from the Biology 1 or U.S. History EOC assessment if the student is enrolled in an AP, IB, or AICE Biology 1 or U.S. History course; takes the respective AP, IB or AICE assessment; and earns the minimum college credit.

Industry Scholar Diploma Designation

- Meet standard high school diploma requirements
- Attain one or more industry certifications from the list established (per s. 1003.492, F.S.)

What is CAP?

The CAP allows a student to earn high school credit if the student passes an AP examination, a College Level Examination Program (CLEP) or a statewide course assessment without enrollment in the course. The courses include:

- Algebra 1
- Geometry
- Biology
- U.S. History

What are the additional graduation options for students with disabilities?

Students, in collaboration with parents and the IEP team, may choose two additional standard diploma options available only to students with disabilities. Both allow students to substitute a CTE course with related content for one credit in ELA 4, mathematics, science and social studies (excluding Algebra 1, Geometry, Biology 1 and U.S. History). The two options are as follows:

- Students with a most significant cognitive disability may earn credits via access courses and be assessed via an alternate assessment.
- Students enrolled in the academic and employment option must earn at least 0.5 credit via paid employment in addition to meeting the standard diploma graduation requirements.

State University System

Admission into Florida's [State University System](#) (SUS) institutions is competitive. Prospective students should complete a rigorous course of study in high school and apply to more than one university to increase their chance for acceptance. To qualify to enter one of Florida's public universities, a first-time-in-college student must meet the following minimum requirements (credit earned by industry certification does not count for SUS admission):

- High school graduation with a standard diploma, a minimum of a 2.5 GPA and admission test scores meeting minimum college-ready test scores per Board of Governors (BOG) Regulation 6.008
- 16 credits of approved college preparatory academic courses per BOG Regulation 6.002
- 4 English (3 with substantial writing)
- 4 Mathematics (Algebra 1 level and higher)
- 3 Natural Science (2 with substantial lab)
- 3 Social Science
- 2 World Language (sequential, in the same language or other equivalents)
- 2 approved electives

Florida College System

The 28 colleges of the [Florida College System](#) serve more than 650,000 students. Colleges offer affordable and stackable workforce credentials including certificate programs, associate in science degrees and associate in arts degrees, which transfer to a bachelor's degree program. All colleges also offer workforce bachelor's degree programs in areas of high demand. All Florida College System institutions have open-door admissions for students who earned a standard high school diploma or an equivalent diploma, or earned college credit.

Career and Technical Colleges and Centers

Florida also offers students 49 accredited career and technical colleges or centers throughout the state, which provide the education and certification necessary to work in a particular career or technical field. Programs are flexible for students and provide industry-specific education and training for a wide variety of occupations.

Need to make up credits or boost your GPA? Ask your school counselor about the options listed below. Please know that only grades of “D”s and “F”s are eligible for forgiveness, with the exception of “C”s earned in middle school.

After School Credit Recovery (ASCR):

ASCR is offered on our campus after school. All core courses (i.e., English, Math, Science, and Social Studies) are open to 9th, 10th, 11th, and 12th graders. Courses will be taken via Edmentum – a computer-based credit recovery program that allows students to work at their own pace until the subject matter is mastered. Please note that seats are limited and that a student must be first approved by the guidance department and then accepted by the ASCR coordinator. Enrollment is on a first-come, first-served basis, however, seniors are given priority placement.

A few points to be aware of: (1) students must finish all course requirements to earn credit or grade forgiveness; (2) students must earn a final grade of 80% to earn credit for the course; (3) students may not miss more than three days or nine hours of instructional time without prior approval from the ASCR coordinator; (4) students may be suspended or removed from the program for not meeting the guidelines and procedures as outlined by the ASCR coordinator and instructor(s); and (5) Edmentum courses do not meet NCAA credit requirements.

