Ashleigh works with two groups of first graders, teaching them content (math, reading, science, for example) for 50% of their day in Spanish. After six weeks, some of her students already enjoy reading in Spanish. Dual Language Immersion teachers at High Point Elementary now service two Kindergarten classes and two first grade classes. Assessment data show that these students

## Pinellas Teachers Honored at FFLA Conference

The 39th annual Florida Foreign Language, Association, Inc. Conference was held October 18-20, at the Rosen Centre in Orlando. Nearly 600 Florida teachers of world languages participated in the conference, attending workshops and sessions organized around the theme, "Rejuvenating World Language Education by Rejuvenating Teachers: Mind, Body and Spirit". The event is also the site of annual awards of excellence designed to recognize outstanding talent and dedication to the profession. This year, many Pinellas County teachers were among those recognized. year, the Florida Department of Education's Office of Academic Achievement Through Languages selects a recipient of the prestigious Irving Wershow Award for outstanding leadership in the field of world language education. This award is the highest honor presented annually at the Florida Foreign Language conference. We are pleased to announce that a Pinellas world language educator has received this honor for three consecutive years. Sylvia Amaya, a teacher of Spanish and ESOL in Pinellas for 33 years, was this year's recipient. Sylvia has been a pioneer for early language programs in Pinellas County. She designed the curriculum and taught in the district's first K-5 Spanish program and continues to serve that program as coordinator of the grant for the partial immersion program at Ridgecrest Elementary and the dual language immersion program at High Point Elementary. She is also the current president of WLTA, chairs the local committee of FFLA special board appointees and serves as the regional representative for the National Network for Early Language Learning. We are certainly proud of Sylvia and her accomplishments and congratulate her on this fine honor. Livia Wein, the 2006 Wershow Award winner, was one of three teachers inducted this year into the newly formed and highly selective "Teachers' Hall of Fame". Livia has

been a Pinellas teacher of French and Spanish for 31 years. She is the world languages department chair at Seminole High School. She has served on the board of directors of the Florida Foreign Language Association for 4 years. Livia was also named the 2006 Seminole Chamber of Commerce Teacher of the Teachers recognized as "Most Valued Teachers", who are working towards eligibility for the Teachers' Hall of Fame", were also recognized and treated to a special dinner celebration. Pinellas honorees included were Regina Bringas, Esther González-Wright, Aixa Ruch and Linda Santiago. Two additional teachers were also state winners. Sandra Rosado, Spanish teacher at Perkins Elementary, was named the K-5 Florida Teacher of the Year by the Florida chapter of the National Network of Early Language Learning. Sandra is well known for her skill in teaching language using technology and for teaching creatively using original and engaging songs, drama and activities. The Teacher of Promise Award is a special recognition presented to a teacher who has taught for less than three years. Nominations are received for teachers who early in their careers exemplify the qualities of a successful world language teacher. We are proud to congratulate Michael Eby, recipient of this year's Florida Teacher of Promise award. Mr. Eby began teaching Spanish in December, 2006, at Seminole High School after interning at Palm Harbor University High School He has already distinguished himself through his engaging instruction and tireless dedication to help individual students find success. Several successful sessions were also presented by Pinellas teachers at this year's conference. Sylvia Amaya, Nilsa Gómez, Lilly Lewis, Sandra Rosado, and Maria Wyatt presented "Música, Maestro", a session that modeled lessons built around the team's original songs. Geri Craven received high accolades for her session on engaging classroom games activities, entitled "Better Than Coffee". Gloria Muñoz and Joanna DeLeón shared the framework and activities of their successful Sociedad Honoraria Hispánica chapter in their workshop. Finally, the entire conference was possible largely due to the dedication and effort of Pinellas' own Linda Santiago, executive director of FFLA. The registration desk was manned throughout the weekend primarily by Pinellas teachers. Many of these teachers have committed to leadership roles for the coming year as the organization plans to join with ACTFL for next year's conference to be held November 20-23 at the Swan/ Dolphin Conference Center in Orlando.
