2009 International Day "Opens Minds"

More than 600 students from 26 schools (3 elementary, 12 middle and 11 high), and teachers and community supporters attended the 22nd annual International Day held at Meadowlawn Middle, Saturday, March 7, from 8:00 a.m. to 2:30 p.m. It was a wonderful day filled with a variety of learning activities and language competitions. The day began with a Parade of Nations during which students from schools throughout the district wore costumes representing a variety of nations. Mr. John DeMado, international foreign language consultant and one of the authors of the middle school and high school Spanish textbook, led students in "raps" in Spanish, French and English, emphasizing the importance of oral language development to literacy. Students were then dismissed to select activities from their passports. They eagerly took part in the day's program, experiencing other cultures and demonstrating their language skills. Many students earned multiple ribbons for presentations of memorized declamations and for speaking extemporaneously in front of native-speaking judges from the community. Teachers guided students in the preparation of gyozas (potstickers), crepes and pastelillos. Students also participated in activities from dozens of cultures, such as Mah Jongg and Tai Chi, and created artistic treasures from around the world, including Mexican quetzales, Guatemalan worry dolls, painted gourds and Chinese crafts. Many thanks to Meadowlawn MS for hosting the event again this year. Students spent months prior to the event creating beautiful thematic banners with this year's theme, "Opening Minds to the World Through Languages". Lekha Kuchampuch—Mr. Shawn Reynolds came to our class to teach us about the origins of the Panama Canal. I learned it took ten years to finish this canal even though so many people came to work on it. On each side of the canal there are two locks. Locks are wall-type things that can open and close easily, and water is enclosed in it. These locks raise and descend so boats can get across the canal. President Carter is the one who started building the canal. During the building of this canal, there were many things blocking them from finishing, such as malaria. All in all, it took a long time and a lot of people to finish this canal.

Nicole Melendy - ...The canal makes money from the tolls and the most paid has been \$300,000 and it was the Disney Cruise Ship. The least was a man swimming through, who paid 37 cents. It takes 8 minutes to fill a lock chamber so that travelers can go through. Theodore Roosevelt started the project in 1906 and the canal was handed over to the Panamanians 1999.