Florida Virtual School (FLVS Flex Option):

FLVS is a fully accredited public school that offers more than 120 free courses to K-12 public, private, and homeschool students. Every FLVS course is taught by a dedicated and certified teacher who is focused on student success. Courses are aligned with Florida and national standards and are accessible 24/7. Core courses are NCAA approved. Enrollment is open 365 days a year due to the FLVS year-round rolling enrollment model.

Night School:

Students must obtain a completed High School Credit Referral Form from their school counselor and bring it to the night school campus on the night they enroll in class. Night schools use the Edmentum credit recovery program which enables students to make up high school credits online. The curriculum is self-paced, and progress and completion of the course is mastery based. Once the work is completed, the credit is earned. 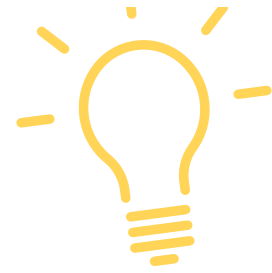

Filing the FAFSA & Getting Financial Aid

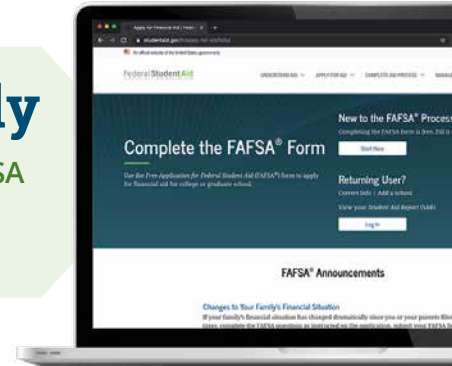


The Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA®) is the most important application you must complete in order to qualify for almost all types of financial aid including federal, state, local, and private grants and scholarships.



How to Apply

Visit studentaid.gov/FAFSA to complete and submit your application for FREE.



FAQs

Why complete a FAFSA?

The U.S. Department of Education (USDE) uses the information provided on your FAFSA to determine your eligibility for aid from federal student financial assistance programs. Schools use FAFSA data to award their own financial aid.

What are the deadlines?

Financial aid deadlines vary by school, state, program of study, and more. To ensure that you are considered for all financial aid programs, the FAFSA should be filed by the earliest application deadline date for each school you are considering attending. Check with your school for details.

You must complete a new FAFSA Application each year.

- **Opens December 1** - For students attending colleges, universities, and college-transferable programs (excluding community colleges) and for all renewal students
- **May 15** - State aid deadline.
- **Closes June 30** - You should submit your FAFSA application as soon as possible each year. Most federal and state aid is limited and is awarded on a first come, first served basis.

What is the IRS Data Retrieval Tool?

If you complete your FAFSA online, you have the option of retrieving your income and tax data from the IRS and having it automatically transferred into your FAFSA.

What do I need to file my FAFSA?

- Your Social Security number
- Your driver's license number, if you have one (optional)
- Your alien registration number, if you are not a U.S. citizen
- Your W-2 forms
- Records of other untaxed income received, including workers' compensation, child support, payments to tax-deferred pension, and savings plans, etc.
- Your federal income tax return and schedules from the prior-prior year (For example, if completing the 2025-26 FAFSA, use 2023 income tax return information.)
- Your current bank statements and records of stocks, bonds, 529 plans, and other investments.
- A personal email address (not a school email address)

If you are a dependent student, you will also need:

- Your parent's Social Security number
- Your parent's income and financial records (as listed above)
- Parents date of marriage/remarriage – month/year
- Parents date of separation/divorce – month/year

What is a Federal Student Aid account username and password (FSA ID)?

When you create an account at studentaid.gov/fsa-id the username and password (also referred to as an FSA ID) you create will be used to log in to and sign the FAFSA. If you are a dependent student, both you and one of your parents must have your own account with a username and password.

Once Your FAFSA is Processed

You will be notified that your FAFSA has been processed and you can view or print your Student Aid Report (SAR) from your My FAFSA page. You may receive an email with a link to My FAFSA after your FAFSA has been processed or you can log in to My FAFSA at studentaid.gov/FAFSA. Check your SAR for any errors and if you do find mistakes, you will need to make necessary corrections online within My FAFSA at studentaid.gov/FAFSA, or by mail on your paper SAR.

Your FAFSA will be shared with the schools that you listed on the FAFSA. Schools send out notifications about financial aid eligibility to students once you have been accepted to the school. Your schools may require other forms for you to fill out for school specific programs. Contact your postsecondary schools for more information about financial aid eligibility.

Do you Have Changes in Your Circumstances? If your family's income is less this year than what you reported on the FAFSA, reach out to the financial aid staff at your school for assistance. You can also report other changes in your situation such as high medical expenses, separation or divorce, etc.

MYTH: My family's income is too high for me to qualify for financial aid.

FACT: That's one of the most common financial aid myths, but there's no income cutoff. Most people qualify for some type of financial aid, which range from grants and scholarships to loans and work-study programs. Many factors besides income—such as your family size and your year in school—are considered to create your financial aid package.

When you submit the FAFSA® form, you're also automatically applying for state funds and possibly financial aid from your school, including grants and scholarships. In fact, some schools won't even consider you for their scholarships (including academic scholarships) until you've submitted a FAFSA® form. And you can't know how much financial aid you'll get until you fill it out.

FAFSA FAQs



What is the FAFSA?

FAFSA stands for Free Application for Federal Student Aid. In order to apply for financial aid, which includes grants, work-study and loans, every high school senior planning to attend college or career school must complete and submit the FAFSA.

Who should apply?

Any high school senior who is planning or considering college or career school should apply. By completing the FAFSA, students will automatically be considered for financial aid.

Who is eligible for financial aid?

To qualify for student aid, students must meet basic eligibility requirements:

- Be a U.S. citizen or eligible noncitizen
- Have a Social Security number
- Be registered with the Selective Service (if you're a male between the ages of 18-25)
- Plan to enroll in an eligible college or career school

Also, high school seniors must show they are qualified to obtain a college or career school education by:

- Having a high school diploma, a General Educational Development (GED) certificate or a state-recognized equivalent
- Completing a high school education in a homeschool setting approved under state law

Are non-U.S. citizens eligible for financial aid?

Generally, the following noncitizens are eligible for financial aid:

- U.S. permanent resident, with a Permanent Resident Card (formerly known as an Alien Registration, Registration Receipt Card or "Green Card")
- Conditional permanent resident (I-551C)
- Other eligible noncitizen with an Arrival-Departure Record (I-94) from the Department of Homeland Security showing any one of the following designations: "Refugee," "Asylum Granted," "Indefinite Parole," "Humanitarian Parole," or "Cuban-Haitian Entrant"
- A citizen of the Republic of Palau (PW), the Republic of the Marshall Islands (MH), or the Federated States of Micronesia (FM)

Noncitizens must enter their eight- or nine-digit Alien Registration Number (ARN) on the FAFSA.

Does parents' citizenship status affect federal student aid eligibility?

No. Parents' citizenship status does not affect the student's eligibility for federal student aid. In fact, the FAFSA doesn't even ask about parents' status.

What types of financial aid are available?

- **Grants** (i.e. free money) are awarded on the basis of need and do not have to be repaid.
- **Work-Study** enables students to earn money during the school year while also gaining valuable work experience, typically in part-time, career-related jobs.
- **Loans** consist of money that students borrow to help pay for college and must be repaid (plus interest). The two most common types of loans offered by the U.S. Department of Education include: Direct Subsidized Loans and Unsubsidized Loans.
 - **Direct Subsidized Loans** are loans available eligible undergraduate students with financial need. The interest on these loans is covered until six months after students leave school.
 - **Direct Unsubsidized Loans** are loans available to undergraduate, graduate and professional students; there is no requirement to demonstrate financial need and the interest accrues immediately on these loans. Loan repayment begins six months after students leave school.

What is the deadline to apply for financial aid?

For the 2025-2026 school year, students can begin applying for FAFSA beginning Dec. 1, 2024 and use their 2023 IRS income tax returns. Because colleges use the FAFSA to provide other types of aid (state aid, private scholarships, etc.), students should check with the college(s) they are interested in attending, as many have priority deadlines for submitting FAFSA.

What documents are needed to apply for the FAFSA?

When filling out the FAFSA, having access to the following information will be extremely helpful and make the process go smoother:

- Social Security number
- Alien registration number (if applicable)
- Federal tax information or tax returns
- Records of untaxed income
- Cash, savings and checking account balances
- Investments other than the home in which you live

How much financial aid can students receive?

Every student will be eligible for a different financial aid package, based on many factors. After students submit their FAFSA, each school they list in their application will determine a financial aid package and send an award letter with the types of aid and amounts they are offering. It depends on several factors, including:

- Cost of attendance for the school
- Expected Family Contribution (based on the information entered in the FAFSA)
- Year in school
- Enrollment status (full-time, part-time, etc.)

The earlier the FAFSA is completed, the sooner schools can send financial aid award offers and parents and students can make smarter decisions about college or career school affordability.

4. Achieve the required weighted GPA in the 16 college-preparatory courses per the chart below.
5. Achieve the required composite ACT[®] score, Overall Score on the Classic Learning Test (CLT), or combined SAT[®] score. Tests are accepted through August 31 of the student's graduation year (or through January 31 for mid-year graduates), per the chart below.
6. Complete the required number of volunteer service hours, paid work hours, or 100 total combined hours per the chart below.

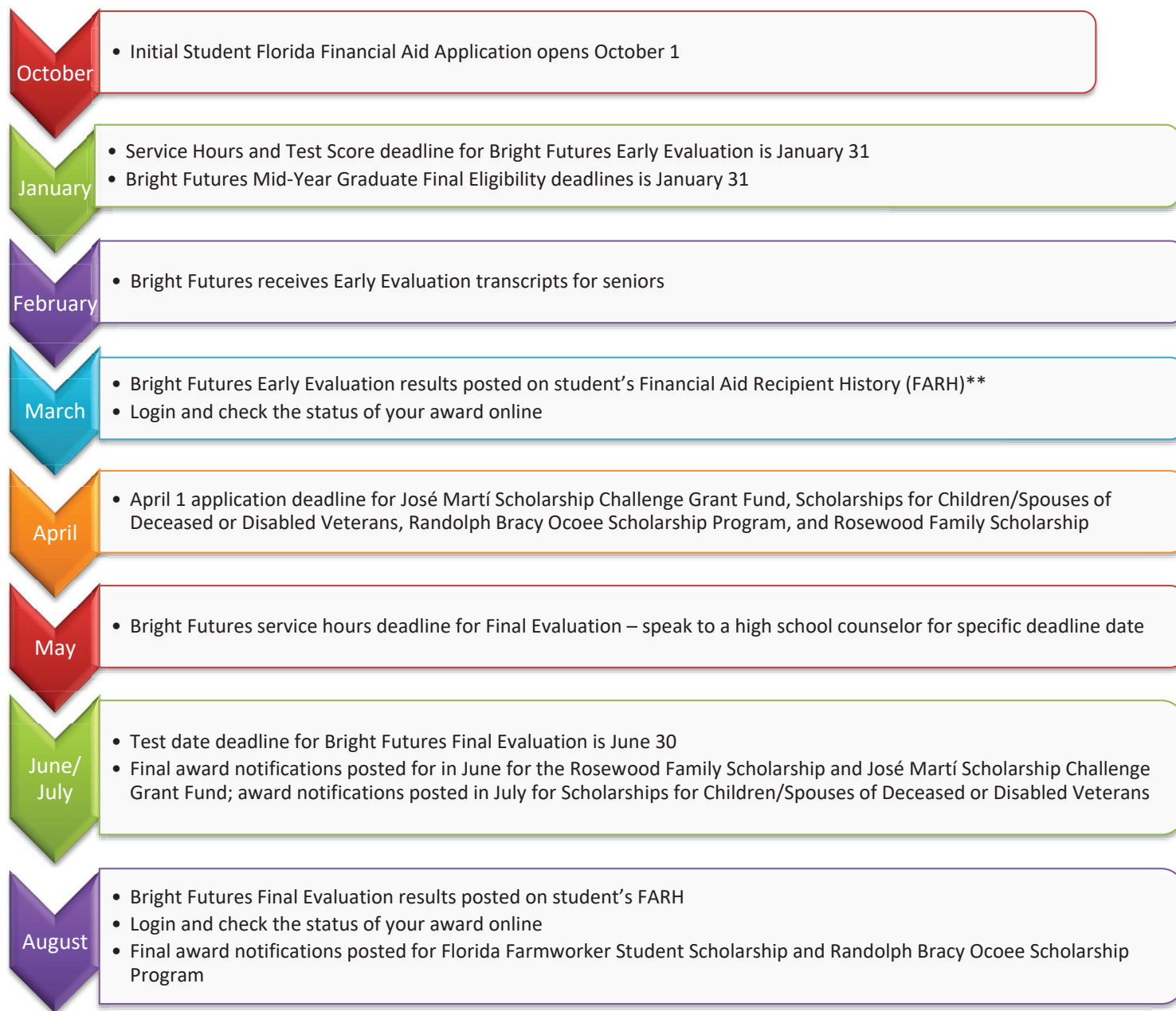

Common App and Xello

Your school is integrating Xello with Common App. This means beginning August 1, you can link your Common App account with Xello to request forms from your counselor and recommendations from your teachers. Make sure you follow the steps below to link your accounts.

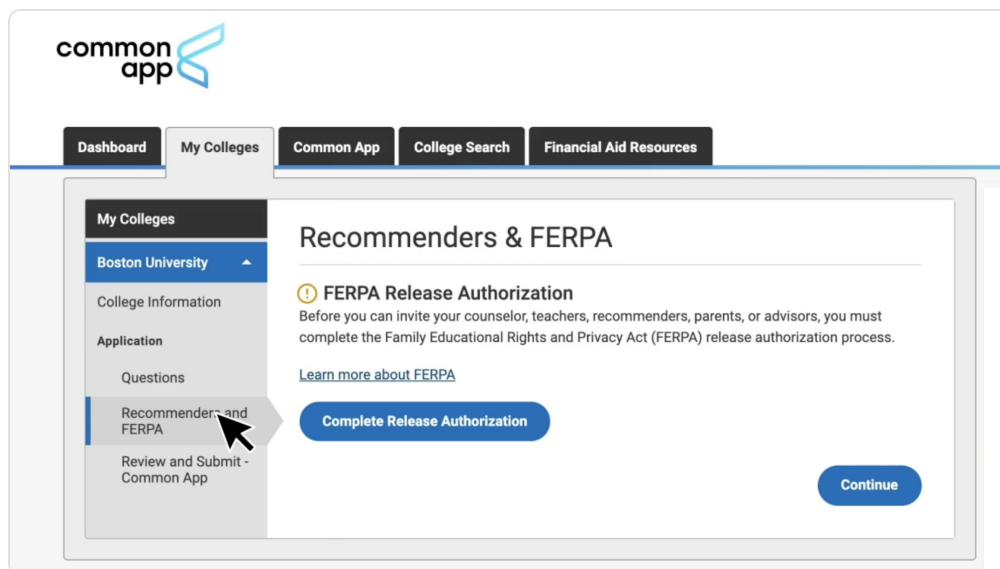


Note: If you started working in Common App in your junior year, some of your data may have been deleted over the summer.

Before linking Common App with Xello

You'll need to complete a few steps in Common App before you can begin working in Xello. After signing in to your Common App account:

- 1 Click the **Common App** tab. From the left menu, open **Profile** and then **Education** to complete the required fields.
- 2 Click the **College Search** tab, and add at least one college you plan to apply to.
- 3 Click the **My Colleges** tab and open one of your saved colleges.
- 4 In the left menu of the college profile, click **Questions** and fill out your **Preferred Start Term**.
- 5 Again from the left menu, click **Recommenders and FERPA**. Read and complete the **FERPA Release Authorization form**.



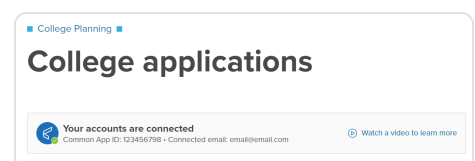
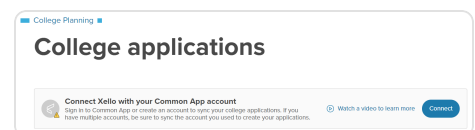
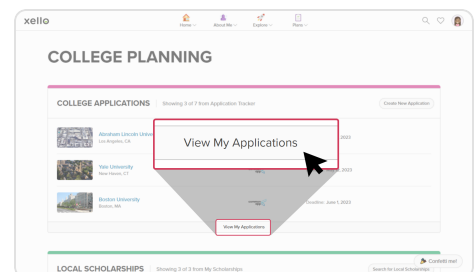
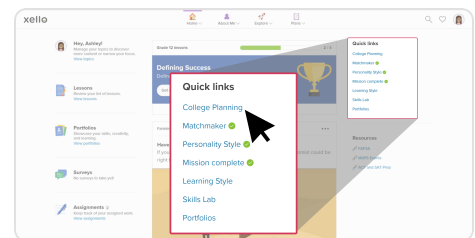

Once you've signed the **FERPA Release Authorization** form, you'll connect your Xello account to Common App. Connecting the two accounts means you can begin submitting requests for Common App documents and recommenders in Xello.

To link your Common App account with Xello:

When it comes to learning about the Military, knowing where to start your research may seem daunting. Don't worry — Today's Military is there to help.

The first steps to considering service include understanding the Military's basic entrance requirements, exploring the different Service branches and deciding between enlisted and officer career paths.

Today's Military overview pages show the various stages of a military career, from the joining process to training, working and taking advantage of military benefits.

College Days

Any post-secondary visitation, whether it is to a university/college, a technical/vocational school, or a military recruiter's office is known as a "College Day." A College Day is a Code 3 excused absence, which does not affect your exam exemption eligibility. College Days are limited to one (1) day for Juniors and three (3) days for Seniors. However, in order to receive the Code 3 excused absence, you must follow this procedure:

1. Turn in a **College Day Request Form** (copies are located in the Guidance lobby or can be downloaded from the Guidance website), or bring a note from your parent, to your clerk at least three (3) days prior to the visit.
2. Obtain an original letter on letterhead/stationary from the location of your visit that addresses you by name and confirms the date of your visitation.
3. Return the letter to your alpha clerk upon your return to school.

Also, please note that you are responsible for obtaining and completing all missed class and homework assignments due to the College Day absence.

Transcripts

All transcript requests are to be made through your Xello account.

Letters of Recommendation and Secondary School Reports

Letters of recommendation should be written by someone who can describe your skills, accomplishments and personality. Colleges and employers value recommendations because they: (1) reveal things about you that grades and test scores can't; (2) provide personal opinions of your character; and (3) show who is willing to speak on your behalf. Letters of recommendation work for you when they present you in the best possible light, showcasing your skills and abilities. In order to request a letter of recommendation, please follow this procedure:

1. Complete a **Student Resume for Letters of Recommendation** form (copies are located in the Guidance lobby or can be downloaded from the Guidance website).
2. Provide the Student Resume to the recommender(s) (e.g., teacher, counselor, coach, administrator, etc...).
3. Letters of recommendation requests for college applications can be made in your Xello account. For any other type of LOR, give your recommender(s) addressed and stamped envelopes for each scholarship program and/or employer that requires a recommendation.
4. Make your recommender(s) aware of any deadlines. Be sure to give them at least two (2) weeks before your earliest deadline to complete and send your letters.
5. Follow up with your recommender(s) a week or so before recommendations are due to make sure your letters have been sent.

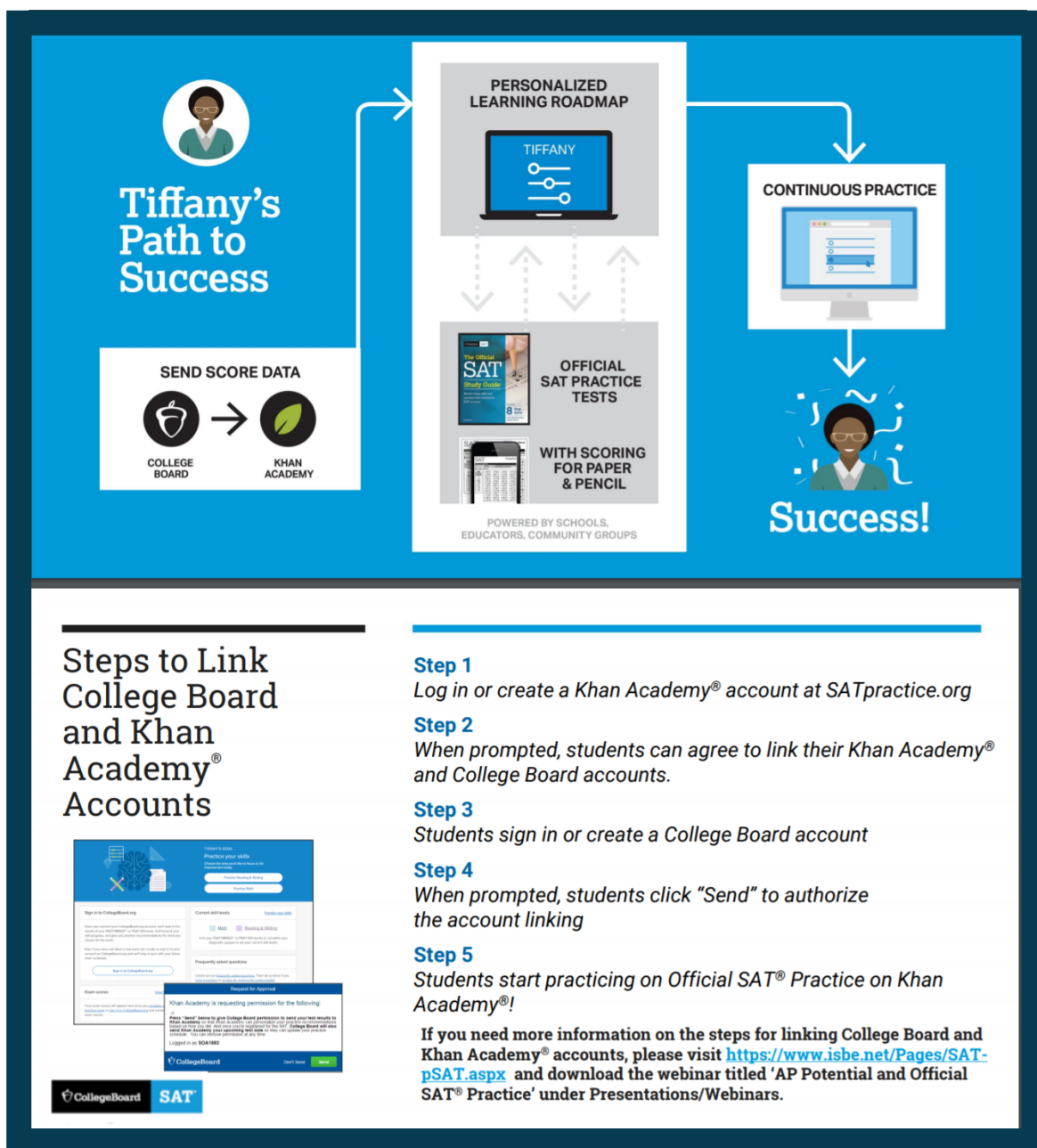
